

Ervin Halseth will Be a Marshal Of Festival Parade

Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars has chosen to honor Ervin Halseth as a Grand Marshal in the 1994 Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival. No one is more deserving to be honored by the V. F. W. than a man who served his country on foreign soil during the entire World War II. He served in the South Pacific for 5 years, 2 months, and 20 days (saying he had since forgotten the minutes.) Most of his war service was in eastern Australia and Papua, New Guinea in an artillery unit. After contracting malaria and being hospitalized in Melbourne, he was transferred to a supply depot in Brisbane. He was discharged from the military in the hot sun of Australia on Feb. 2, 1945. He arrived home 13 days later to deep snow and bitter cold.



Remembering Kendrick when travels was the main mode of travel in and out of the valley, Ervin recalled coming home for Christmas with Roy, Fred, and Sidney Clemenhagen. The car they were driving broke down and had to be hauled home, so he and one of the Clemenhagens decided to take the early train back to Seattle. When they arrived, the other two Clemenhagen boys were already standing on the dock, having left later and arrived earlier than they.

Ervin came to Idaho at the age of two years with his parents Ed and Olga Halseth. They had homesteaded in Great Falls, Mont. where Ervin was born. He remembers hearing his mother tell that when he was born, he was so tiny that he was placed in a shoe box which served as a bassinette. The family moved to Idaho in 1919 where they purchased the Halseth family farm.

His mother, Olga Klette, was born in Norway. As a teenager she traveled to America with her sister. They landed in Montreal, Canada, and later migrated to the United States. She never saw her family again. Ervin remembers his mother attending Bethany Church on Bear Ridge when all the preaching was in the native Norwegian language.

When asked where his father was born, Ervin said, "Now, that's kind of a funny thing. He said he was born in Gainsville, an old community near Helmer. But, when he went to prove his birthplace for Social Security, it turned out to be Genesee."

At any rate, the young couple produced eight children over a span of 15 years, with Ervin being the eldest. From there it was Margarette, Arnold, Helen, Betty, Gerald and Harold (twins), and Orville. The Halseths have a well-known name in Kendrick and Bear Ridge history.

The Bear Ridge area has changed greatly over the years of Ervin's life. He attended Taney School for the first eight grades. That school was located on the corner of Bethany Road and Taney Road. He was taught by Opal Jones, Bessie Carter, Olive Simpson, Mabel Weaver Callison, and Verna Fairfield. There were usually 18-20 students in the school.

When it came time for high school, Ervin transferred to Deary where he lived with his uncle Pete Halseth. His last two years in high school were spent in Kendrick and he graduated in 1936. There was no bus to Kendrick at that time, so he drove the old Model T Ford to school. As a junior at K. H. S., he drove down the old Bear Ridge Grade (which comes out behind the present Kendrick High School). In the fall of 1935, he got to drive down the new Bear Ridge Grade at the present location. He remembers his mother moving to Kendrick with the girls during the school year so that they could attend high school. The first school bus ran to Kendrick in the fall of 1936 when Taney school consolidated with the Kendrick schools.

And how the Ridge has changed! "There used to be farms and houses on every corner—and lots of kids. There were five schools on the ridge, Rimrock was near the top of the Bear Ridge Grade; Steele School was

near the Jerry Galloway residence, Fern Hill School was located near the A. C. Wilson's; Applequist school was located near the Albin Nelson residence, and Taney School. The schools would have literary parties and Christmas programs jointly at Bear Ridge Hall in order that all the community could participate. There were also many dances at the Hall," said Ervin as he reminisced.

Kendrick has changed a bit, too. Everyone used to go to Kendrick for the Saturday night movie at the theatre and all the stores stayed open until 9:00 p. m. Of course the cafes and bakery did a thriving business after the picture show.

As a child Ervin hoed beans for fifty cents to a dollar a day. He also drove horses and helped with the binder in harvest. One summer he worked in the Blister Rust camp. He worked on the construction of the Erady Gulch Grade which was done by Osgood Construction Co. of Seattle.

He met his future wife on a blind date that was arranged by Fred Clemenhagen. He married Helen when she was a U. S. Nurse Cadet in November, 1946. The young couple moved to Craigmont where he worked for J. D. Jacobs for the next 12 years. Both his daughters Vickie Jo and Pam were born at Cottonwood while the family lived in Craigmont.

In the spring of 1960, Ervin moved his family to the Halvorson place on Bear Ridge and began farming. They lived neighbors to Johanna Nelson, their dear friend and constant companion. Wherever you would see Ervin and Helen, you would also see Johanna. It was a life-long friendship.

Helen worked at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston for 24 years prior to her retirement in 1990. Ten months after retiring, cancer would claim her life.

Ervin and Helen's oldest daughter, Vickie Jo Witt, owns and operates V. J.'s Beauty Bar in Kendrick. Pam Isaacson, the youngest daughter, lives in Tacoma where she is a probation officer for the juvenile court system there. There are four grandchildren.

The song "Dear Hearts and Gentle People" could certainly have been written for, or about, special people such as Ervin Halseth—the quiet kind you are happy to call friend.

Questions & Answers About Override Levy

Question: Why are some districts able to reduce overrides and others such as ours have to raise theirs?

Answer: Each district is unique in Idaho on what their own local needs are. Potlatch school district, for example, had a new roof built in its current budget, therefore were able to reduce its amount. In last week's Gazette we compared the overrides for the current 1993-94 school year. Since we have budgeted so closely the past 6 or 7 years to keep quality education at the lowest amount of dollar to the taxpayer, we do not have any "cushion" for unexpected expenditures. Because of the additional costs created by Senate Bills 1560 and 1494 reported in last week's Gazette, we have to pass this \$30,000-plus expenditure on to the taxpayers. At the time of this Gazette article, override levies for the 1994-95 school year for the same districts listed last week are:

Kendrick No. 283\$190,000
 Genesee No. 282\$222,247
 Whitepine No. 286\$425,000
 Potlatch No. 285\$410,000
 Lewiston No. 340\$6,700,000
 Moscow No. 281*\$3,795,959

* In 1992, Moscow patrons elected to put an override levy permanently in place. It is apparent by studying the above figures, even if some districts lower their overrides slightly, Kendrick will still be one of the lowest dollarwise in the area.

Question: How much is this \$30,000 increase in the maintenance and operations supplement override going to costs us?

Answer: Using the 1994 tax market values, a "yes" vote on the override would see an increase of 43c per thousand on assessed market value for the 1994-95 fiscal year in comparison to the 93-94 fiscal year. Therefore, increases are:

\$110,000* business\$47/yr.
 \$100,000* farm land\$43/yr.
 \$ 55,000* home\$14.19/yr.

(\$55,000x50% (homeowners exempt equals \$27,500)
 \$27,500 plus \$5500 (lot) equals \$33,000)

\$33,000 x 43c equals \$14.19
 * Business (\$100,000), homes (\$50,000), residential lots (\$5,000) in Idaho have increased between 1993 and 1994 in market value 10% according to the Idaho Tax Commission. Farmland has remained fairly constant.

Question: What is the current status of the school consolidation issue?

Answer: Fortunately, the 1994 legislature in the dialogue that went into Senate Bills 1560 (Appropriations Bill) and 1494 (Non-certified Medical insurance coverage) did not get bogged down in the consolidation issue. However, President Roy Mosman, Moscow, recently reported to the media that the State Board of Education would be revisiting the Big "C" issue during the upcoming fiscal year.

Esther Shreffler Will be 1994 Festival Grand Marshal

Having been born to a pioneer couple in the Pomeroy area known as Valentine, Esther (Taylor) Shreffler's life has been a testimony of hard work and making do with what you have been given.



Her mother came west with a wagon train. She got so tired of walking that she thought her legs would surely fall off! Esther's mother, Lily Jane Grey Taylor recalled being "terrified" of the savage Indians only to find out that when her mother baked fresh bread the Indians would come openly to their homestead cabin to barter for the delicious white bread their appetites craved. Her mother rode horseback everywhere—always side-saddle—since cowboy fashion would have been considered extremely unlady-like.

The six Taylor children soon realized the importance of their education, as they had a long walk to and from school. In the very coldest of weather, their father would take them in the horse-pulled sled. Esther recalls the snow piling up so deep one winter that it covered the corral fence. He father simply took the team over the top of the buried fence. The melt-off brought with it extensive flooding that spring, and it brings back her memories of strong, well groomed horses with braided and clamped tails, with belly bells that jingled as they pulled the sleigh. She remembers the wonderful radiating heat of the open oven door when she was "soaked to the bone."

She came from an extremely devout Christian family that believed in keeping the Sabbath holy. There was plenty of baking and cleaning on Saturdays, but no work on Sunday—not even washing the dishes. If you were old enough to walk, you were old enough to help with the work. Children learned at an early age to churn butter, sew, tend children, wash clothes, and home canning procedures.

And, so she grew up. She married Lloyd Shreffler Nov. 11, 1925. He moved his wife and three children, Helen, Max, and Doris to Bear Ridge to the Elliot place near the Gerald Ingle farm. The year was 1938, and the children all walked to the Joe Clemenhagen farm to catch the bus. They would head out in the dark with a lantern. The late Annie Clemenhagen was a good neighbor and fixed the children hot chocolate to warm them up when they arrived at her house, and she faithfully cranked the old wall telephone to let the Shrefflers know the children had arrived safely.

If you were the last to board the bus in those days, it was likely you would stay wet and cold, since the first children to board occupied the much-coveted places in the front near the heater. One day in Dr. McKeever's office in Kendrick, a few mothers were sharing concerns over the fact that the children were cold and wet. Upon arriving at school they had to wait for the school to open at 8:30, which was a long wait if you were cold and wet. Dr. had been listening and burst out of the clinic and shouted, "What did you just say!" Hearing the details of the plight, he thundered, "There'll be some changes, by God, or I'll kick the door down myself!" The situation quickly changed.

Esther remembers the loneliness of moving to the area just prior to World War II. And, she remembers hand-sewing all the children's clothing. There was no such thing as a Simplicity pattern. You just laid a garment on the fabric and cut it out. She said she wouldn't have known what to do with a pattern (and now wouldn't know what to do without one.) A typical meal in that day was potatoes, meat, gravy, beans, home-made bread, and pie. Many hours were required to store food for a family of six. (He youngest child, Jeanette, was born by now.) She canned fruits and vegetables in half-gallon jars. Green beans had to be processed four hours in a copper boiler on the top of a

wood stove. It took many a 16-hour day for the homemaker to store enough food to see the family through until the garden was ready by next summer.

Everyone remembers the ration cards of the second World War. Especially sugar and shoe rationing. She remembers a dozen eggs were 5 cents, gas 25 cents a gallon, a new pair of bib overalls were \$1.25. She milked cows and sold cream to provide the family with groceries. She recalls the dances and Christmas programs that were held at the Bear Ridge Hall, and she walked there daily to take her first "First Aid" class.

The family moved to the "Bohman" place, more recently owned by the Capps family. Later they moved to the "Orvik" place across the canyon where they farmed until retirement in 1970 when they moved to Texas Ridge near Kendrick.

As a child, granddaughter Sharon Harris marveled at the way her grandmother made the most out of a bucket of well water. It was first boiled and used for cooking, then to wash the dishes, then as bath water, and then on to irrigation water for the garden. Wells and cisterns were cleaned out in those days and "limed" to purify them.

Having nerves of steel, Esther taught each child to drive an old Studebaker station wagon. Fourteen was the driving age in those days.

Esther's family was always her number one priority. She lived for, loved and nurtured her four children, Helen Fey Heidenreich of Kendrick; Max Nelson Shreffler (deceased); Doris A. Hansen of Deary, and Jeanette Howe of Hayden Lake. She has 19 grandchildren, 34 great-grandchildren, and 2 great-great-grandchildren.

The V. F. W. has chosen to pay tribute to her as one of the Grand Marshals of the 1994 Locust Blossom Festival parade. It is a tribute to women everywhere who lived through the hard times and became even stronger because of tragedy and hardship in their lives.
