

Drug Institute

Receives Grants

The Institute for Substance Abuse Prevention Studies (ISAPS) at Lewis-Clark State College recently received two federal grants to enhance its educational programs.

The U.S. Department of Education counselor training grant "Safety Net", was awarded \$101,798 for one year to conduct innovative drug prevention training sessions for rural regions of Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Montana.

The institute also received \$49,736 from the Department of Health and Human Services to develop a teleconference called "Partnership II: Building Multi-Cultural Drug Free

Communities." This grant follows one received last year for presentation of a conference and teleconference called "Rural Revitalization: Building Drug

Free Communities.' Both new grants and the ongoing School Personnel Training Grant entitled School-Community Linkages are invaluable in bringing much needed drug abuse prevention training to rural communities, explains ISAPS director Liza Nagel.


