Kendrick School Dist. 283 Announces Plans for Reduced and Free Lunches, Milk

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 today announced its policy for free and reduced priced meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price for meals and milk served under the National School Lunch Program. Each school and the office at Kendrick High School District Office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used in determining eligibility. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, or free milk, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available from the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: Names of all household members; the name and Social Security number of the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application; and the entire household income with the amount and source of the income received by each household member. The signature of the adult household member who signs the application certifies that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of free and

reduced price policy, Doug Harris, school board chairman, will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official(s) on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Doug Harris, Kendrick, Idaho, Phone 289-4622, for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household must contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown below.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for school meal or free milk benefits. If a household wishes to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes he/she has been discriminated against, he/she should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Ralph Baker, 76, Died August 6

Ralph W. Baker, a retired store manager, died of a heart attack Friday, Aug. 6, 1993, at Tri State Hospital in Clarkston. He was 76.

He was born June 14, 1917, at Deary to Harry O. and Winifred L. Tout Baker.

He grew up on Texas Ridge in the Deary-Bovill area, and attended Bovill High School.

He later moved to Headquarters, Idaho, where he went to work as a cook for a lumber crew that traveled on the North Fork of the Clearwater River by wigan in the Pierce and Headquarters, Idaho, areas.

He married Muriel Bergstrom in 1945 at Lewiston, and he went to work for Brantton's (later Emporium) at Lewiston.

The couple moved to Bend, Ore., in 1949, and he entered a partnership in the Harvey and Baker Department Store.

He later worked for department stores at Lewiston, Sious Falls, S. D., Eugene, Ore., and The Dalles, Oregon.

He enjoyed hunting and fishing in his younger years and after his retirement enjoyed gardening and reading.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Clarkston; two daughters, Penny Bosley of Clarkston and Becki Krutinger of The Dalles; a sister, Agnes Warn of Spokane; and three grandchildren.

At the family's request, cremation took place and no services were held.

The family suggests memorials be given to the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, P. O. Box 2472, Spokane, Wash. 99210-2472.

Grange Plans to Learn How Cities are Funded

With the help of Latah County Commissioner Dana Magnuson, Kendrick Grange is anticipating holding a public meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 17 at 7:00 p. m. to learn how small towns get the money they need to meet their budgets.

The plan is to have the county treasurer and city clerks of Kendrick and Juliaetta provide a primer on financing small town operations. Gerald Billington recently presented a similar primer on planning and zoning.

If this plan cannot be realized on such notice, then a back-up program on rural health care, with emphasis on attracting and retaining primary care providers, will be offered instead.

Two Hour Watering Set in Kendrick

It didn't take but a few days of hot, dry weather with residents beginning to sprinkle lawns and gardens for the effects to show on the city water system. The sudden increase in water consumption quickly drew down the reservoir and put pressure on the pumps. As a result the city has asked that residents limit watering periods to just two hours and that either early in the mornings or later in the evening.

The city is only using the odd-even day watering restrictions—odd number street addresses may water on Tuesday, Thursdays and Saturdays. Even numbers on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. No Sunday watering.

Coach Kevin Driskill has called for the first football meeting of the season Sunday evening, Aug. 15 at the high school. Anyone planning on playing football at KHS this season is required to attend, Driskill said.

Jerry Ramey of Lewis-Clark State College will be conducting a needs assessment workshop on Thursday, August 12, to determine the state of leadership development in our community. Latah Commissioners Support Highway 3 Improvements

At the recently public meetings conducted by the Idaho Transportation Board in this area the Latah County Commissioners added their support for the proposed improvement to that section of Highway 3 from Arrow Junction to Little Potlatch Creek. Commissioner Dana Magnuson, a member of the commission gave the Gazette a copy of the letter sent by the commission to Mike Mitchell a member of the Transportation Board.

Gentlemen:

We write in regard to proposed improvements on that section of Idaho State Highway 3 from Arrow Junction to Little Potlatch Creek. Although this section of highway is not within the boundaries of Latah County, its current extremely hazardous placement and condition has a profound effect on many of our southern Latah County constituents, especially residents of Kendrick and Juliaetta who must use this road in their daily lives.

As we have discussed in earlier correspondence with the Department, the volume of heavy truck traffic on highway 3, particularly chip and log trucks, has continued to increase. This presents particular problems on the narrow, winding, rough, and often rock-strewn stretch from the Little Potlatch to Arrow Junction.

Please consider this letter as our expression of deep concern regarding the efficiency and particularly the safety for public travel of the above-mentioned section of State Highway 3. We do not feel it is an overstatement to assert that additional lives are at risk with each day that this piece of road remains unimproved.

We urge you to take whatever measures are within your discretion to see that appropriate steps are taken to remedy this dangerous situation.

Chester Woody, 83, Passes August 3

Chester Baldwin Woody, a retired building contractor, died of cardiac arrest Tuesday afternoon, August 3, at Tri-State Convalescent Center in Clarkston after a brief illness.

The son of John Lonzo and Martha Baldwin Woody, he was born November 20, 1909, on American Ridge near Kendrick where he was raised. He graduated from Moscow High School and attended the University of Idaho for one year before it became necessary to return home to work on the family farm.

He married Irene Emma Gipson, the daughter of Milo and Bessie Gipson, on October 24, 1933, in Clarkston where they made their home and he began working as an apprentice carpenter. His wife died March 3, 1985.

Mr. Woody was a well-known and respected building contractor in the Valley. He retired from residential construction in the late 70s but continued remodeling and cabinetry work for many years thereafter. Among many projects were collection boxes for book drives and the model of the new Shriners Hospital in Spokane.

He was a member of the Calam Temple Shrine and its Oriental Band, 33rd degree member of the Scottish Rite, and a member of Vineland Chapter 84, Order of the Eastern Star, Royal Order of Jesters and Lewiston Elks Lodge, as well as Past Master of the Clarkston Masonic Lodge. He was Wagonmaster for the Shrine Food Caravan for many years.

He is survived by daughters Jeanette Woody of Clarkston and Carol Perez of Albany, Oregon; sisters Lois Tippett of Asotin and Lorraine Pattison of Spokane; two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Sisters Bessie Woody, Laura Woody, Ellen Ebsen and Gladys Flesherman, and brothers Claude, Kenneth, Ralph and Elgin died previously. Another sister was stillborn.

Cremation has taken place and a memorial service was held Aug. 6 at Merchant Funeral Home. The Masonic Lodge at Clarkston officiated.

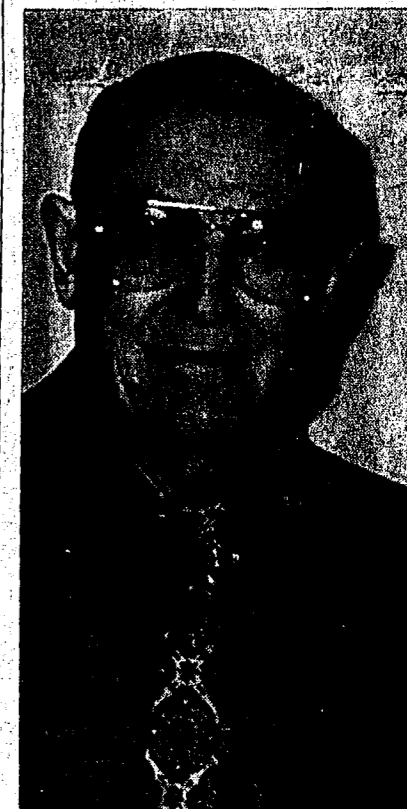

The school district does not provide medical insurance to automatically pay for medical expenses when students are injured at school. This is the responsibility of the parent or legal guardians. Students need insurance verification and health physicals and student activity cards before the first practice in order to participate in any extra-curricular activity. The district does not make student medical insurance available to families for their individual purchase. Forms may be obtained at the high school during any working day from 7:45 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.
