Tests to be Given At KHS Next Month

Many juniors and some sophomores are preparing to take the PSAT/NMSQT (Pre-college achievement test, also known as the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test). This is a good practice test to help students see where their strengths are and where they might want to work harder in school prior to taking the actual college entrance exams. The PSAT also gives students the opportunity to indicate interests, thus initiating a flow of information from colleges offering the specific course of study as indicated by the student. The PSAT will be given at Kendrick High School on Oct. 12th at the high school from 8:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. Each sophomore or junior wishing to take the test should sign up by paying \$7.00 at the high school office before Oct. 12. (Note: the use of computers will be allowed this year, but not required).

Seniors are encouraged to take the American College TEST (ACT) if they have plans to attend any 4-year college. ACT test dates (registration deadlines in parentheses) are October 23 (Sept. 23) and December 11 (Nov. 10). The SAT is also offered October 9 (Sept. 10), Nov. 6 (Oct. 1), and Dec. 4 (Oct. 29). Most colleges accept the results of either test for many eastern colleges. Seniors must complete registration and send in money for processing and forwarding of scores to colleges by the proper deadlines. Registration packets can be obtained from Mrs. Kirkham or picked up in the high school office.

Students of Kendrick High School (and their parents) should be aware that the Career Information System (CIS) is available on computer for those wanting specific information on scholarships, colleges, occupations or other topics. Scholarship information can also be viewed on the scholarship board at the high school. Parents/students should be aware that many scholarship search companies prey on seniors at this time in their educational life. Students often receive mailings or phone calls promising to find college money in the form of grants or scholarships. Any of the scholarship search service that charge a fee (from \$10 to \$150) should be suspect. At best, they are equivalent to our own CIS scholarship search capabilities, and their "guarantees" are questionable.

Parenting Class Considered

A parenting class is being considered for parents in the Juliaetta-Kendrick area. Systematic Training for Effective Parenting (STEP) will be used during the 6-8 weeks. STEP is designed to help parents relate more effectively to their children. The class will be facilitated by Mrs. Kirkham, school counselor / school psychologist, and Mrs. Fredenburg, from Juliaetta Elementary School. Parents are asked to contact the school to help decide what day of the week and/or what time of day to hold the sessions. Kendrick Bombs Colton 66-20

Kendrick's Tigers wasted little time establishing its superiority over the Colton Wildcats Friday night at Colton as they rolled up 36 points in the first half on the way to a 66-20 win in a game cut short in the final quarter via the 45-point rule. This was the 3rd win in as many starts for the Tigers.

The Tigers scored the first three times they had possession of the ball. Craig Tefft got the scoring underway first passing to Chad Heimgartner a play covering 87 yards. The extra point try run failed.

Colton answered that touchdown with one of their own on a 14-yard pass to Damon Buck from Tom Truong. The Wildcats successfully ran over the extra point try and the Wildcats led 8-6.

Then Kendrick closed the door with Josh Hudson running 47 yards for a touchdown and Cory Meyer running the conversion. Heimgartner gathered in a punt and took it back 81 yards for another score. The next Tiger score came on a Tefft to Heimgartner pass good for 56 yards and Cory Meyer added two more points with a pass from Tefft.

Chad scored again in the second quarter on a 46 yard run and this time Jody Mitchell ran over the extra points.

Colton scored its second touchdown with Damon Buck running 6 yards to tally.

In the second half Tai Anderson crossed over the Wildcat goal on a two yard run and Meyer ran over the conversion. Steve Hill scored for Tigers next going 1 yard after catching a pass from Nick Silflow. Mitchell ran over the extra points.

Colton scored in the final quarter on a pass from Truong to Jamey Morrison.

Josh Hudson broke loose and ran 53 yards for a Tiger tally and Mitchell ran over the conversion.

Finally, with 7:18 left in the last quarter Mitchell packed the ball in from 13 yards out to end the game.

The Tigers will be back home this Friday night hosting the visiting Cambridge team in a 7:00 o'clock game.

There fore, no hunting, trapping, or harassment of wildlife is allowed at any of the park sites including the White Bird Battlefield Site (12 mi. south of Grangeville on Highway 95), Spalding Site, and the Heart of the Monster, east of Kamiah.

Each of the park units have been posted with boundary and "No Hunting or Trapping" signs. Please respect these regulations for others who wish to enjoy the park's resources and the historical heritage of this region.

Kendrick to Vote on Mayor, 2 Councilmen Tuesday, Nov. 2

The City of Kendrick will hold an election Tuesday, November 2, to vote on the positions of mayor and two councilmen. The terms of incumbent mayor Jerry L. Brown, and councilmen David Klatt and Mike Boe are expiring at the end of December. All positions are for terms of four years. Both Brown and Boe have indicated they may seek re-election, but Klatt will not seek another term.

Holdover councilmen are Darrel Brocke and Rita Blewett.

All interested parties may obtain a petition of nomination to declare their candidacy at the City Clerk's office. The petition must be filed with the City Clerk before October 5, 1993. An eligible candidate must be a qualified elector of the City at the time of nomination and remain a qualified elector during the term of office.

Voters may register at the City Clerk's office or with the precinct registrar, Wally Butler, at 602 E. Main. Wally will only be able to accept registrations until October 15th. However, the County and City Clerk's offices can register through 8 p. m. on Friday, October 22. Both City and County offices will be open continuously until 8 p. m. on October 22 to register voters.

Joint City/County registration is new for this election. It means that if you voted in the last general election for President, you are registered to vote in the city.

You must live in the City limits, be at least 18 years of age, a citizen of the United States, a resident of the City for 30 days preceding the election date (Nov. 2) to register and to vote.

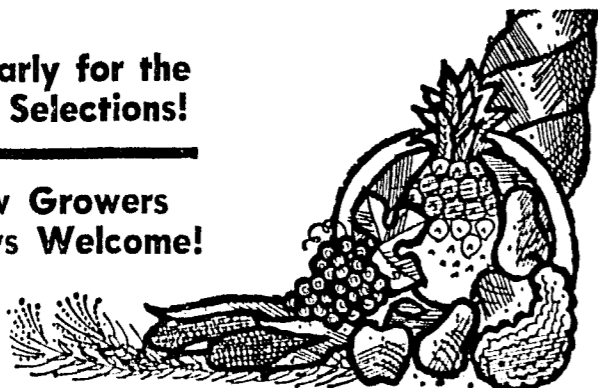

Editor:

It was 1968, Northern British Columbia, near Kruegar Lake. Lou Fay, from Orofino, Idaho, was quietly making his way through a brushy area in search of moose. Sudden, an enraged grizzly charged from the brush less than 30 feet away. Unknowingly Lou had interrupted the 800-lb. giant with its freshly killed supper. Only quick thinking and an accurately placed bullet kept him from becoming the second course. The fearsome, raging animal dropped less than 16 feet away.

The grizzly was just defending his supper and the man was just walking through the forest. Luckily, Lou had his rifle. If this had been you and your family on a camping trip or out backpacking, the result would have been much different. Now, people think nothing of wandering unarmed through our forests. If these animals are re-introduced, no one will be safe.

Grizzlies are being re-introduced into our state under the Endangered Species Act. Why? They're not an endangered specie. Alaska and Canada both have large populations and an annual hunting season. What we have is the Idaho version of the Spotted Owl being shoved down our throats. Very large portions of Idaho are already being proposed as grizzly recovery areas, large areas that will be closed to timber harvest and probably hunting.

John Shuler of Dupuyer, Montana killed a grizzly in self-defense, on his own property, while trying to stop four of them from killing his sheep. He was jailed and fined heavily. An administrative judge also ruled then, that when a grizzly is killed, the same criminal investigation would apply as in the death of a human. But several hundred miles farther north you can legally hunt and kill grizzlies. Is there something wrong with this picture?
