A. C. Wilson, Area's Only Surviving World War I Veteran, to be Honored Nov. 11

Alonzo C. Wilson, a charter member of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Kendrick's only surviving veteran of World War I, will be presented with a special medal minted for the 75th anniversary of World War I living veterans to honor their distinguished service. The medal will be presented at ceremonies at the Kendrick City Park at 12:30 Thursday, Nov. 11, by U. S. Navy Commander Nan B. Dupuy, Executive Officer from the Naval ROTC unit at the University of Idaho.

Now a retired Big Bear Ridge farmer, 1st Class Fireman Wilson went to boot camp at what was known as Goat Island, now known as Treasure Island, out of San Francisco, Calif. After boot camp, Seaman Wilson went across country to the east coast assigned to the battleship U. S. S. Kentucky for a short period of time working in the well-known place called the "mess hall." The Navy finally realized that this sailor wasn't trained to serve food, "he's a fireman" so Fireman Wilson was transferred to a converted troop transport and made numerous trips back and forth across the Atlantic to France with troop replacements and returned with wounded men and those who gave their lives for their country. A. C. rose to the rank of 1st Class Fireman before he was discharged from the Navy at the Naval Shipyard at Bremerton, Wash. Now 75 years later, it is only fitting that A. C., the last WWI survivor from VFW Post 3913, be honored by the grateful nation he served. Well done, Sir!

Mabel Glenn, Lifelong Resident, Passes Nov. 2

Mabel Elizabeth Glenn, a lifelong Juliaetta and Kendrick area resident died of a heart attack at Deaconess Medical Center in Spokane, Tuesday, Nov. 2. She was 87 and her passing was mourned by all who knew, loved and respected her.



She was born March 4, 1906, on Fix Ridge, near Juliaetta, to Edgar M. and Elizabeth Dresher Richardson, pioneer settlers of the Juliaetta community.

She attended school on Fix Ridge and in Juliaetta. She lived on Fix Ridge until her marriage to Roy R. Glenn Oct. 14, 1930, at Lewiston.

The couple farmed and ranched on Texas Ridge, near Kendrick, for many years. In their later years they moved nearer to Kendrick. He died March 18, 1985.

She was a member of the Kendrick and Latah Pomona Grange, the Hill and Valley Garden Club, Evergreen Friendship Club and the Kendrick United Methodist Church. She was named "Granger of the Year" earlier this year.

Mabel was active in the Golden Sunset Senior Citizens and was a 4-H leader in Kendrick for many years and was active in church and any other group that had the best interest of the community at heart. She enjoyed playing the role of Mrs. Santa Claus during the Christmas season, both for the little children at the Christmas party and for her friends at the senior center.

Survivors include four daughters, Dorothy Taylor and Sally Browning, both of Juliaetta, Bernadine Easterbrook of Orofino, and Ida Helmgartner of Atsugi, Japan; a brother, Paul Richardson of Juliaetta; 15 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by a daughter, E. Betty May, a sister Anne Wiley, and two brothers, Ralph and Dave.

Services were held at 10:30 Friday at Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Susan Butts of the Kendrick United Methodist Church officiating. Burial was at Fix Ridge Cemetery in Juliaetta.

Mabel Glenn typified the caring spirit that makes our community such a special place in which to live.

If there was a need, Mabel would be the first to help. She was always active in her church, she would always be on the serving line at the annual Methodist Church bazaar; many of the adults in the community did their 4-H work as young people under Mabel's supervision and leadership; the Kendrick and Latah Granges had no better worker than Mabel; and her love for and interest in gardening and flowers could be seen by driving past her home near the school in the summer.

But it was at Christmas time that Mabel truly showed her spirit. She became "Mrs. Santa Claus" and would help distribute candy and treats and visit with the youngsters. She also loved to put her red dress on and entertain the senior citizens during the holidays. Mabel adored her family, and they in turn, adored her—so did the community to whom she gave so much. I hope people remember Mabel Glenn—how sweet she was, and how much she did for the community. She was a rare and precious gem whose memory will gleam in our hearts for a very long time. —Bill

Kendrick's Tigers and Deary's Mustangs, the number 1 and 2 teams in the Whitepine 8-man football league, both won games in the first playoffs last Friday night in Moscow and set the stage for a third meeting to be held at the Kibble Dome on the University of Idaho campus Friday evening at 7:00 in the semi-finals of the state playoffs. Last Friday night Kendrick pounded the Council Lumberjack 53-22 and Deary rolled over Clark Fork 52-20.

Mel Hamilton, 79, Passes Nov. 6

The funeral for Juliaetta resident Melvin C. Hamilton was held Wednesday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with The Rev. Jay Casciato of the Church of the Nazarene at Juliaetta officiating. Mel died of pulmonary edema Saturday, November 6 at Clarkston. He was 79.

He was born Aug. 16 1914, in Alberta, Canada, to Robert and Hattie Sargeant Hamilton. He graduated from Franklin High School at Seattle in 1935 and served in the U. S. Army Air Corps during World War II.

On Oct. 22, 1948, he married Edna Erickson at Winnemucca, Nev. They lived in various places throughout the Northwest as he worked in construction, building bridges and framing residential homes.

In 1964, they moved to Troy, Idaho where he owned and operated a grocery store before moving to Juliaetta. Edna died in October of 1988.

He enjoyed gardening, especially raising and selling tomatoes, and fishing.

Survivors include two daughters, Gail Huber of Pendleton, Ore., and Susan Brennet of Hillsboro, Ore.; three sons, David (Bart) Hamilton of Century City, Calif., Robert Hamilton of Coeur d'Alene and Mike Hamilton of Yakima. Three sisters, Alice Parkins of St. Maries, Idaho, Edith Hussey of Moses Lake and Frances Kleitsch of Seattle; nine grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

A brother, David Hamilton and a sister, Helen Auker, died previously. Burial followed at the Juliaetta City Cemetery.

Kendrick started strong and stayed ahead of Council. Well, not ahead all the way. Brian Silflow scored early in the first quarter, going 13 yards after taking a pass from Craig Tefft. A pass attempt for the extra points failed. Council marched down and a pass from Andy Glenn to Ben Mink from four yards out tied the game. Glenn ran over the extra points and Council led 8-6.

But the lead was short-lived as Kendrick responded with a four-play, 69-yard drive in which Chad Helmgartner had a 35-yard reception and a 19-yard run for a touchdown. The Tigers failed to convert but led 12-8 at the end of the first period.

Kendrick scored twice in the second quarter with Tefft passing to Silflow who went 29 yards. The Tefft to Helmgartner routine worked again for the extra points. Josh Hudson scored the next Tiger TD on a five yard run. Hudson, a dependable workhorse for the Tigers total 93 yards on his 16 carries that night for a 5.7 yard average. A Tefft to Corey Meyer pass added two more points.

Council scored once in the second quarter on a 49 yard pass play. The Tigers were cruising along with a 28-14 lead at the half.

Kendrick nailed down the victory in the third quarter with 22 unanswered points as Hudson banged over another touchdown from 3 yards out. The pass attempt for the extra points failed. Chad Helmgartner intercepted a Lumberjack pass and went in from the 20 for another touchdown and Tefft passed to Silflow for the extra points, and then Corey Meyer ran in from the 1 yard line for the final Kendrick touchdown. Hudson converted the TD and the Tigers had a 50-14 lead.

David Tate scored the Tigers' final points of the game when he booted a 36-yard field goal. Council scored the final points of the game with a 44 yard run.

Deary Over Clark Fork—

The Deary Mustangs, who seem to be able to beat everybody but the Tigers this year, had no trouble disposing of the Clark Fork Wampus Cats 52-20. Deary led 28-21 at the end of the first half and then blanked the Cats 24-0 in the second half.
