Helen R. Cantril of Davenport, Wash., a former Lewiston resident, died of congestive heart failure July 25 at Davenport. She was 81.

She was born July 7, 1913, at Pomeroy to Bert and Julia Mitchem Colwell. She was raised in the Pomeroy area and attended schools there, graduating from Pomeroy High School.

She married Frank Cantril March 19, 1933, at Clarkston. They lived in various Northwest communities before moving to Lewiston in 1956. He died in 1972 and she lived with her daughters for a short time before moving to Davenport.

Survivors include two daughters, Diane Thomas of Santa, Idaho, and Janice Miller of Rochester, Ill; three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Her graveside service was held July 28 at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

Heat Wave Continues Lightning Sets Fires

Searing summer heat continued to hold the area in its grasp this week with temperatures reaching almost 100 degrees and some days above 100 for the past two weeks. Harvest also moved into high gear under the hot dry conditions, and only a small thunderstorm that produced just enough moisture to delay harvest work Monday morning slowed operations. The thunderstorm also brought lightning that ignited dozens of small fires. Most were quickly extinguished by professional fire fighters or volunteer crews.

The Department of Lands in Deary reported that 12 fires had been reported last week—nine of the fires in 1 night and 3 more the following night. A spokesperson for the fire warden said there were probably that many more fires that were set by the lightning, extinguished by volunteer help and never even reported.

Fire danger is listed as extreme.

Kendrick School District announced this week that school will begin Monday, Aug. 29. If you have a student who is new to the district, please contact the school so records may be sent for from his/her previous school.

Registration for high school students will be Thursday, August 25th and Friday, August 26th as follows: Freshmen and Seniors: 1:30 to 3:00 p. m. Thursday (the 25th).

Juniors and Sophomores: 10:00 to 12 noon Friday (the 26th).

The 8th graders will register the day school begins. The 7th graders will have an orientation meeting at the high school on Thursday, August 25, at 7:00 p. m.

All students will obtain lockers when they register. The school is not responsible for lost or stolen articles.
