Old Time Fiddlers, Farmers' Market In Kendrick Sunday

There will be music plus good, fresh produce at the Kendrick Park this Sunday, July 17, as the Latah County Old Time Fiddlers will offer their own unique brand of music in an hour-long concert beginning at 2:00 o'clock, said Christine Clayton, manager of the K-J Farmers Market, which is sponsored by the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association.

There will be some seating available in the park (bales of hay), Mrs. Clayton said, and she suggested that those planning on attending bring their own chairs. As the fiddlers group performs without charge, it is planned to "pass the hat" to help the fiddlers at least meet the cost of the gas bill.

The fiddlers are always favorites when they perform in the area and is hoped there will be the usual good crowd to watch and listen to them this Sunday afternoon.

The farmers market is beginning to increase in size and variety each week as the season progresses. More growers and crafts people are expected to be present Sunday.

Christine said green beans are about at their peak and summer squash, onion, spinach lettuce, beets, carrots, with peas also expected by this Sunday. A grower from Washington has indicated he will have some early sweet corn also available. Fresh, local eggs are also showing up at the market and some truly lovely handcraft items such as necklaces, ear rings and painting are offered each week.

This Sunday should be a good day to be at the Kendrick Park. And, don't forget, you or the kids can swim, too.

2-Hour Watering Restriction in Kendrick Now in Effect

No rain, higher temperatures and increasing usage has forced to city of Kendrick to further restrict outside watering within the city limits until further notice, city clerk Lynne Bruce said this week. The restrictions are in effect now.

The city had already imposed odd-even day watering, but this week tightened the restrictions to just two hours per day in addition to keeping the earlier limits in effect.

Residents whose house numbers end with even numbers (2, 4, 6, 8, 0, etc.) may water on Monday, Wednesdays and Friday. Odd numbered homes (1, 3, 5, etc.) may water on Tuesdays, Thursday and Saturdays. No Sunday watering, please.

The city asks that only two hours per day watering, and further suggests that watering be done in the early morning or late afternoons when it will be most effective.

Lynne said there has been noticeable lowering of the reservoir and it is most important to maintain an adequate supply of water available in the event of fire.

Drunk and Drugged Drivers Will Lose Licenses on Spot As of July 1

Motorists caught driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs in Idaho as of July 1 will lose their licenses on the spot or 90 days, and possibly a year, under the new Administrative License (ALS) law passed by the 1993 Idaho Legislature.

Arresting officers must seize a driver's license on the spot if the driver is found through evidentiary testing to have an alcohol concentration level of 0.10 or higher or is under the influence of drugs. The offender has seven days to request a hearing on the suspension through the Idaho Transportation Department. The automatic suspension, imposed by the transportation department, takes effect immediately after a 30-day temporary license issued at the time of arrest expires.

On a first offense, drunk drivers lose their license for 90 days with no driving privileges for the first 30 days. A second offense in five years carries a one-year suspension with absolutely no driving privileges. Drivers under 21 with alcohol concentration levels of 0.02 or higher will lose their licenses in the same manner.

The swift and sure loss of driving privileges has reduced drunk driving and alcohol-related traffic crashes in the 33 states that already have ALS laws in effect. These laws have reduced fatal crashes by about 9 percent during periods when alcohol is used most heavily, such as nighttime and holidays, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

"The Idaho Transportation Department is committed to curbing the tragic, preventable loss of lives due to drunk drivers," said Marie Bishop, manager of the Office of Highway Safety.

In 1993, automobile crashes killed 230 people in Idaho. Drunk driving accounted for over one-third of the deaths. Alcohol-related accidents cost Idaho an estimated \$73.3 million last year.

Idaho courts will still handle all criminal aspects of DUI offenses, including license suspension for refusal to submit to sobriety testing.

Effective July 1, a strengthening of Idaho law allows a father of a child born outside marriage to establish paternity through a simple process. Fathers may acknowledge their paternity in the hospital immediately before or after the birth of their child. The chances of establishing paternity are greater at the time of a child's birth than at any other time. Paternity established before the new law remain valid.

"If the current trend continues," said Teresa Kaiser of the Department's child support services, "the national out-of-wedlock birth rate could reach 40 percent by the turn of the century, according to Lee Rainwater, Harvard sociologist emeritus. Many of these children will never have paternity established. This creates social, medical and financial barriers. Children's lives are much easier when both parents are actively involved."

The paternity education program is a cooperative venture between the Idaho Hospital Association and Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Health and Bureau of Child Support Services.

Kaiser said fathers need to be involved in the birth of their child from the beginning of the pregnancy. Fathers can help make sure the mother gets early prenatal care, proper nutrition, and refrains from smoking, drinking and using drugs. When fathers acknowledge paternity, they have the chance to form an emotional bond that lasts a lifetime.

"Early paternity acknowledge encourages a father to form a a stronger parental bond during the significant first years of his child's life," said Kaiser. "It encourages a higher level of commitment and can make a real lifelong difference for the father and child."

Paternity establishment also helps ease the burden on taxpayers, said Kaiser. The high number of non-marital births reflects in the growing number of female-headed households receiving welfare benefits. Nationally, 56 percent of women receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children benefits have never been married. In 1993, 27 percent of Idaho women receiving AFDC had never been married.

Idaho Experiences Slight Unemployment Increase

The Department of Employment announces the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for June is forecast at 5.2 percent, an increase of five-tenths of a percentage point from May's rate of 4.7 percent. This figure is 1.1 percent below the June 1993 rate of 6.3 percent.

The number of jobless workers in June increased by 2,700 for a seasonally adjusted total of 30,800 as students looked for summer jobs and others looked for their first job or sought to re-enter the job market.

The number of employed workers in June 1994 decreased by 2,600. This drop is credited to the early hiring of seasonal workers in April and May. Employment continued upward in construction, lumber, food processing, tourist industries, temporary agencies and federal fire fighters.

Unadjusted figures show that nearly 9,500 new jobs were created in June. This growth indicates continued strength in the state's economy.

Idaho's stable economy in June is reflected in the Department's reporting little change in the number of people receiving unemployment insurance benefits.

Idaho's unemployment rate continues below the national rate which is holding steady a 6.0 percent, unchanged from May.
