## Brammer comments On ambulance District proposal

There was a meeting in Kendrick Sept. 8, telling us we should have a county-wide ambulance District. Dr. Lon Miller said we then could levy property taxes to pay for more equipment and hire people to run it.

He said if we levied 0.4 on the property tax it would bring in about \$120,000 yearly, and it would cost everyone \$40 a year on \$100,000 of market value. What he didn't say is how his plan would spread the costs to individuals.

Here's how his plan would work: the average market value for homes in small towns is \$40,000, after the homeowners exemption is applied, they would pay on \$20,000. Apply Dr. Miller's tax rate and homeowners would pay \$8 yearly. The average farmer with \$300,000 of market value would pay \$120 yearly. The average business would pay \$85 yearly.

This is unfair. People of this area, think about this! With what Dr. Miller outlines for expenditures for equipment and labor, I'm sure the costs would skyrocket.

Once they get their foot in the door, we in this area could lose control of our taxing and possibly the good ambulance services we now have in this area.

It is time we accept our financial responsibility as individuals to pay for what we want.

To do this, we must stop discriminating against minorities.

Why should people living in a taxing district have the right to tax people that do not live here and the service is not available to them?

Why should the majority of people living in a taxing district have the right to impose 15 times more taxes on farmers than they impose on themselves for the same ambulance service? This is unconscionable.

I would like to suggest a plan that's fair to all and how to get money for our ambulance. There is a bill in the legislature that would allow us to levy taxes on households, the same as garbage fees. We must get this passed.

If we used the Kendrick School District as the ambulance district, we would have about 1,000 households, if we assessed \$20 on each one we would have \$20,000 yearly. With this we could pay our volunteers and buy more equipment, but most of all, the local people would be in control.

The present tax system not only divides us, it causes hatred among our people at the county level.

Isn't it time for us to work together as a community, treat each other fairly and be concerned about each other? With this kind of attitude we will create a wonderful place to live.

He was born March 3, 1930, at Southwick, Idaho, to Ben P. and Miriam Blewett Cook. He attended schools at Genesee, Craigmont and Kendrick, where he graduated from high school.

He joined the U. S. Army in 1948. He graduated from the University of Idaho in 1953.

He married Bernice Fox March 18, 1956, at Lewiston. After their marriage the couple moved to Longview, Wash. They lived at various locations along the coast in Washington before moving to Port Angeles about 10 years ago.

He was an area director for the Washington State Employment Security Department. He retired in 1982 after a 30-year career. He continued with the department for the next 10 years on a part-time basis.

He enjoyed farming, fishing and spending time with his family. He was an active member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Bruce Cook of Portland and Seth Cook of Port Angeles; three daughters, Leslie Schrette of Issaquah, Wash., Jill Hurworth of Pendleton, Ore., and Cynthia Jensen of Bellingham, Wash.; two sisters, Donna Goff of Chaska, Minn., and Gwen Deobald of Kendrick; and a brother, Ben B. Cook of Onario, Oregon.

The funeral was held at 3 p. m. Monday at the First Baptist Church at Port Angeles with the Rev. Bob Burchell officiating.

Burial will be at Ocean View Cemetery at Port Angeles.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Ben P. Cook Scholarship Fund, care of Lewis-Clark State College, Lewiston, ID 83501.

## Tigers blitz Trojans 62-22 with passes

Kendrick's football team got into the winning column for the first time this season behind the strong passing arm of quarterback Craig Tefft who drew eight touchdowns passes to lead the Tigers to a 62-22 victory over the Troy Trojans Friday night at Troy in a Whitepine League 8-man game.

Tefft connected on 12 of his 17 attempts for 376 yards and no interceptions. Kendrick dropped its first two games to Deary and Mullan.

"It was probably the best game he ever played," Kendrick coach Kevin Driskill said of his veteran quarterback.

Tiger running back Taj Anderson was a favorite Tefft target Friday night, catching 5 passes for 178 yards and four touchdowns and also picking up 129 yards rushing on 12 carries.

End Tim Tanata was the receiver for three more Tefft passes for TDs covering 53, 10 and 74 yards.

Tyler Ogil got the Kendrick attack started with a 3 yard pass from Tefft in the first quarter.

Phil Brown closed out the Tiger offensive game in the final period with a 7 yard run.

Extra point tries continued to plague the Tigers as they converted only 4 or their nine touchdowns.

## Advisory Building Needs committee Continues work

In preparation for the up-coming school bond election on Tuesday, October 18, a volunteer ad hoc building needs committee has met four times with the district's architect, Jim Bellamy, from Coeur d'Alene. This building needs committee is advisory to the board of trustees.

Since the present bond issue, which built the Juliaetta elementary gymnasium, heating boiler room and girls restroom addition in 1985 will be retired in February, the bond election October 18 would not raise property taxes but continue them at the same level for a period of 12 years, allowing the school district to make classroom additions onto both schools that are desperately needed. Four classrooms would be added at Juliaetta Elementary School and a 2-classroom addition would be added to the high school. One of the four classrooms at the elementary school would be a music room in the afternoon, federally required special education pre-school (3-5 yr. olds) in the morning and a stage available for evening or special event use. One of the classrooms at the high school would double the size of the existing library that no longer meets the recommended square footage of library space for the 10-year high school accrediting process. The other classroom will have multiple uses including a high tech computer lab that can eventually be networked.

The building needs committee spent its first meeting brainstorming ideas for the new additions. The architect took these ideas and brought them back to the second meeting in the form of preliminary plans. The third meeting was held on Tuesday, Aug. 23, and the architect and committee toured four school facilities (3 in Clarkston and 1 in Lewiston): Heights Elementary School library, computer room and music room; Lincoln Middle School library and computer room; Clarkston High School library and computer room, and Lewiston High School library. Many ideas were added to the plans as a result. One was a platform of steps that can be pulled out from the apron of the 25' stage that not only can be used as an access to the stage but also rises for musical groups using the stage.

Building advisory committee members are: Brenda Lohman, Suzanne Brammer, Bob Callison, Ann Anderson, Joanne Gertje, Roz Denner, Emily Fredenberg, Gale Vallem and Eldon Taylor.

Registrars from the 3 counties (5 precincts) are planning on having a table at the Friday, Sept. 16 spaghetti feed at the high school for new community members and those patrons who did not vote in the last general election to register for the October 18 bond election. Likewise, members who have moved recently within the school district should register so that their names are on the right county computer list, thus not having the election judges question the voter's residency status. The spaghetti feed is a fund-raiser for the Laura Spitzer concert. Ms. Spitzer is a pianist who travels throughout the west in a truck with her own grand piano. She will be putting on 2 assemblies for the schools and a public concert at Kendrick High School on Sunday afternoon at 8 o'clock Sept. 25.

## Senior Center Lowers Rent

In an attempt to see more public use made of the Golden Sunset Senior Center and to improve its cash flow (which is threatened by increasing costs of maintenance and operation), the center's Board last week voted to lower its rental charge for meetings to \$15.00. Use of both the hall and kitchen facilities, however, will continue to cost \$35.00.

The Board also is planning a fund-raising breakfast for some time in October, returning to having the traditional twice-a-year breakfasts to help raise funds for the center's operation.

### MOTORCYCLE RIDERS MUST NOW GET LICENSE ENDORSEMENT TO RIDE

As of Sept. 1, Idaho's motorcycle riders must have an endorsement to ride on public roads, thanks to a new law passed by the 1993 Idaho Legislature. There are over 38,000 Idahoans with motorcycles registered to them.

Idaho is the last state in the nation to require riders to have a motorcycle endorsement. Before the law, Idaho had no minimum competency requirement for motorcycle operators. Anyone with a valid driver's license could legally operate a motorcycle on public roads, even if they had never ridden before.

The intent of the new law is to reduce motorcycle accidents and injuries, especially to riders under 21, who account for about one-third of motorcycle accidents in Idaho. Motorcycle safety is critical because a motorcyclist involved in an accident is very likely to be injured. In Idaho in 1992, 88 percent of motorcyclists involved in accidents were injured; more than 32 percent were critical or fatal injuries. In comparison, the percentage of people in car crashes that sustain a critical or fatal injury is just over 4 percent.

If you apply for a driver's license or license after Aug. 31, you must obtain a motorcycle endorsement.

Existing riders have two to four years, depending on their age, to get a motorcycle endorsement without being required to take a rider safety course or skills test. Existing riders under 21 have until Sept. 1, 1996 to get an endorsement by taking only a written knowledge test. If you are under 21 and apply for the endorsement after Sept. 1, 1996 you will have to complete a motorcycle riders training course.

Existing riders 21 and older have until Sept. 1, 1998 to get their motorcycle endorsement by passing a written motorcycle knowledge test. After Sept. 1, 1998, in addition to the written test, motorcyclists will have to pass a motorcycle skills test before receiving the endorsement.

The endorsement fee is \$20. An instruction permit to allow you to train for your skills test is also \$20. The cost of the skills test is \$5. The written knowledge test costs \$3. The

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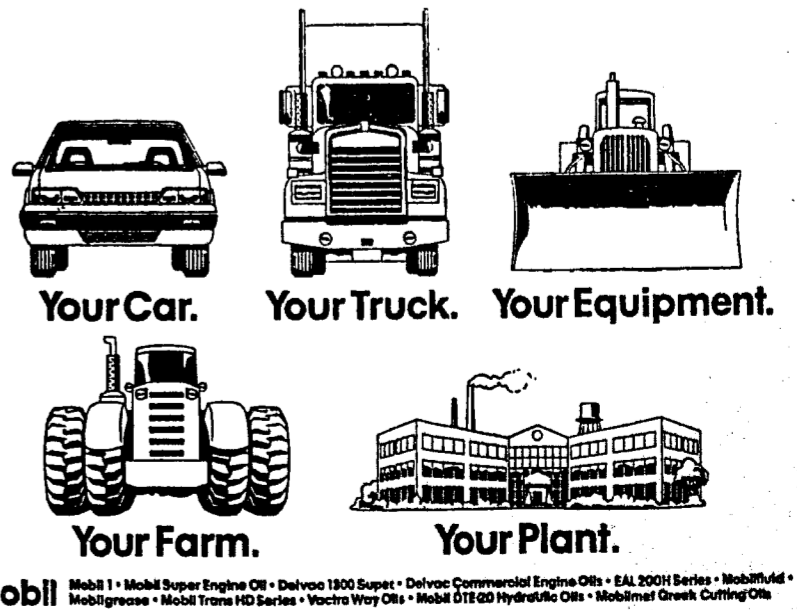
