David Clayton, Retired Pharmacist, Passes October 4

David H. Clayton, a retired Kendrick pharmacist, community and church leader, and friend and trusted advisor to many, died Monday, at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane of complications following surgery.



He had been a pharmacist at the Red Cross Pharmacy at Kendrick from about 1955 until October 1992. He bought the pharmacy in 1972.

Clayton was born Dec. 8, 1922, at Rupert, Idaho, to Willis Burdette and Ruth Treiber Clayton. He grew up in the Rupert area and graduated from Aecqua High School at Aecqua, Idaho in 1940.

He attended Idaho State College at Pocatello from 1941 to 1945, then served in the Merchant Marine until 1947. He then returned to Idaho State and graduated in 1948 with a degree in pharmacy.

He moved to Kendrick that year and taught school on a permit for a year.

He and Barbara Jean Perry were married there Sept. 11, 1949. In 1954 they moved to Ketchikan, Alaska, where he worked in a drug store for a year before returning to Kendrick.

He worked at the drug store there, then became a partner and finally bought the pharmacy in 1972. He sold his interest last year to his son, Douglas E. Clayton.

He was a member of the Zion Lutheran Church at Juliaetta. He had served on the Kendrick City Council and the school board and had been active in Cub Scouts while his sons were members.

He also was a member and past master of Kendrick Lodge No. 26, AF&AM, and a member and past patron of Canyon Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star.

Survivors include his wife at the family home in Kendrick; three sons, Douglas E. Clayton of Juliaetta, Standish Clayton of Nampa, and Raymond Charles Clayton of Tucson, Arizona; and three grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Walter E. Clayton.

Services were held Friday morning at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with the Rev. Robert Kenyon officiating.

Burial was at the Kendrick City Cemetery.

The family suggests memorials be made, if desired, to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund, care of Jim Hoogland, Kendrick, ID, 83537.

Jac. H. Richardson Passes October 10

Jacquelyn Hope Richardson beloved wife and faithful co-pastor with her husband, Pastor Estel D. C. Richardson of Fillmore, Calif., died of complications from hepatitis while visiting at her mother's home in Lewiston, Idaho, October 10, 1993. She was 66.



She was born to Caus and Nora Clark, July 3, 1927, on Fix Ridge, six miles from Juliaetta, Idaho.

While attending Juliaetta High School she participated in many activities including the school paper and the band. She attended the University of Idaho with a music major. On June 5, 1944, she married Estel D. C. Richardson, a pilot in the Navy Air Corps. Following her husband's release to inactive duty from the Navy, they worked with his father in the real estate business. When her husband was impressed that God wanted him to be a minister, she enthusiastically encouraged him. Even though she had two children and a home to care for while he was in college she became actively involved in singing in the Walla Walla college choir, leading out in the Theology Wives' Association and encouraging other students' wives through her counsel and example.

When her husband graduated and began his pastorate ministry she outstandingly fulfilled the difficult tasks of being a minister's wife, mother, teacher-counselor of both youth and adults while organizing and supervising church activities. Although she never had the official title of co-pastor, she contributed more to her husband's ministry than any of the many assistant and associate pastors he had.

She was dearly loved and appreciated in every church her husband pastored. She was "mother" to every congregation whether it was located in Salem, Oregon, the Cedar Creek District in Washington, Beaverton-Hillsboro, Oregon, Milton-State Line, Blue Mountain Valley churches in Oregon, The Charleston Church in West Virginia, Baltimore First and Towson churches in Maryland, and Martinsburg-Charles Town churches in West Virginia.

Although illness prevented her from physically attending church for the past 12 years, her ministry continued. She mailed letters and cards, made phone calls, sent little notes of appreciation and encouragement to those in need.

She was an avid student and researcher. She especially enjoyed family history and encouraged others to become interested in their family history.

Each year she prepared a "Christmas Letter" and mailed hundreds of them to present and former church members, relatives, and friends. This kept her circle of influence constantly expanding.

The survivors include her husband, her mother, Nora Clark of Lewiston, Idaho; a daughter Jacquelyn Ziegler, of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; a son Estel of Fillmore, Calif.; a foster daughter, Maureen Stanciu of Richmond, Oregon; six grandchildren and one great-grandson.

Services were held Wednesday, October 13 at 200 in the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Lewiston with pastors Richard Fearing and Ron Schultz officiating.

The Kendrick Tigers went to Troy last Friday night and cruised to a 66-16 win over the Trojans to keep the winning streak going up to 5-0 in league and 6-0 on the season.

Fullback Josh Hudson led the way with four touchdowns and was one of four players to score as the Tigers pounded the ball into the end zone 10 times that evening.

Tiger coach Kevin Driskill cleared his bench in the one-sided contest and every player on the team saw action. The use of reserves kept the game going until late in the fourth.

Kendrick rolled up 35 points in the first half to hold a 35-8 lead at halftime.

John Wegner's 66 yard run in the first quarter started the Tiger barrage of points. Phillip Brown kicked the extra point.

Chad Heimgartner took a pass from Craig Tefft and went 38 yards for the next KHS score and again it was Brown who drilled the extra point kick.

After the Tigers had moved the ball inside the Trojan 10 John Hudson packed it over from the seven in the second quarter and Brown kicked the extra point.

Taj Anderson went 15 yards for the Tiger's next score and Brown's extra point try failed.

Hudson racked up his second score of the game with a 25 yard run and Brian Sillflow passed to Tim Tanata for the two-point conversion.

Troy got on the scoreboard then with Travis Hazeltine scoring from 13 yards out and Frank Peterson ran for the conversion.

In the third quarter, the Tefft to Heimgartner combination clicked again on a play covering 90 yards. Phil Brown kicked his third successful extra point.

Hudson scored again in the third with a 16 yard run and Brown drilled the extra point.

Troy scored its second and final touchdown of the game in the fourth quarter on an 80 yard run by Jason Heath and Frank Peterson added two more points.

Kendrick then proceeded to end the game early with 3 unanswered touchdowns. Hudson went 16 yards, and Brown kicked the extra point. Heimgartner intercepted a Troy pass and scored 4 yards in to score and John Wegner closed out the game with a 10 yard run.
