Students need insurance verification and health physicals and student activity cards before the first practice in order to participate in any extra-curricular activity. The district does not make student medical insurance available to families for their individual purchase. Forms may be obtained at the high school during any working day from 7:45 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. 
