## Mattie A. Allen, 100 Years Old, Passes August 3

Mattie A. Allen, a former Cedar Creek and Juliaetta resident died Wednesday, August 3 of causes related to age at the Lewiston Rehabilitation and Living Center. She was 100 years old.

She was born April 5, 1894, to Duncan and Matilda Alford McPhee at Harrisburg, Ore. The family moved to Kendrick in a covered wagon four years later.

She married George Garner Jan. 15, 1913, at Moscow. He died April 4, 1931.

She married Arley Allen Oct. 1, 1945, at Lewiston. The couple lived at Cedar Creek near Kendrick until 1952, when they moved to Juliaetta.

In 1989 they moved to Lewiston. Her husband died Sept. 3, 1992.

She was a member of the Juliaetta Seventh-day Adventist Church. Her hobbies included needlework, quilt making, crocheting, and cooking.

She is survived by two sons, Melvin Garner of Culeasac and Archie Garner of St. George, Utah; two daughters, Maxine Foster and Thelma Cuddy, both of Kendrick; 25 grandchildren; 60 great-grandchildren and 32 great-great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by a son, Marvin Garner; a daughter Eileen Souders; three sisters and a brother.

Services were conducted Monday, Aug. 8, at 10 o'clock at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel in Lewiston with Pastor Ron Schultz of the Seventhday Adventist Church officiating.

Organist was Ruth Slind and singers were Ann Parks and Duane Meske who sang "Whispering Hope" and "Good Night and Good Morning".

WHEREAS the City Council deems it in the public interest that the real property de-scribed in Section 1 of this Ordinance, adjacent to the existing City boundaries, be annexed into the City; and, WHEREAS a public hearing was held before the City Council and it was determined that saidannexation is provided for under existing law, that the proposed zoning is suitable and com-patible with surrounding land uses, that said land uses would fit in with the general development of the City, and that such zoning would be in the best interest of the citizens of the City.

zation coordinator for the Department of Health and Welfare, said, "Students won't be allowed to attend classes unless their immunizations are up to date and the school has a copy of their immunization record." However, she said, exemptions are allowed for medical, religious or personal reasons.

Fletcher said if a child has not received the required immunizations, parents should contact their doctor or local health department as soon as possible.

**Respite Services Available For Area Caregivers**

A new program providing temporary relief for caregivers of older persons in their homes is available in North Central Idaho.

Respite service may be provided on an intermittent or regular schedule. Trained volunteers relieve the caregiver while providing companionship and care to homebound individuals. They do not perform housework or domestic chores.

Respite volunteers receive training and travel reimbursement. The program is funded by a legislative appropriation from the Idaho Office on Aging, through the Area II Agency on Aging in Lewiston.

A family is eligible to receive in-home respite services if either the caregiver or the recipient are age 60 or older. To volunteer or to request respite services contact Nan at the Lewiston Retired Senior Volunteer Program office, 746-7787 or the Area Agency on Aging, 1-800-877-3206.
