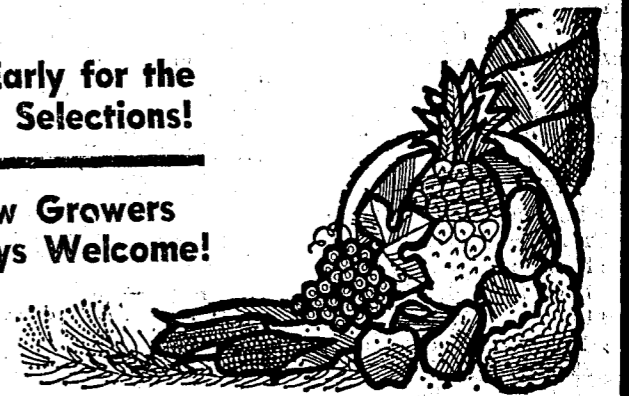

Idaho Travel Council to Award \$1.5 Million in Tourist Promotion Grants

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Idaho Travel Council will be held July 21-22 in the Silverhorn Room at The Holiday Inn in Boise. The meeting will start at 8 a. m. on July 21.

The meeting will focus on the review of applications from regional travel groups for approximately \$1.5 million in Idaho Regional Travel and Convention Grant funds.

Idaho's tourism development effort is funded by a 2 percent tax on hotels, motels and private campgrounds. Ten percent is used for administration, 45 percent is returned to the regions for local tourism promotion programs and the remaining 45 percent is used for statewide promotions. The Idaho Regional Travel and Convention Grant program was developed by the Idaho Travel Council in 1982 to enable regional travel committees, chambers of commerce and other non-profit travel oriented organizations to apply for funds to stimulate and expand

tourism in Idaho.

In other business, the council will finalize its Fiscal Year 1994 budget and hear a report from Elgin, Syferd Drake Communications on the 1994 media plan and Official Idaho Travel Guide.

The Idaho Travel Council is an eight-member advisory group appointed by Governor Cecil D. Andrus to provide guidance and policy direction to the tourism development activities of the Idaho Department of Commerce. Representatives serving on the Council include: Chairman Frogg Stewart, Grangeville; Vice Chairman Phil Murelaga, Boise; Lorraine Bowman, Sandpoint; Dixie Peterson, Boise; Randy Dill, Twin
