

Mustangs Edge Tigers 30-26 In Grid Opener

The value of those points-after-touchdowns was never demonstrated more clearly than last Friday night on the KHS football field when the Kendrick Tigers met the Deary Mustangs to open the 1994 eight-man season. Both teams scored four touchdowns — Kendrick converted just one of its touchdowns; Deary converted three—Deary won 30-26. It was a contest that was closely watched, not only locally but across the state because Deary is the defending state champs and Kendrick had been ranked number one in this season prior to the Friday game.

Friday's game was interesting to watch and the Mustangs and Tigers appeared to be closely matched. Both showed good offense, strong defense and had the potential to make the "big" plays.

Kendrick scored first and led most of the game until the final six minutes when the Mustangs drove back to score after staging a goal line stand against the Tigers.

The Tigers had won the coin flip and elected to receive. Taj Anderson picked up the opening kick on the 23 and brought it back out to his own 35. Two plays up the middle netted only two yards against a strong Deary defense before Tiger quarterback Craig Tefft passed to Tyler Ogle who brought the ball close to mid-field. Anderson rammed the ball down to the Deary 10 and then to the 4 and again to the 3. Tefft picked up 1 yard and then passed to end Toby Foster who took the ball on the 2 yard line and scored. Anderson took a pass from Craig for the extra two points.

The Tigers controlled the ball for the first 7 minutes of the game.

The Mustangs didn't take long to get back in the game and on the score board. Deary's good quarterback Ryan Holden moved the Mustangs downfield quickly and one the Tiger 16 yard line he passed to Aaron Workman, who scored. The Tigers stopped the conversion try and it was 8-6 at the end of the first quarter.

Kendrick scored again in the second period as he moved the Tigers down to Deary 31 with a pass to end Tim Tanata and then passed to Anderson from there, and Anderson raced those final yards for another 6 points. Tefft was sacked by the Mustangs as he tried to pass for the extra points.

Deary answered that Tiger score and tied the game at 14-all with 1:59 remaining in the half as Jeff Henderson took a Holden pass on the KHS 39 and ran across to score. Holden ran over the extra points.

In the third quarter Tefft picked off a Holden pass and returned the ball to the DHS 30 where Anderson galloped those final yards to put Kendrick back in the lead 20-14 at the conversion try failed again for the Tigers.

Once again Deary's Aaron Workman answered the challenge and took a Holden pass to score on a play covering 63 yards. Deary now led for the first time in the game 22-20.

About four minutes later Tefft found end Tim Tanata open and passed to him for the final Kendrick score as the Tigers led again 26-22 after a running conversion try failed.

The Tigers continued their attack after holding the Deary team to downs. The Tigers moved the ball down to the Deary 1 yard line and it was there that Deary put on one of its famous goaline stands—holding the Tigers to downs and taking over own its own 1. With less than six minutes remaining.

The Mustangs got a little breathing room on two runs up the middle and then Holden unloaded a 78 yard bomb to Randy Woods who just outran the Tiger defenders to the goal-line and a 30-26 victory after Aaron Griffin added the final two points.

Heart Attack Claims Life of James Dorendorf

James Eli Dorendorf, Sr. of Billings, Mont., who was born and raised in the Crescent-Southwick area until he was 7, died Aug. 5 at Idaho Falls in his truck of a heart attack.



Jim was born January 4, 1937 at Crescent to Walter and Ida Forrest Dorendorf. His parents divorced when he was 5 and his mother moved in with his grandparents at Bingville, over where Bud Adamson now lives. He attended first grade at Golden Rule Schoolhouse which sat at the corner of the Glen Betts place, now owned by Earl Lawrence. They then moved to Peck where he attended grade school and later high school at Orofino. They lived at various places before settling in Missoula, Mont., where at the age of 17 he became a truck driver.

He married Julie Ann Pliflet on Jan. 14, 1967 at Missoula. The couple lived at Hamilton where he drove a logging truck for various companies. The family then moved to Watford, North Dakota, where he hauled crude oil to the oil refineries. From Watford the family moved to their present home at Billings, Mont., where he hauled lumber in the winter and road oil during the summer, mostly to Boise and Idaho Falls.

He is survived by his wife at the family home; sons Mark and his wife Terri and Jim, Jr., and his wife Terri, all of Billings; a daughter, Anna Arensmeyer and husband Darrel of Laurel, Mont.; two grandchildren, Haillie Arensmeyer and sister Mackenzie Juko was born 12 days after Jim's death; three step-grandchildren, Misty, Nikki and Bobby Dione. He is also survived by two sisters, Dorothy Shanklin of Escondido, Calif., and Sharon Reese of Missoula; tree half brothers, Art and Gary Pamin and Steve Bidlake, all of Missoula; and aunt Adaline Jassman of Juliaetta and numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his parents, grandparents and numerous aunts and uncles.
Jim drove a truck for 40 years as an independent and for various companies in the region. He was known by many drivers on the road for his courtesy and helpfulness. He was respected and loved by all who knew him.

Cremation has taken place and memorial services were held Wednesday, Aug. 10, at the Peace Lutheran Church at Billings.

National Grange Redirects Priorities

At its August 16 meeting Kendrick Grange discussed the redirection of National Grange priorities as outlined in the August-September issue of Grange Today. National overseer and Executive Committee Chm., Kermit Richardson, was quoted there as saying, "The major emphasis of the Grange will be 'family' and all programs, projects, publicity, and activities (will) be designed to achieve this goal."

According to National Master Robert Barrow, the Executive Committee's action is, "a permanent redirection to emphasize the family in ALL aspects of the Grange." The national office stresses, however, that the Grange is not abandoning agriculture, but simply shifting priorities.

"We recognize that agriculture should and always will be a part of the Grange, but we feel that family life values, and family policy is what the majority of our members relate to today." Some see the redirection as an attempt to make a declining Grange more attractive to potential members.

While attendance at the August 16 meeting was disappointing, those present were positive about the need for Kendrick Grange to consider planning family activities that would attract new members. A larger representation of the membership will be necessary, however, before specific steps can be taken to redirect local priorities.

Reflecting its community service emphasis of recent years, the Grange that evening expressed appreciation to the faithful crew of Grangers who so far have turned out nineteen cuddly stuffed animals for distribution to youngsters in hospitals statewide. Additional stuffed toys are in production and will be taken to State Grange this fall. The group also considered the latest congressional efforts at health care reform.

Under new business, the Master was directed to write the Kendrick City Council requesting that the plum tree in front of the Grange Hall be removed and that a tree more appropriate for Main Street be put in its place. The Grange is willing to pay for a replacement tree and for a new planter ring, the old one having been badly damaged either because of vandalism or an accident.

The target of children's destructive attempts to pick its bitter fruit, the tree has turned out to be an attractive nuisance and a potential liability for the city and the Grange as youngsters swing on it branches and attempt to climb into it. Broken limbs and smashed fruit (some of it splattered on walls and windows of the Grange Hall and other buildings) have not enhanced the appearance of Kendrick's Main Street.

The next meeting of Kendrick Grange will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 6 at 7:00 p. m. Latah County Pomona will meet in Kendrick's hall on Saturday, Sept. 10. More details in next week's paper.

Oscar Marvin Raby, a former Kendrick resident and a retired truck driver and Clarkston resident, died of Parkinson's disease Monday, August 29, at Tri-State Health and Rehabilitation Center at Clarkston. He was 91.

He worked as a truck driver for Star Dray Trucking and later for Zibel Trucking at Lewiston.

He was born April 14, 1903, at Teakean, Idaho to Marvin Oscar and Bina Elma Blackburn Raby.

He attended schools at Kendrick and married Edith Hollingsworth October 22, 1930, at Lenore, Idaho.

He lived in North Carolina, Moscow and Kendrick before moving to Clarkston in 1942.

He then went to work for Star Dray trucking and later worked at Zibel for 21 years before retiring.

He was a member of the Masonic at Kendrick and the United Methodist Church at Clarkston. He enjoyed wood working and crafts in his basement shop.

Survivors include his wife, Edith Raby of Clarkston; two daughters, Myra Luoma of Clarkston and Gwen Hufnagle of Sandusky, Ohio; a sister, Bina Eberhardt of Lewiston; 18 grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

A daughter, Phyllis Luoma; a son Gary Raby; a sister Grace Lind; and a grandson died previously.

His funeral will be conducted at 1 p. m. Thursday at Merchant Funeral Home at Clarkston, with burial to follow at Vineland Cemetery. The Rev. Floyd Green will officiate.

Kendrick School Hears of Building Plans for Schools

The August meeting of the Kendrick Jt. School District Board of Trustees was held Thursday, August 18, in the school library at Kendrick High School. Present at the meeting was architect Jim Bellamy of Coeur d'Alene who presented preliminary plans for classroom additions onto Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick Junior-Senior High School. The proposed plans included a 4 classroom addition onto Juliaetta Elementary School in Phase 1.

One of the classrooms will serve as a special education pre-school room in the morning, music room in the afternoon and stage for the elementary gymnasium in the evening. When the elementary school gymnasium was built in 1985 it was structurally built for a stage to be added later. The high school addition will include doubling the size of the library and an adjoining multi-use technology (computer) room. The present high school does not have a room designed for a computer lab.

Carmen Kenyon, a representative from the Juliaetta Elementary School parent advisory committee announced that there would be an open house Monday, October 3 to show the community the remodeling that has been done over the past four years. She invited the board members to be our guides for the public that evening. The remodeling includes a new kindergarten room, 6th grade classroom, 2 handicap restrooms, school and principal offices and a new kitchen and cafeteria. This remodeling has been funded from the 10-year plant facility levy without additional taxes to the property owner. The plant facility levy buys a new bus every other year and allows money for remodeling and upgrading facilities on the alternate years. It extends until 1999.

Bruce Allred from First Security Corporation of Salt Lake City explained to the board the various options they would have for selling bonds without raising any property owner's taxes, since the 1985 bond for constructing the elementary gymnasium will be retired in February, 1995. The new bond would not go into effect until the following tax year, thus continuing the same payments with voter approval for 12 years. He explained 2 reasons that it is possible to borrow more money than the \$530,000 in 1985 when interest rates were at 8.5%. One of the reasons is that interest rates are now in the 6% range for tax free public entity bonds. A second way is by extending the length of the payment by two years to 12 years. It is estimated that this six classroom addition would cost in the \$700,000 range.

Mr. Allred also explained that the bond payments could be structured for a re-entry after 6 years of the 12-year loan in case further growth required even more rooms. By again going to the voters after six years for the additional monies needed to build additional rooms, the loan could be restructured for a wrap around loan again, lengthening the repayment and reducing the yearly payments. Mr. Allred further commented that tax free bonds are extremely popular with investors because they are exempt from both Idaho state and federal income taxes.

He commented that the 2% savings on state income taxes added onto the 6% real earnings from the bonds make them a very attractive investment. Federal income tax savings would make the tax free bonds even a better return.

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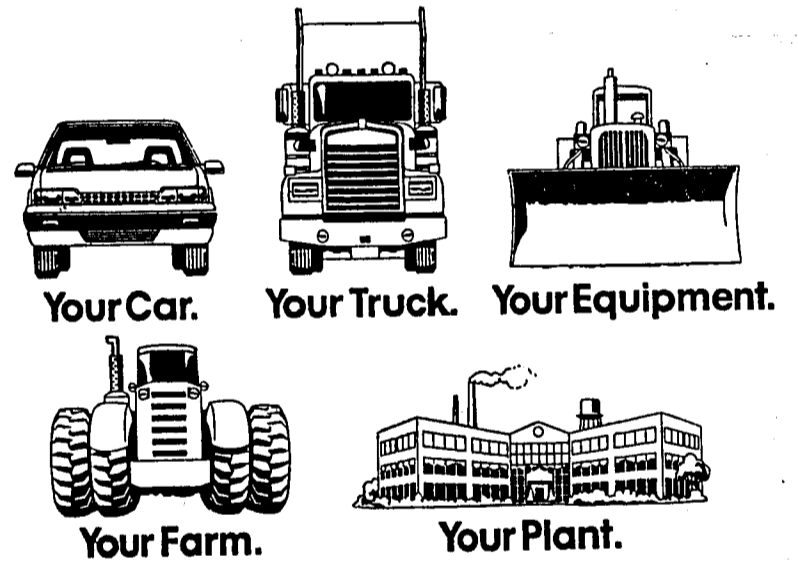
