Area Sizzles In 100 Degree Temps This Week

The Kendrick-Juliaetta area sizzled under its first heat wave of the summer this past week. Temperatures climbed above 100 degrees for five days straight under a cloudless sky and the heat pushed the fire danger into the "Very High" danger range.

The arrival of the heat and bright sun also hastened the ripening of the legume and small grain crops, and all the local warehouses reported the arrival of the first crops of the season.

Lightning storms over the weekend touched off several spot fires in the area but no major fires have been reported. The District Fire Warden's office in Deary said there was a lightning-caused fire involving about 350 acres in the Craigmont area. Fire crews were also dispatched to small fires on Moscow Mountain and in Cedar Grove, the Deary office said Tuesday afternoon. Terri Henderson also reported that lightning struck a tree on their property earlier in the week but it was spotted and quickly extinguished before it could spread. Terri said she and Pat were really grateful to Harold and Dorothy Silflow who reported the fire to them. The Evergreen Fire Dept. volunteers also responded to the blaze.

Farmers, loggers and others who are working in the outdoors are urged to use extreme caution to guard against fire.

Hot Weather Hastens Harvest Season

When Lewiston Grain Growers worker Dareld Hazeltine said "We're gettin' into the swing of it" Tuesday afternoon, he was voicing the condition of all the grain warehouses in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area. Hot, dry weather — with temperatures reaching or exceeding 100 degrees for the past week, has hastened the ripening of small grain and legumes in all sections and the harvest is being brought in more each day. While most of the crops harvested so far have been reported as good, it appears to be unlikely that this will be a record year and a lot of what is appearing in the warehouses shows some effect of the dry growing season and recent hot weather. Even the hay crops are not as good as last year's.

Hazeltine said the Lohman Bros. brought in some of the first grain of the season, red wheat, from their fields below Juliaetta. Spring barley and soft white wheat has also come into LGG.

"They're cutting all around," Hazeltine said Tuesday afternoon. There was a total of 133 loads brought in to all local LGG facilities Monday, Hazeltine added.

Perry Larson at Kendrick Rockdale also reported harvest is starting to come in from "all over—American Ridge, Potlatch Ridge, Big and Little Bear." Larson said it's still too early in the season to get an accurate picture of the 1994 harvest, but said "some shrinkage" is showing up.

While harvest of the expected peas and lentils coming into Brocke and Sons hasn't reached the halfway mark, it's "moving along" said Geo. Brocke, Jr., Tuesday afternoon. Geo. estimated that "maybe a third" of the harvest is in. If conditions stay the way they are at present, Brocke said much of the work will be done by mid-August.

Coming into the Brocke plants have been small sieve Alaskas, Columbia peas and lentils of several varieties. Only garbanzo beans have yet to be cut, as of Tuesday.

The harvest yields have not been up to last year's but the crops look average or slightly above. The crops in the higher elevations that did not get the needed moisture this growing season appear to have been hurt the most.

New Juliaetta Water System Working Well

Who says money won't buy everything? Well, almost everything. At least money appears to have bought the City of Juliaetta relief from its chronic water problem.

After years of suffering through the summers trying to nurse enough water from dozens of wells, the city of Juliaetta, with federal and state grants and large bond issue approved by its citizens—total costs over \$600,000, the town's new town system that draws water from the Potlatch River appears to be the solution. Mayor Jeff Lohman said Tuesday night that the water supply is still adequate despite the lack of rainfall and the increased usage brought on by the hot weather.

In fact the city council hasn't even discussed watering restrictions this summer, Lohman said.

That doesn't mean Juliaetta folks should go out and use water unwisely—summer and its hot, dry weather is still with us!

Seriously, before readers think the Gazette is too flippant about Juliaetta's new water system, we should remember the many months of planning, the weeks of hard, dedicated work by the council and scores of volunteers, and the citizens themselves who had the faith to approve the bond issue. These are real reasons Juliaetta has its good water supply this summer.

The board instructed the superintendent to contact Jim Bellamy, an architect from Coeur d'Alene, to draw up some preliminary sketches for classroom additions at Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick Junior/Senior high school facilities. In the past 30 months the elementary enrollment has increased from 144 to 207. The 1994-95 school year will see 2 third grade classes and 2 first grade classes and possibly 2 kindergarten classes, depending on the enrollment.

Next year 4 major activities will be held in the new cafeteria: cafeteria for a breakfast and lunch program, school library, band room and 2 mornings a week a pre-school for identified special education students.

Building the additions on to the elementary school and high school would require a bond issue. The present bond issue on the elementary gymnasium and boiler room will be paid off as of February, and the new bond issue would come into place following the retirement of that debt. It is hoped the new classroom additions can be built within a dollar range that would not increase property taxes.

Infection or Allergy

Can Make Mosquito Bites

Worse Than a Nuisance

Mosquito bites are usually just a nuisance, but these summertime annoyances may require some follow-up care if they cause an allergic reaction or infection.

Dr. Paul Khavari, assistant professor at Sanford University Medical Center, says mild allergic reactions to mosquito bites are common and can leave people wondering why that pesky bite, even if left unscratched, has suddenly grown to become a large red welt.

Khavari says that over-the-counter creams containing cortisone often help reduce the swelling and discomfort. If the problem continues, physicians may prescribe creams with a more powerful form of cortisone.

Infection, often due to scratching that breaks the skin, will cause the area around the bite to become hot

to the touch and tender.

The infection may also originate in the opening created in the skin as the mosquito punctures the surface to begin drawing blood. Allergic reactions arise when proteins in the mosquito's saliva are transferred to an allergy-prone victim during the insect's feeding process.

"The best approach to a mildly infected bug bite is to keep the area clean. After washing the infection with soap and water, gently press a warm, wet rag on the area—and repeat the entire procedure about five times daily. In more severe cases, a physician should be consulted and antibiotics may be prescribed," says Khavari.

Although bandaging is not necessary Khavari says it may be useful if it helps to keep the victim from scratching the site.

In relatively rare instances involving persons who are unusually sensitive, the allergic reaction to a bite can be life-threatening, so Khavari urges people who notice an extensive rash, swelling around the lips or throat, or even mild difficulty breathing to seek immediate medical attention. Persons with a known allergy to insects should consult their physician about carrying an emergency injection kit to stop reaction promptly.

Preventing all mosquito bites is practically impossible, although a high quality insect repellent should reduce the number of bites significantly, says Khavari. Consumers should look for repellents containing the ingredient DEET (n,N-diethyl-methyl-p-toluamide).

How can you be sure the bite is from a mosquito? The answer, of course, is that you can't unless you have seen the culprit perform its deed. But most common household insects produce similar symptoms requiring similar follow-up, particularly in serious reactions occur.

Bike Helmets Work Fine for In-Line Skating

That same helmet that protects bicyclists can save the life of in-line skaters too, says a Stanford University Hospital emergency physician.

"Helmets made especially for in-line skating are different from bike helmets in style, not in protection," says Dr. Marc S. Nelson.

Helmets that cover as much of the head as possible are safest for

both biking and skating, says Nelson. That's good news for bargain shoppers, since the more streamlined—albeit better ventilated—racing helmets usually cost more money than the bulkier more conservative style.

Traditional-style helmets made of lightweight Styrofoam should offer significant protection for in-line skaters—or for skateboarders or rollerskaters for that matter. Look for a seal inside the helmet showing approval by one of two national organizations, ANSI and Snell. This certifies that the helmet has been tested and shown to offer protection,

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**Driver's Licenses can be
 Renewed through the mail
 During pilot program**

Drivers in selected counties can now renew their standard driver's license by mail instead of making a special trip to their local county driver's licensing office, the Idaho Transportation Department announced. The pilot program is designed to make license renewal easier and reduce congestion in the county licensing offices at renewal time each month.

During a 6-month testing period which began July 15 for September license renewals, the transportation department will mail renewal forms to eligible holders of standard driver's licenses (not Commercial Drivers Licenses) 60 days before their license expires. The renewal form must be completed, signed and returned to the local sheriff's office with the required renewal fee. A renewal sticker will be mailed to the driver to affix to their driver's license. Drivers may still renew their licenses in person if they desire.

The new-by-mail pilot program will initially be tested in Ada, Bonnevillie, Lewis, Nez Perce and Twin Falls counties. After three months, another 10 counties will introduce the service, and after the 6-month testing period, the Idaho Transportation Board will evaluate the program for possible use statewide.

Anyone between the ages of 21 and 69, who's license is not suspended, has no medical or vision restrictions, and has no other license stipulations is eligible to participate in the program.

Regular driver's licenses must be renewed every four years. A license

can be renewed by mail once, but the next renewal must be done in person. A personal visit to the driver's licensing office is also required if a license is lost or changes other than a new address need to be made.
