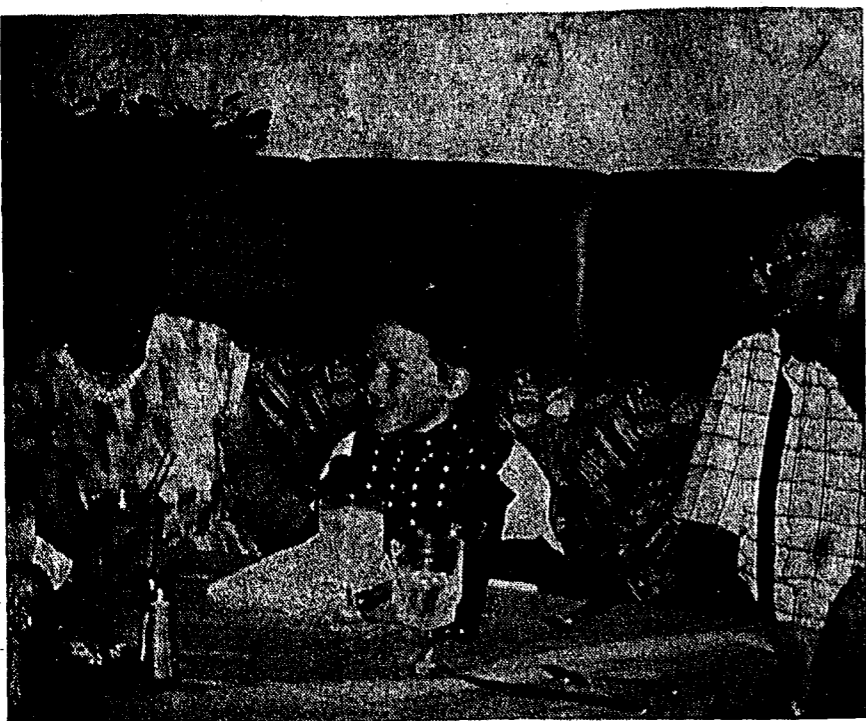

## Tigers Batter Troy 56-6 in Season Football Opener

It took the Tigers several minutes of play to get the rust worn off and find their pace, but they did and then proceeded to roll over the visiting Troy Trojans 56-6 Friday evening in the first football game of the season. The Tigers had trouble getting their offense into gear and the Trojans were playing tough ball for the first few minutes.

This was a league victory for the Tigers, now 1-0 on the young season, while Troy dropped to 0-2.

Josh Hudson put Kendrick on the score board late in the first quarter as he pushed across from six yards out. Craig Tefft passed to Tim Tanata for the 2 point conversion and the Tigers led 8-0 at the end of the first period.

In the second quarter the Tigers found their stride and rolled up 30 points on four touchdowns. Chad Heimgartner, a favorite target of Tefft's, scored on a pass play covering 25 yards and John Wegner added two more points on a run.

Tanata recovered a Troy fumble and scored from 5 yards to make the score 22-0 after the running attempt for the extra points failed.

Again it was Tanata scoring for the Tigers this time after hauling in a pass from Tefft good for 32 yards and six points. John Wegner ran across for the extra points.

Again Wegner scored for the KHS team on a 34 yard run and Corey Meyer added the extra points on a run.

The Tigers took a 38-0 lead into the half.

Mike Arnett scored for the Tigers early in the third quarter, breaking through the Trojan line at the 38 and scoring. The Tigers could have ended the game on the 45-point rule after that tally, but the passing attempt for the extra point didn't work and the game continued.

Troy finally got on the board after Arnett's touchdown with Sean Sullivan taking the kickoff 84 yards back for the touchdown, the only points the Trojans put up on the board that evening. Their run try for the extra points failed.

Jody Mitchell of the Tigers had a 45-yard touchdown called back in the third. The Tigers were plagued by this all the game and had four touchdowns called back and nullified by infractions.

John Wegner scored again for his Tiger team on a 20-yard run and the pass attempt for extra points failed. John Hudson ended the game with a 14-yard rumble up the middle with 1:48 left on the clock in the third quarter.

The Tigers travel to Highland this Saturday for a 1:00 p. m. game with the Huskies.

A Grievance Procedure has been adopted for citizens who feel they have been discriminated against on the basis of disability.

An employee has been designated by the City of Kendrick to assist citizens with this process. The designated employee is Lynne Bruce and can be contacted at 289-5157 or 808 Railroad Street.

The Grievance Procedure contains an appeals process and method for filing complaints and timely resolution of complaints.

Confidentiality is available to all citizens.

Citizens need not give their name in order to receive information about their situation and anti-discrimination laws. If it appears the individual is a victim of illegal discrimination, the designated employee will discuss the various options which are available to resolve the complaint.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: that Section 1 of Ordinance No. 637 be, and the same is amended to read as follows:

A. Each account unless otherwise specified shall be charged a monthly rate of \$10.00.

B. Beauty parlors, cafes, taverns, meat markets, frozen food lockers, and laundries shall be charged a monthly rate of \$20.00.

C. Public schools shall be charged a monthly rate of \$87.50.

D. All rates and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

E. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$1.50 per month.

F. Churches, lodges, and civic organizations shall be charged a monthly rate of \$6.25.

G. The City may require a deposit of \$50 to insure payment of accounts.

Section 2: That the foregoing rates, fees, and charges for sewer services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of October, 1993.

Section 3: That all other ordinances, regulations and rates for the sewer system shall remain in full force and effect.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Kendrick deems it in the public interest to increase water rates to a level which will permit water revenues to equal the amounts needed for water service and improvements;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Ordinance 638, Section 2 be, and the same hereby

Section 2: That the following monthly rates fees, and charges for water services are hereby fixed and shall be paid effective the first day of October 1993:

A. Each account shall be charged a monthly fee of \$6 dedicated to the Bond Reserve Fund. All other charges shall be in to this fee.

B. Minimum Rate: Consumption of 0 to 4,000 gallons and the minimum rate for unmetered services shall be \$13.00 per month.

C. The charge for gallons used above and beyond 4,000 gallons shall be \$1.00 per thousand gallons or fraction thereof, for residential purposes, the following coverage fees will apply:

30,001 to 40,000 gallons	\$1.50 per thousand gallons
40,001 to 50,000 gallons	\$2.00 per thousand gallons
50,001 to 60,000 gallons	\$2.50 per thousand gallons
60,001 to 70,000 gallons	\$3.00 per thousand gallons
70,001 to 80,000 gallons	\$3.50 per thousand gallons
80,001 to 90,000 gallons	\$4.00 per thousand gallons
90,001 to 100,000 gallons	\$4.50 per thousand gallons
100,001 plus gallons	\$5.00 per thousand gallons.

D. For unmetered non-residential services, the City Council reserves the right to charge a rate representative of water similar to non-residential uses utilized in other cities.

E. All rate and charges shall be paid before the 25th day of each month.

F. Past due accounts shall include an additional penalty and service fee of \$50 per month. Past due accounts shall also be charged 1.5% interest per month on the unpaid balance of the account.

G. The City may require utility customers to pay a deposit of \$50.00 to insure payment of all utility accounts.

Section 4: The rates and fees imposed by this ordinance shall be effective the first day of October, 1993. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.

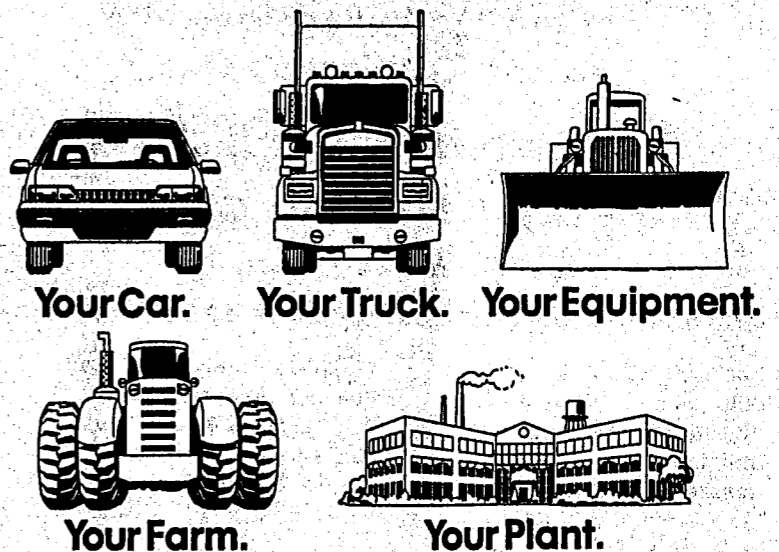
