Navy Airman Deyette Shipping to Somalian Waters

Navy Airman Recruit Wayne L. Deyette, son of Mary E. Mathews of Juliaetta is deploying to Somalia aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Guadalcanal, homeported in Norfolk, Virginia.

Deyette's ship is joining other U. S. forces ordered to Somalia in response to recent hostile actions against American and other military personnel there. Naval forces being sent to Somalia include the aircraft carrier USS Abraham Lincoln and the guided missile destroyer USS Chandler; the USS Guadalcanal's three-ship Amphibious Ready Group (ARG) with the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) embarked; and the four-ship USS New Orleans ARG with the 13th MEU embarked. Each MEU has more than 1800 Marines.

The USS Guadalcanal ARG was operating in the Mediterranean when the redeployment was ordered; USS Abraham Lincoln was in the Persian Gulf; and the USS New Orleans ARG was in the South China Sea.

This redeployment demonstrates the flexibility and mobility of naval forces. The Navy and Marine Corps are full partners in joint operations and can operate overseas to respond swiftly to crises in distant lands, from the sea.

Appointments are currently being taken for Fuel Assistance for low-income citizens in Idaho for Nez Perce, Clearwater, and Lewis and Clark counties. For Washington, Asotin county, appointments will be taken November 15.

Households that meet the income eligibility guidelines may possibly receive a benefit payment that is meant to assist with winter heating costs.

Each applicant (both states) must furnish proof of social security numbers, income for the past three months or 90 days, proof of residence and heat source for everyone living in the household. Note: In previous years Idaho has required income for the past month or 30 days only, this is the first year that 3 months or 90 days is required.

Applications are taken by appointment only.

City Elections Tuesday, Nov. 2

Residents of both Juliaetta and Kendrick will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 2, to vote in municipal elections. Kendrick will vote on the office of mayor and two councilmen. Juliaetta citizens will choose three councilmen.

In Kendrick, incumbent mayor Jerry L. Brown is unopposed in his bid for another four year term. Also unopposed for terms of four years are incumbent Mike Boe and newcomer Harold Ellis, who is seeking the position being vacated by Dave Klatt, who declined another term.

In Juliaetta, three council seats will be filled. Incumbents Stephanie Paffle and Keith Ford are unopposed in their bids for four year terms. Both Paffle and Ford were appointed to their positions and have never stood for election.

Three newcomers are seeking the two year term on the Juliaetta Council. Debra Harris, Rick Steigers, and Candy Holsington seek the position now held by Bruce Spang, who declined to seek another term.

Kendrick voters will cast their ballots at Senior Citizens Center (behind the Drug Store and Phil's Food City). Polls will open at 12 noon and remain open until 8 o'clock that evening.

Juliaetta voters will vote at the City Hall. Polls open at 12 noon and remain open until 8 o'clock that evening.

More a Write-In Candidate—

After the above story was written late Tuesday night, it was learned that Kay Morey will be a "write-in" candidate for one of the two council seats in Kendrick. It is understood that Mrs. Morey had decided to seek a position on the council, but because of other business, failed to file her petition in time to appear on the printed ballot.

Her name may be written in the space provided on the ballot. Since there are two positions open and now there are three candidates, the two persons receiving the most votes will be declared winners.
