Charles Noble, 78, Retired Grocer, Passes May 1

Charles Noble, a retired Juliaetta grocer, died of complications of age and diabetes Sunday, May 1, at the the Latah Care Center at Moscow. He was 78.

He was born April 3, 1916, at Orofino to Chrales E. and Minnie Schupfer Noble. The family moved to Juliaetta when he was an infant and he attended grade school there.

They moved to Moscow in 1929 and he completed high school there. From 1941 to 1945 he served as a staff sergeant at Hobbs, N. M., and in England with the U.S. Army Air Corps. He was head of a sheet metal crew repairing airplanes during World War II.

He married Phyllis Bryant June 14, 1946, at Lewiston.

From the mid-1930s to the early 1960s, he worked in the timber industry for various logging contractors throughout the Clearwater area, including Potlacth Forests, Inc. (now Potlatch Corp.) at Bovill and Carpenter's Mill at Lewiston.

In the 1950s, the Nobles operated a grocery store at Bovill and purchased a market in Juliaetta in 1961. They owned and operated Nobles Grocery at Juliaetta until retiring

After retirement, Chuck and Phyllis moved to their cabin in Avon. Phyllis preceded him in death. He later moved to the Latah Care

Center in Moscow. Survivors include a daughter Janice L. Groseclose of Lewiston; a son, Randy E. Noble of Spokane; a

sister, Harriet L. Martin of Spokane; and five grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a brother and his first wife, Josephine

Lackey Noble. His funeral was conducted at 11 a. m. Wednesday, May 4, at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. Jerry Nickles of White Pine Baptist Church at Moscow officiating.

Burial followed at the Juliaetta City Cemetery.


