Reminder: New Phone Dialing Plan are looking for volunteers to help Begins Begins Feb. 28 attach the new "Fire Station" sign

Beginning Monday, February 28, Idaho phone users must dial 1+ (or 0+) 208 and the seven-digit number on in-state long distance calls. Currently, customers dial only 1 (or 0) before the seven-digit number.

The firemen and EMTs long distance dialing. During this stage of the introduction 10 digit dialing was optional.

Beginning February 28, 10 digit dialing will become mandatory. If an in-state long distance call is made without the area code, a recording will ask the customer to re-dial with the 208 area code.

Customers using speed dialing, computer modems, FAX machines, Call Forwarding, and some alarm and private phone systems will need to re-program the devices to include the area code. Customers are encouraged to do their re-programming before the February 28 effective date.

The inclusion of the 208 area code does not change the rates for these calls. Emergency calls to 911, directory calls to 1+411, local calls and long distance calls to other area codes will not be affected by the new dialing plan.

Idaho, along with the rest of the nation, is experiencing phenomenal growth, requiring additional telephone numbers. "Telephone customers are using the telecommunications network in new and expanding ways," explained Barbara Wilson, Idaho vice president for U S WEST Communications. New prefixes are constantly being added to the network for both business and residence customers requiring additional lines for computers and fax machines.

This change is being brought about because the nation has run out of area codes and needs a new dialing pattern to handle future growth. Bellcore-which administers the North American Numbering Plan-requires that "interchaniston; and two additional brothers, geable dialing" be implemented nationally by 1995. In order to accommodate the future growth of area codes, all carriers within the plan bara K. Groseclose and Georgia area must be capable of routing calls with interchangeable area and prefix codes. Present area codes have 0 or 1 as their middle digit. Any new area codes will include the digits 2 through 9 as the second digit. The change affects all Idaho telephone companies. As Idaho's largest local phone company, U S WEST has the responsibility to administer number plans within the 208 area code. Idaho will be the fifth area in U S WEST's 14-state territory to implement 10 digit dialing for long distance calls within the state. Arizona, part of Washington and Oregon are already using the new dialing plan, with Colorado implementing the plan in early 1994. Nationally, about 40 states have converted to alternate dialing plans to manage prefix expansion.
