

Extending School Hours Could Help Children, And the Economy

Why are schols extending the length of the school day to as long as twelve hours? Because our children just aren't making it to join in the American dream. Children are growing up to join in gangs, drugs, alcohol, dropping out of school, and failing socially and ending up with no skills and desire none. We are diverting more and more of our dollars to police, court, prisons, health and welfare. Births in Idaho taxes pay one-third of all births. Women and children's programs and aid for dependent children are requesting \$127,000,000, state prisons ask for \$60,000,000 in taxpayers money this year. California is dismissing 12,000 college and University professors and hiring 4,000 prisons employee. Washington hired 1,000 new prison employees and Idaho 120. Extend those numbers annually and see where our taxes and our futures go.

Why start programs at the schools. Because that is where the children are. The school built and staffed for children. We hire a few people, and parents and volunteers will come to the schools. Also children help each other. Teenagers have time and energy to direct to worthwhile projects. A child at home alone is in trouble, addiction in adults is directly related to the number of hours a child spends alone. They are lonely, may play with guns, matches or watch horrible T. V.

Contrast this to children who arrive at school at 6 a. m., are greeted warmly by some mothers and fed a nourishing meal.

The low pressure fun and learning begins. Their troubles fly away. They touch each other, engage in organized play, talk, and laugh. They are happy! The constructive projects they tackle are limited to their imagination, their ability, and the direction of adults and other children. Life has meaning and goals.

One school has four volunteers in second grade teaching math at four blackboards, followed by reading in four groups. Organization, good planning and leadership keeps down the bedlam. Children who learn will do better by observing or by hearing progress in this setting.

Moscow Jr. High has two rooms of computers for different age children. One hundred students are active in sports. Different groups follow their leanings toward theater, music, art, or examining plants, animals, coins, books, everything.

These children are happier and more active than you would expect. It makes us realize that humans tend to be social beings. Children respond to activities like these in a very positive way. They develop ability and self-confidence.

These activities may be better therapy than other present methods. Progress of children with attention deficits hyperactivity, social behavior, seem or respond positively and progressively. Some have progressed to having no need for medication and no symptoms at all of former problems. Among these children, dropouts, vandalism, drugs and alcohol use are reduced immediately.

This information is from observations and deduction of providers. Gangs, drugs, guns, stealing and shootings are big thrills for unknown children.

We watched TV where gang members were petitioning the gang leaders to be released from the gang. They wanted to go back to school, get an education and raise their children to have better lives than they had.

On TV, I saw gang members buying guns and shooting in the dark. Then, the scene shifted to a hospital room with a dozen youths in wheelchairs paralyzed from being shot; one with breathing support had 14 operations. Listening to these children talk and taking advice from them was a real shock! One we all should hear

Industry and the media must develop stories and pictures of what really happens. We must insert their pictures and stories into all of media. We must choose to tell the whole truth. Show what follows the next day, 1 year, 10 years, 20 years later this behavior takes place.

The legislature should fund the teenage pregnancy prevention program and the school plus programs this year. How much a dollar or two per capita.

Good things will follow all the days of our lives.

The 52-year-old Orofino man died of pneumonia Tuesday, Dec. 28 at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston.

He was born Nov. 29, 1941, at Kendrick to Frank and Leasel Havens Abrams. He was raised at Kendrick and graduated from high school here in 1960.

He then attended the University of Idaho at Moscow and graduated in 1964 with a degree in business law.

He attended a year of law school at UI and married Caryn Snyder at Moscow Feb. 6, 1965. They lived in Seattle and Portland for several years, where he worked as a sales representative for Shell Oil Co.

They moved back to Kendrick in 1970 and he worked with his father at Abrams Hardware Store. In 1972 they moved to Orofino and opened a hardware store there, also called Abrams Hardware.

In 1983, he became the public works director for the city of Orofino and, in 1988, became an agent for Bankers Life and Casualty Co.

At the time of his death, he was working with his father at Abrams Hardware at Kendrick.

He was baptized into the Catholic faith and was a member of the Orofino Rotary Club, the Orofino Chamber of Commerce the Lions Club and served on the National Ski Patrol at Bald Mountain Ski Club.

He served as president of the Orofino Chamber from 1978 to 1980 and a member of the Clearwater County Industrial Development Team. He was a Clearwater County Emergency Medical Technician and enjoyed singing, playing the guitar, skiing and reading.

Survivors include his wife of Orofino; two sons, Douglas Abrams of Jerome, Idaho, and Geoffrey Abrams of Orofino; his parents, Frank and Leasel Abrams of Kendrick; a brother, Richard Abrams of Kendrick; a sister Katherine Shaw of Emmett, Idaho, a grandson and two stepgrandchildren.

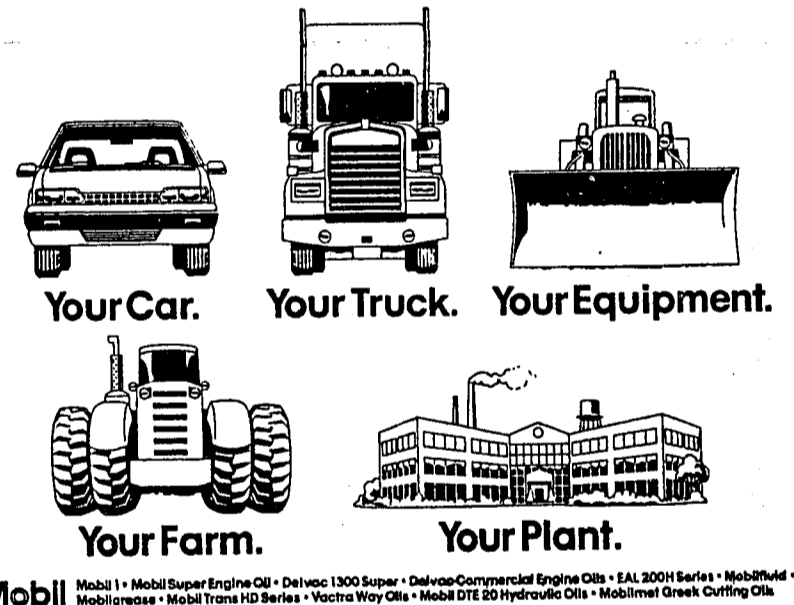
