Laura spent Saturday preparing for the Sunday concert, making phone calls and getting in a little practice. Even as the Jr. High students began arriving at the school for their dance, Laura very calmly continued her practicing with muffled Rock and Pop music being played in the cafeteria.

Laura spent her evenings while here with Bud and Marilyn Eichner, which was enjoyed by both parties. Sunday, Sept. 25, brought much anticipation and preparation as the concert time approached. A crowd of approximately 250 people from Kendrick, Juliaetta, Troy, Moscow, Lewiston, Clarkston and Prairie found their seats and waited for Miss Spitzer's performance. Laura Spitzer took center stage and gave to the audience a concert they will never forget. She made each piece of music and it's composer seem so real and interesting through her stories and when she sat down and played the crowd was mesmerized by her swift fingers and the sheer beauty of the music. At intermission she didn't hide herself away, but went to the cafeteria and greeted people and signed autographs. The second half of the concert was just as breath-taking as the first and she finished to a standing ovation.

The next morning at 9:00 she gave a school show for the elementary students and also 4th through 6th grades from Troy Elementary and a home school family from Troy. Her program started with a story of Mozart at age three and continued through many composers and styles. She had the students entranced, especially when she had a student come up and her demonstrate that Classical music and Rock and Roll are built from the same foundation. At 10:20 the Jr. High-School came for their program and Miss Spitzer gave them an incredible performance as well. At 2:00 that afternoon, some strong, young high school students helped her load up her piano onto her truck. Her next stop was Arlington, Washington to continue her mission of bringing classical music to communities in the Northwest.

Laura Spitzer brought us beauty, and those who saw her and met her will never forget this lady who came to Kendrick with her piano. We wish her well.

Supt. Responds to Bond Issue Queries

On Tuesday, October 18, residents of Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will be asked to approve a \$700,000 bond issue to provide needed classroom space at both the Juliaetta and Kendrick High School. As the election approaches, Supt. Eldon Taylor said he is often asked certain questions by citizens about the issue. He has compiled some of those questions for a response. They include:

Question: Why is it being said that this bond issue will not raise that portion of property taxes that covers bond indebtedness?

Answer: Because the current bond indebtedness was a result of the 1984 bond election that built the Juliaetta Elementary gymnasium, boiler room and girls' restroom. This bond indebtedness will be paid off in February of 1995. This bond election will extend the current bond payments another 12 years.

Question: How are you able to increase the amount of the bond indebtedness for \$700,000 versus the \$530,000 in 1984 for the payments?

Answer: There are 3 reasons for this. First, the interest rates today are about 3 percentage points lower than they were in 1984—5.5%-6% range versus 8.5%-9% for tax free municipal entities. Second, by extending the pay back 2 years—in 1984 the payback was 10 years, this 1994 bond indebtedness is scheduled for a 12-year pay back. Third, the market value of Kendrick School District No. 283 has increased from \$50-plus million (50,715,596 to 64-plus million (64,234,736) from 1984 to 1995. Thus a similar tax levy assessed against a larger market value will generate more money.

Question: What is the current tax rate on our bonded indebtedness?

Answer: It is \$1.37 per thousand. Thus a \$100,000 farm or business has a current \$137 tax load on the bond indebtedness. \$50,000 home has a \$37.68 tax load (\$50,000-\$5,000 lot equals \$45,000x50% home owner exemption equals \$22,500 plus \$5,000 equals \$27,500 x \$1.37 equals \$37.68). The tax load because of the \$13 million assessed market value increase (\$50.7 to \$64.2 plus million) from 1984 to 1994 has actually gone down from \$1.94 to \$1.37, although one has to also consider the increase of market value of his/her given piece of property to see if there has been a tax savings over the same 10-year period.

Clay Classes to Begin For Children Oct. 18

Linda Canary, an art teacher from from Moscow, will be coming to Kendrick and Juliaetta on Tuesdays and Thursdays to teach 2 classes in claymaking beginning Oct. 18. The Tuesday class will be after school in the Juliaetta School cafeteria and is for children in grades 2 through 5. The Thursday class will be held on the high school stage after school and is for students grades 6 through 9. The classes run for 6 weeks.

Students will be able to make pinch pots, coil pots, boxes, masks and small houses and animals. They will also be able to glaze their creations. These will make excellent Christmas presents. The class will cost \$20. Some scholarships will be available.

The Kendrick-Juliaetta Arts Committee is sponsoring this class and is being subsidized in part by the Latah County Arts and Culture Committee. Registration forms will be handed out at school or you can register by calling Ellen Magnuson 289-3941 or Betty McMahan 289-4561.

Remodeling Project Complete at Local Grocery Store

The Heinen family has recently completed a remodeling and enlargement project on their Kendrick grocery store that added 5,000 square feet to the business, added several new departments, increased the size of other sections, and even changed the name of the business to "Phil's Family Foods". The family and staff will have a remodeling sale beginning Wednesday, Oct. 12, to introduce the new facilities to the community.

Phil and Donna Heinen purchased the grocery in 1973. The store was operated for many years by N. B. Long and Sons. When the last remaining Long brother, Marvin, retired in the 1960s, he sold the business to Ernie Erickson and Brick Hunter who operated the firm until they sold it several years later. That owner, in turn, sold to Phil and Donna. The Heinens greatly increased the services offered, but were unable to enlarge the physical facilities until the Kendrick Fire Dept. built its new fire station by the park. To Heinens also acquired the old Rosenau building and this summer were able to begin the long-planned remodeling and building project.

Also adding to the decision to make this substantial investment in their future, was the fact that their two sons, Scott and Aaron, decided to join the family business. Scott has been with the store for 17 years and Aaron, although he "grew up" in the grocery business, formally joined the management this spring after his graduation from LCSC. Also helping at the store when she is not attending school at LCSC is daughter Danette Horrocks. Scott's wife Helen, and Aaron's wife Diane, also work at the store as their schedules permit. It really is Phil's "Family" Foods.

The remodeling and additions to the grocery has meant an increased staff. Joining Pat Holt, Hazel Jones, and Wilda Clemenhagen, who have been with Heinens since 1973, are Debbie Miller, Lynette Simmons, and Kaye Morey. Other parttime is at the store as needed.

Added departments in the store now include a new bakery and deli that offers homemade breads, rolls, pastries and cakes including special order items, and a variety of homemade pies. The deli features a variety of homemade salads, sandwiches plus barbecued meats such as

chickens, beef and pork. A new feature is the addition of an Espresso coffee bar and Coca Cola fountain drinks. The remodeling project also expanded the frozen food section, added a 20-ft. walk-in beverage cooler, and expanded the video section and greeting card displays.

Phil's now also have propane refilling capabilities for RVs and other uses that are conveniently accessible.

"The new added space will help us buy in larger quantities and pass the savings on to the customers," Phil said. More space will allow the market to offer and display more products and have larger promotions at the holidays.

This large investment and commitment to the future was all made possible by the fine support they have received by the Kendrick-Juliaetta communities and the surrounding area for the past 21 years, Phil said. "We are really grateful for the friendship and patronage."

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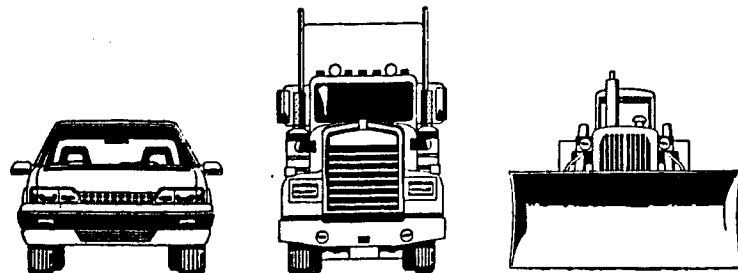
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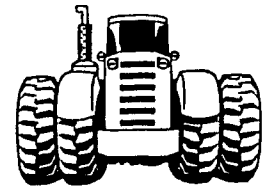
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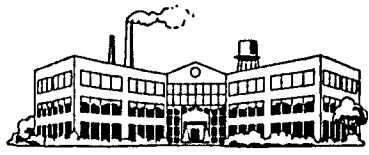

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, COUNTY OF LATAH, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated out of any monies in the treasury of the City of Kendrick, Idaho, not otherwise appropriated, and out of any revenue which the City of Kendrick may acquire between the first day of October, 1994, and the thirtieth day of September, 1995, the following sums:

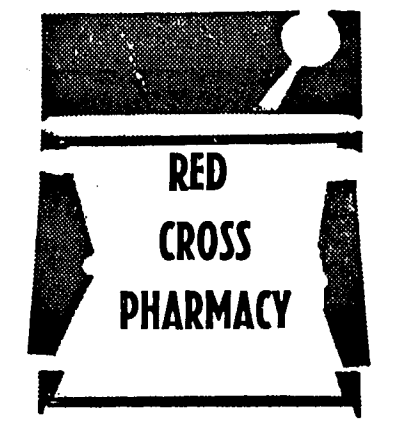
