Mullan Outscores Tigers 58-38

Turnovers plagued the KHS football team last Friday night and Tiger Coach Kevin said that played a major role in the outcome as the Mullan squad defeated Kendrick 58-38 on the Mullan field.

The Friday game was a non-league contest and Kendrick is now 0-2 on the season.

It was a typical wide-open, 8-man game and Tiger quarterback Craig Tefft ripped the Panthers offensively, completing 11 of his 15 passes for 411 yards. Running back Taj Anderson caught four of Tefft's passes for 230 yards and three touchdowns.

Mullan scored first in the opening quarter on a three yard run. Tefft's pass to Robyn Koepf for 34 yards and six points answered that score, but the Panther's David Reed put Mullan ahead to stay with a 54 yard run. Mullan then tallied three unanswered touchdowns in the second quarter and had a comfortable 32-6 halftime advantage.

In the second half Tyler Ogle went one yard for a Tiger score and Steve Hill added two more points, catching the conversion pass from Tefft.

Mullan ran up three more touchdowns before Tefft took to the air again, passing successfully to Taj Anderson on 65 and 64 yard bombs. Passes from Tefft to Anderson and Koepf converted both scores.

Reed scored for Mullan on a 45 yard pass play and the Tefft to Anderson pass covering 67 yards closed out the scoring.

The Tigers will be on the road again this week, going up the hill to meet the Trojans of Troy Friday night at 7:00.

Four brothers and one sister preceded her in death.

She is survived by two sons, Ken Wolff and Warren Wolff of Lewiston; a daughter, Lois Broeckel of La Crosse, Wash.; three sisters, Bertha McCall of Lewiston, Joanne Newman and Zelma Taylor, both of Richmond, Calif.; a brother, Oscar Hartung of Clarkston; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held Tuesday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston. Burial was at Normal Hill Cemetery at Lewiston.

School Enrollment Shows Increase

Enrollment continues to climb at Juliaetta Elementary School setting a new school record for the number of students. Enrollment peaked in late March at 207 for the 1993-94 school year. School enrollment opened this school year at 209 with another 5 or 6 names of students who are to be attending in the next 2 or 3 weeks. This 209 figure is up 65 students from 144 students 30-36 months ago.

Three classes have been split, thus creating 2 kindergartens, 2 first grades and 2 third grade classes. To make classrooms available the basement was remodeled adding one new classroom. Kindergarten can use the same classroom morning and afternoon. The third classroom was made possible by moving all the books and bookshelves out of the new elementary library (used only 1 year) and moved to the perimeter of the new cafeteria. Consequently, the new cafeteria is being used for cafeteria for breakfast and lunch, library storage, music room two periods a day and special education pre-school 2 mornings a week.

The enrollment at the high school is at 166, which is 11 students higher than it was 24 months ago, although it did reach this level once during the 1993-94 school year. The effects of the larger elementary classes will start increasing the high school enrollment next year.

Because of these enrollment increases the board of trustees at their regular August meeting took action on a resolution to run a bond election, Tuesday, October 18 for a 6-classroom addition (4 at the elementary school and 2 at the high school). This bond election should not raise property taxes because the present bond issue that built the elementary gymnasium addition in 1985 will be retired in February of 1995. This new 6 classroom addition bond issue will extend the length of the bond payments for an additional 12 years at the same level.
