Idaho Housing Agency has \$1 Million In Home Improvement Funds for Latah, NP.

The Idaho Housing Agency launched a special demonstration Home Improvement Loan program in Latah and Nez Perce counties on Friday, October 1.

IHA estimates it will help approximately 100 homeowners in the area to afford much needed repairs to their homes. Approximately \$1 million in Home Improvement Loan funds will be made available for this test-market program by IHA which will be administered by First Security Bank of Idaho.

Under the terms of the Home Improvement Loan program, Latah and Nez Perce county residents who own their own homes and who qualify under IHA's income limits for low and moderate-income borrowers can

apply for a 6.5 percent below-market interest rate loan to help them make essential home maintenance repairs.

Homeowners may apply for loans ranging between \$5,000 and \$15,000 for needed improvements. Qualifying homeowners may choose loan repayment terms of from 5 to 15 years.

"In a recent housing survey conducted by the Agency, we found that home maintenance was one of the top concerns among Idahoans throughout the state," said Robert E. Reed, Jr., IHA vice president of real estate lending. "We are offering this program to the residents of Latah and Nez Perce counties initially, with plans to take the program statewide as more funds become available."

Those interested in the IHA Home Improvement Loan program should contact their local First Security Bank representative in any First Security branch in Latah or Nez Perce county, or the Idaho Housing Agency's main office in Boise at (800) 327-0261.

The Idaho Housing Agency is a nonprofit, self-supporting corporation which uses no state funds or tax dollars to support its operation.

Facts About the Program
What is the name of this program?
It is called the "5-15 Home Improvement Loan Program," because of the loan amounts and the repayment terms.

What are the loan amounts available through this program?
The minimum loan amount is \$5,000, the maximum loan is \$15,000. What are the repayment terms of these loans?
Loan terms are from 5-years to 15-years.

What is the interest rate?
The interest rate is 6.5 percent. Who qualifies for these loans?
Persons living in Nez Perce or Latah counties who meet IHA's income limits are qualified.

What are those income limits?
In Nez Perce County a one or two person household can earn as much as \$35,400; a family of three or more can earn \$40,710. In Latah County, a one or two person household can earn \$35,100 while a household with three or more can earn as much as \$40,365. These limits are set by the federal government.

Are there other limits or restrictions?
Loans will be made only for qualified improvements, repairs or rehabilitation of owner-occupied single-family homes.

Why is this program limited only to Nez Perce and Latah Counties?
IHA is using this area as a test market for this program. We have a branch Office in this area which will assist us in evaluating this program before we expand it to other areas.

Tigers Rip Deary 44-14

Sport fans thought the clash between the Kendrick High School Tigers and the Deary Mustangs would be a tough, close match pitting two of the best eight-man teams in the state against each other at Deary last Friday night. Tough it was, but close it wasn't—the unbeaten Tigers rolled to a 44-14 win and handed the previously unbeaten Mustangs their first loss of the season.

Coach Kevin Driskill had thought before the game that Deary hadn't been accustomed to playing tough four-quarter full length contests and he had thought correctly. The Tigers kept the pressure up all four quarters and in the second half the Mustangs began to wear down.

The Tigers put the Mustangs in the hole on the opening kick off as Chad Helmgartner took the ball on his own twenty and went 80 yards for a score. Taj Anderson ran over the extra points and KHS was ahead 8-0 with the game barely seconds old.

In the second quarter John Wegner scored from 5 yards out after the Tigers had moved within the 10. Josh Hudson packed the conversion try over.

Deary is a good, strong team and they scored in the second quarter on a 1 yard run by Johnny Morris, but could not convert.

Kendrick was doing an excellent defensive job and held both Josh Anderson and Morris to a combined 193 yards on 33 carries for only an average of 5.8 yards per carry. In all Deary managed only 239 yards of total offense.

Deary came out fired up for the second half and took the kickoff 80 yards with Wade Latta carrying the ball. Latta also took a pass from Ryan Holden for the extra points and closed the close to 22-14. Deary's touchdown run came after Kendrick scored on a 1 yard run by Anderson.

Kendrick answered that Deary touchdown in two plays with Wegner going the final 38 yards. Brian Siflow rounded out the third quarter with a 48-yard pass from Craig Tefft. Anderson ran over the conversion.

Sturdy Josh Hudson contributed the final touchdown in the fourth quarter with a 35 yard run and Anderson added the final two points taking a pass from Holden.

Alford Touts Growth of Quad Cities Area

Citing the fact that the quad cities area, with an average household income of \$43,349, attracts over 85% of the retail sales in the region, Lewiston Morning Tribune publisher A. L. "Butch" Alford last week touted the need for regional cooperation in economic development efforts. "We are in the middle of unprecedented growth," he said, and that demands regional planning.

Speaking before a general membership luncheon of the Moscow-Latah County Economic Development Council in Moscow last Wednesday, Alford cited statistics for the cities of Lewiston, Clarkston, Moscow, and Pullman, figures that for Alford add up to the need for the leaders of the region to begin working together now for growth. The rural towns, Alford declared, will not grow. He made no reference to the potential effect of trading center growth on the economic life of small towns such as Kendrick and Juliaetta.

Having put the question to quad cities leaders, "Is regional cooperation worth the effort?" Alford report their responses were positive and their suggested programs of action geared to responding to the challenge now. Several leaders called for regional meetings of economic development professionals. As one put it, "The right people must sit down together," and in another leader's view that means the President of the U. of I. the mayors of the cities, and the economic development professionals.

Specific goals suggested include combining the port authorities, improving Highway 95, providing for regional bus service and for solid waste management. Alford, arguing that communication is essential, feels that having knowledge of what people are thinking will be beneficial in the process of planning for change. He pledged his support of any quad cities organization that will undertake this function.

Present at the luncheon as a representative of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association Frank Jacobson listened to Alford's remarks with interest and some concern. Interest because of the emphasis on the regional approach, which Jacobson has long promoted, and concern because of what he considers to be an over-emphasis on the part professionals play in economic development. (Professionals, most of whom have academic degrees, earn their living in the areas of planning and development.) Jacobson is also concerned over the seeming indifference to the problem of maintaining the life of the small towns in the region.

Jacobson, while no development professional himself, has seen the important part played by Gem Community volunteers, amateurs all, who have not only learned how to guide development on the local scene but have also contributed to the development of the Clearwater Economic Development Association's overall economic development plan for 1993-94—and sometimes in the absence of some of the very elected officials and professionals in whom Alford puts so much trust.

Jacobson, who also serves on the business recruitment committee of the Moscow-Latah County EDC, fully intends to make his views heard at their next meeting.
