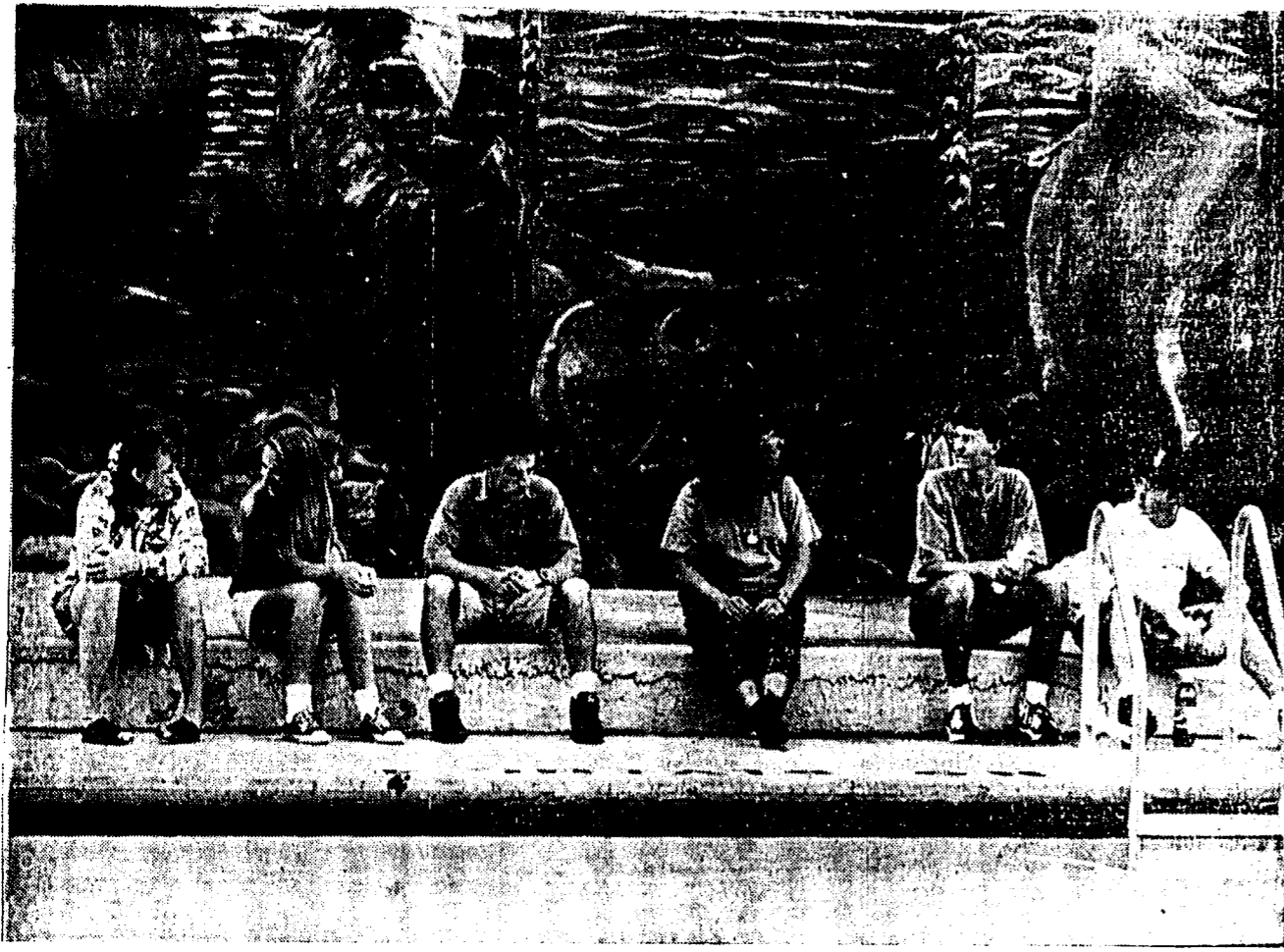


Young Artists Complete Swimming Pool Mural

Telephone Office Temporarily in Troy During Remodeling

Business offices of the Potlatch Telephone Co. in Kendrick will be temporarily moved to Troy while the local office undergoes a remodeling project, announced manager Jerry L. Brown. While the physical office and the staff will be in Troy, all telephone numbers will remain the same, Brown said. The change was effective Monday.

A drop box was installed on the west side of the Kendrick building and payments may be made there.

The entire interior of the Kendrick office will be re-modeled and the office enlarged as much as possible. Kensington Corp. of Lewiston is in charge of the project. Brown said that the work should be completed sometime in late November.

"We hope this temporary move and re-modeling isn't too inconvenient for our customers," Brown said Thursday afternoon, and added "we appreciate the patience and understanding of the public."

George M. Giese, 93, Retired Fix Ridge Farmer, Dies Aug. 19

George M. Giese, a retired Fix Ridge farmer, died Friday, Aug. 19 at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston of Cancer. He was 93.

He was born Dec. 3, 1900, to Julius and Suzanna K. Denner Giese on Fix Ridge, near Juliaetta, Idaho. He was born and raised on the family farm, where he worked when he finished his schooling.

He married Glatha Gwendolyn Woodruff Dec. 29, 1925, at Lewiston. She died in March of 1972.

He assumed ownership of the farm in 1936 after his father's death, and operated it until semi-retirement in 1964, when he moved to Lewiston. He fully retired in his late 70s. He remained active and drove his car until July of this year.

He married Hazel Gertrude (Wills) Nelson Jan. 15, 1976, at Coeur d'Alene. She died October 3, 1991.

He was the first farmer in the area to use bulk tanks on combines which eliminated the need for sack sewers when harvesting. He was also the first farmer in the area to grow peas and one of the first to use a combine harvester.

He was a Lewiston city council member after his retirement.

Survivors include a daughter, Gwendolyn (Teddy) Poleson of Lewiston; a son, Bruce A. Giese of Juliaetta; two brothers, Alfred Giese of Los Angeles and Carl Giese of Temple City, Calif.; a sister, Susan Albright of Milwaukee, Ore.; four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Three brothers, Herman, Jay, and Adolph and one sister, Margaret Pippen, died previously.

The funeral was held Tuesday at Grace Lutheran Church in Lewiston. Burial was at Fix Ridge Cemetery.

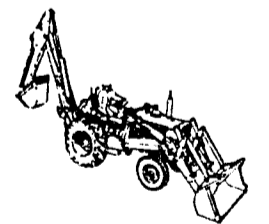
