## High School Students Prepare for "PSAT" Tests

High school juniors and some sophomores are getting ready to take the PSAT test (pre-college achievement tests). These will be given on Tuesday, Oct. 11 at the school. Each student wishing to take the PSAT needs to pay \$8.00 at the high school office by October 7. Those who are considering a 4-year college should sign up.

Seniors are encouraged to take the ACT or the SAT test if planning to attend a 4-year college. ACT dates are October 22 and December 10. (Registration for these dates are Sept. 23 (late registration, Oct. 7) and Nov. 10, respectively). SAT test dates are Nov. 6, and Dec. 4, with respective registration dates of Sept. 30 and Oct. 28. Registration packets may be obtained from Mrs. Kirkham, counselor.

Scholarship information can be obtained by looking at the scholarship board in the hallway or from the Career Information System (CIS) at the high school. In addition to scholarships, the program also has invaluable information on completing job applications, interviewing skills, resume writing, career inventories, etc. Should a student receive scholarship search information from private companies that require a fee, please check it out thoroughly. Many of these companies border on being a "scam" and the same information is available from CIS at no cost. If money is required for the service that is offered and results are GUARANTEED you will need to document all communication with the sources they send, lest you lose the money you sent. Check with Mrs. Kirkham if you have questions.

Schools across the state are conducting statewide testing of 4th, 8th and 11th graders. Kendrick and Juliaetta will be testing the morning of October 13. It is suggested students get a good night's sleep and adequate nutrition for best performance. Parents should note that the State has changed from spring testing to fall testing beginning this year. Other grades, however, will be administered tests in the spring.

## School Board Reviews Preliminary Plans

The Kendrick school board of trustees reviewed the preliminary plans of the additions to Juliaetta Elementary School and Kendrick Junior and Senior High School at the October board meeting last Thursday evening.

Jim Bellamy, the district's architect from Coeur d'Alene, sent the plans to the board before he submitted them to the State Dept. of Education in Boise. This plan review is in preparation for the \$700,000 bond issue before the electors, Tuesday, October 18. This bond issue should not raise property tax because the present bond that built the Juliaetta Elementary School gymnasium, girls restroom, and boiler room will be retired in February of 1995. This bond issue will continue the payments for an additional 12 years and add 4 classrooms at Juliaetta Elementary and 2 classrooms at Kendrick High School.

One feature the board noted was the handicap accessibility to the Juliaetta stage/preschool and music room. The architect included it in the hallway design so that extra square footage would not have to be taken up for this accessibility. The stage is designated to be 25 inches off the gymnasium floor and the hallway will meet the state and federal regulations of handicap ramps of rising 1" per foot in the 25 feet that leads up to the door. This room will have a handicap toilet which is accessible by 2 doors, one from the stage/preschool/music room side and one from the new addition student restroom side.

The board also noted that the high school addition plans show the new computer room built directly south of the existing cafeteria. The computer lab will have two sets of sliding glass doors with 12-ft. openings. One set of glass sliding doors will allow accessibility into the cafeteria and other set of glass sliding doors on the east side will allow accessibility into the library addition. This feature of openings on two sides will give this computer lab multi-use capabilities. The computer lab could be used for a total class using the computers as a word processor. Likewise, the glass sliding doors can shut off the library and open up into the cafeteria for large group activities either during school hours or during the evening. Furthermore, the glass sliding doors on both sides of the computer lab can be shut and used strictly as a computer lab or as a conventional classroom. The computers will be located around the perimeter of the lab so that the center of the room can have conventional tables or furniture.
