Ron Morgan's Whitetail Deer Is in the Idaho Record Books

The large whitetail deer killed by Ron Morgan of Kendrick last year is featured in the magazine "Rocky Mountain Fish & Game" and has also placed sixth in the all-time record book for nontypical whitetail. The deer's rack, 13 points on one side and 12 on the other, scored 227 points by the Boone and Crockett method of counting, which the state uses.

Ron, 19 years old, is the son of Dave and Shirley Morgan of Kendrick.

Ron, who was hunting with his dad, shot the whitetail south of Kendrick, with a 30-06 rifle given to him by his grandfather Boyd Eberhardt of Lewiston.

It had been a rainy, foggy hunt for Ron and Dave that Sunday and Ron got only one shot before the animal disappeared from sight. Ron thought he'd missed, but when he got to the spot he thought the deer had been he noticed a piece of hair and after doing some tracking, found the deer dead with a lung shot.

With some help from his Dad, Ron brought the deer out on a 4-wheeler. The animal dressed out at 165 pounds.

Bagging that big a deer was a thrill of lifetime for young Morgan, but he gathered in another honor. His aunt Sertrice Linkhart of Boise had a photograph of the rack enlarged and placed with Ron's photo. Gov. Cecil D. Andrus saw the photo and had an even greater enlargement made and hung in the State Capitol building. Gov. Andrus was gracious and thoughtful enough to send Ron a copy of the photo.

At the time he made the kill, Ron was a student at LCSC. He is now employed at Mac's Cycle in Lewiston.

Horace M. Barber, Father Of Betty Watts-Bell Passes September 28

Horace M. Barber 87, Coeur d'Alene, died of congestive heart failure Tuesday, Sept. 28, 1993, at his home.

He was born in Grimsby, England, on September 10, 1906. He moved to Coeur d'Alene when he was six years old.

Marilyn F. Cuddy, Gazette News Editor, Passes Oct. 14

Marilyn Ferol Cuddy, a Juliaetta resident and homemaker for most of her life, died of liver failure Friday, October 14, 1993, at the University of Washington Medical Center in Seattle where she had been a patient since Sept. 19. She was 51 years old.

In addition to maintaining the family home in Juliaetta, she was a parttime postal clerk at the Juliaetta post office since 1970 and had been associated with the Kendrick Gazette since the summer of 1970. She was the news editor of the Gazette at the time of her final illness.

Marilyn was born May 9, 1942 at Lewiston, to Walter and June Parks Zumhove. She grew up on Stonypoint and attended Lapwai Elementary School for a few years before transferring into the Kendrick School District and graduated from Kendrick High School in 1960 where she was an active, popular student and was a cheerleader.

Following graduation she attended Lewis-Clark College in Lewiston until she married James R. Cuddy on July 14, 1961, at Coeur d'Alene. They made their home in Juliaetta and with the exception of a short time in Montana, have lived there since. She was a member and active participant in the Zion Lutheran Church.

In 1970 she began work at the Gazette, first as a folder and mailer on Wednesday and then in 1975 became news editor. Going about her job collecting local news in Kendrick and Juliaetta, she became a welcome weekly voice to dozens of subscribers. Much of a small weekly newspaper's success and acceptance by the community depends upon its readers trust and respect. That was never a problem with Marilyn working the desk: her kind and gentle manner, her vivacious personality and her honest caring for the people she knew made her a welcome weekly visitor.

She enjoyed traveling, shopping, dining out and spending time with her family, especially her grandchildren Tess, Seth and Sam, and Zack.

Surviving to mourn her passing are her husband, Jim, at the family home in Juliaetta; a son Mitchell, his wife Pam and their son Zack of Lewiston; two daughters, Ferris June Robertson, and husband Ed; and their children Tess, Seth and Sam of Peck Kristen Leanne Bumgarner and her husband John of Boise; her father, Walter Zumhove of Kendrick; a good friend, Betty Cowger, Kendrick; four brothers, Arnie Zumhove of Kendrick, Daryl Zumhove of Kennewick, Wash., Von Zumhove of Lewiston, and Nels Cedars of Seattle; her grandmother, Katherine Parks of Pullman, and her step-father, Ed Cedars, also of Pullman.

The service was held Wednesday, October 20 at 10:30 at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Robert Kenyon of Zion Lutheran Church at Juliaetta officiating.

Organist was Marie L. Jones. Singers were Amy Lohman and Bonnie Lawrence who sang "Whispering Hope" and "Peace in the Valley".

Casket bearers were Jack Brown, Dennis Proctor, Ed Robertson, Ed Corkill, Marlin Israel, and John Bumgarner.

Honorary bearers were: Bill Roth, Ben Carpenter, Bruce Sherman, Gordon Bunch, Don Millard and Fred Lohman.

Burial was at the Juliaetta City Cemetery.

Hundreds of family, relatives and friends filled the chapel of Brower-Wann in Lewiston Wednesday morning to say goodbye to, and celebrate the life of Marilyn Cuddy, whose long, gallant battle ended last Friday. Rev. Robert Kenyon of Zion Lutheran Church delivered a most beautifully eloquent and comforting message, drawing heavily from the Sermon on the Mount as recorded in the Book of Matthew.

To celebrate the life and remember Marilyn is so very easy. She was such a sweet, kind and caring person that one wishes everyone could have the privilege of knowing and being her friend. She was a joy to work with at the Gazette. If this paper can be called a success, much of that success is owed to Marilyn. Her friendly manner, her humor, her cheerfulness and genuine caring, made all who came in contact with her feel trusting and confident. When I was alone at the Gazette, it wasn't unusual to have someone call and ask for her. When I would offer to help, I'd get the reply, "No, I'll just wait until Marilyn gets back."

No family has ever had a more loyal and devoted wife and mother than the Cuddy family found in Marilyn. Even with her work at the post office and the Gazette, there was never a doubt that her family came first—always. And it must be noted that the family returned that love and loyalty in full measure.

It's never a good thing to start listing names because you always forget someone, but it's impossible to write of Marilyn's world without acknowledging the love and caring of Carolyn, Sally, Doris, Opal, Marlene, Donna, Linda, and Paula. Their tears of compassion and concern were, and are, a testament to friendship.

The memory of Marilyn Cuddy will be different, of course, to everyone. To me, I'll always think of two important lessons she left us all: with a kind and gentle nature, a cheerful disposition, and strong moral and religious convictions, she taught us how to live. And, finally, at the end, with faith, courage and dignity, she taught us how to die.

Give, But Give Wisely, Is Post Office Advice

An invitation to participate in a sweepstakes and simultaneously support a worthy cause is potent motivation to send in a check. In fact, it's such a successful method of legitimate fund raising that crooks have adopted it, using misleading letters to further their schemes.

Postmasters Sharon Harris of Kendrick and Ben Carpenter of Juliaetta say there is no simple way for consumers to distinguish between a legitimate sweepstakes and one that is misleading. They offer these recommendations from the Postal Inspection Service:

- Read the solicitation carefully, including the small print. The prize may not be what you were led to believe.
- If you receive a solicitation by phone, don't give out your credit card number to unknown callers.
- If you have questions about what a charity is doing with its contributions, ask before you give.

If you live in a state that requires charities to file annual reports, you may wish to obtain copies. The Philanthropic Advisory Service of the Better Business Bureau, 4200 Wilson Boulevard, Arlington, VA 22203-1800 maintains a voluntary system to determine whether particular charities meet guidelines for responsible solicitation practices.

Normally, the term 'sweepstakes' denotes a contest where a prize is awarded based upon chance," the Postmasters said. "Participants are not required to pay a fee in order to be eligible to win. If some kind of payment is required to enter, or it is not made clear that a payment or purchase is not required, the contest is actually a 'lottery' and the mailing of matter concerning it and the receipt by mail of money or property to participate in it is unlawful under federal, criminal, and civil statutes." "Unscrupulous 'charitable sweepstakes' promoters attempt to hoodwink potential contributors into believing they have won a significant prize. Although the scheme may yield easy money for the promoters, it won't last forever. Ultimately the Postal Service or some other agency forces the promoters to drastically change their ways or go out of business."

"Here's our best advice to consumers: 'Give, but give wisely,'" say Harris and Carpenter.

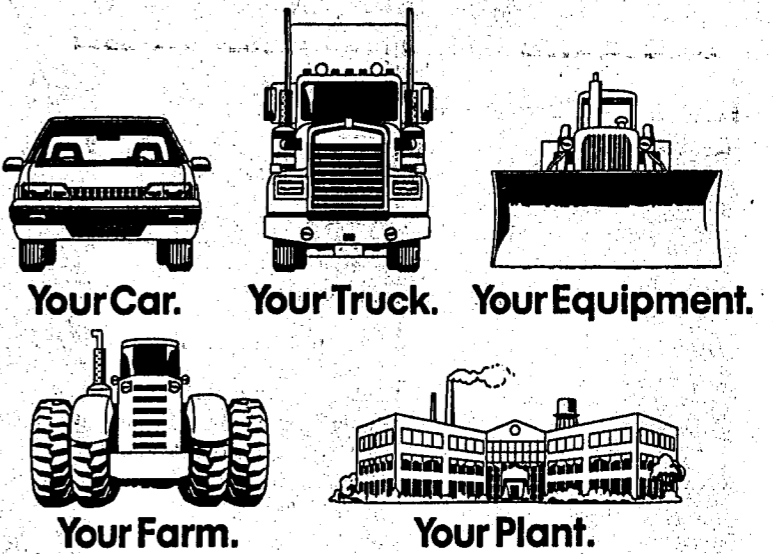
