Kenneth C. Brocke, Kendrick Native, Dies July 13

Kenneth C. Brocke, 79, a longtime Troy resident, died Wednesday, July 13, of age-related causes at Gritman Medical Center in Moscow.

He was born May 16, 1915, to Frank and Julia Otto Brocke at Kendrick where he grew up and attended school. Following graduation from Kendrick High School he attended the Kinman Business College in Spokane for two years.

He married Lucille Stuart Aug. 14, 1937, in Lewiston. The couple had made their home in Troy since 1951.

He worked as an accountant for the Troy Tractor and Implement Co. until retiring in 1980.

He was a family-oriented person and enjoyed spending time with his children and grandchildren. He also enjoyed fishing.

He was a former member of the Moscow Elks and had been a volunteer fireman for the Troy Fire Department for eight years.

Survivors include his wife at Troy; two sons, Kenneth E. Brocke of Caldwell and Lee D. Brocke of Priest River; one daughter, Julia Scrivner of Sacramento, Calif.; seven grandsons, one step-granddaughter and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by a great-granddaughter, three brothers and one sister.

Graveside services were conducted at 11 a. m. Monday at the American Ridge Cemetery near Kendrick with the Rev. Richard Brunstetter of the Troy Church of the Nazarene officiating.

County Planning Was Topic at Develop. Meeting

Gerard Billington, the Latah County Planner, was the guest at the monthly meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association held Thursday July 14, at the fire hall. Fourteen members of the association and two guests were present at the noon luncheon.

Mr. Billington gave the group an overview of planning in Latah County. The county is now in the process of revising its Comprehensive Plan to reflect changes in the business and social structure of the county.

"Why do we have planning?" is a question frequently asked, said Billington. He explained that a comprehensive plan serves as an interface between private property rights and community interests. Community interest is a needed protection for local government. It provides for supervision of self-serving development which might affect land and environmental conditions.

Rural planning use, "shouldn't be a road-block to new ideas," Billington told the association. "It's not designed to stop growth." But a good plan provides protection for all factors of development and growth.

Reviewing and revising the present comprehensive plan will also bring residents to face questions such as whether agriculture is still a priority consideration in Latah County. When the first comprehensive plan was adopted in the 1960s agricultural land was a prime consideration. Since then there has been a great increase in demand for development of housing and residential areas outside city limits.

Also present at the Thursday luncheon was Joanne Gertje, the KHS music instructor who told the association that plans are being made to attempt to bring a noted concert pianist, Laura Spitzer, to the community for several presentations Sept. 25 and 26. This would include a community concert on Sunday, Sept. 25, and two presentations on Monday for school students. Further information on this project will be given as plans progress.

Other topics discussed at the meeting, which was presided over by president Lillian Howerton, included the report on the functioning of the Farmers Market, by manager Christine Clayton, who reminded the members of some of the events that will be held in conjunction with the market. There is still a need for more grower participation, Clayton said but added that it is hoped this will be corrected as crops mature.

Newly appointed Kendrick City Councilman Milt Patterson was at this meeting and answered some inquiries about the city, including why the new cover on the swimming pool wasn't being used more often. Patterson answered that question by saying the cover needs some repair at this time.

It was also announced that the Juliaetta Centennial Park has recently received a \$10,000 grant that will be used for further construction of a covered picnic area. The Park project continues to progress.

President Howerton reported that Judy Haley and Vivian Craig will now be in charge of the association's "Getting Acquainted" program. Alana Sneve was the coordinator of this program but was forced to give it up because of other commitments.
