William Ingle, 83, Former Resident, Claimed by Cancer

William W. Ingle of Hubbard, Ore., a former Kendrick area resident and University of Idaho alumni, died Sunday, Oct. 2, at a care center in Canby of cancer. He was 83.

He was born Aug. 27, 1911, to King D. and Florence Linnie Ingle at Kendrick, where he graduated from high school.



He graduated from the UI in 1933. He worked on the family farm on Bear Ridge for six years and then returned to the UI, where he received a master's degree in soil science 1941.

After receiving his master's degree, he worked for the Soil Conservation Service at Palouse for two years before serving in the U. S. Army during World War II. He served for more than two years running a desert aid station for the Medical Corps in Iran.

He then attended officer school in Pennsylvania where he received a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant. He was appointed to serve as education and physical rehabilitation officer at Kennedy and Halloran General Hospital in New York City.

After his discharge in 1945 he was active in the Army Reserve as a captain from 1945 to 1956.

He married Adeline Olson March 22, 1943, at Berkeley, Calif.

He worked for 22 years as an agricultural fieldman and manager for Libby, McNeil and Libby at Portland, Ore., Kent, Ore., and Salem, Ore. In 1970, he received his real estate license and worked as an agent for several years.

In 1974, he traveled to Iran as an agricultural consultant for the Near East Foundation. After returning to the United States in 1975, he sold real estate until 1978, when he resumed working as an agricultural fieldman for Claremont Foods near Hillsboro, Ore. He retired in 1984.

The Diamond Pioneer Agricultural Career Achievement award was presented to him in 1986 by the College of Agricultural Sciences at Oregon State University in recognition of his work with farmers and cannery processors in the Willamette Valley.

He enjoyed gardening, hiking, reading and traveling. After his retirement, he and his wife traveled extensively both here and abroad.

On March 23, 1993, he and his wife celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

He is survived by his wife of Hubbard, Ore.; a daughter, Cheryl Olsen of Coupeville, Wash.; and two sisters, Alcie Nethken of Lewiston and Betty Olson of Albuquerque, N. M.

One brother, Gerald A. Ingle of Kendrick, died previously.

A memorial service will be held at a later date.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Oregon Horticulture Society or Oregon State University at Corvallis, Oregon.

Grange Contributes To Social Capital

At its last regular business meeting on October 4, Kendrick Grange discussed a variety of topics, contributing to what community planners call "social capital", that power required to bring about needed change. Without a dialogue going on in the various social groups within a community concerning local issues, efforts of planners can be frustrated, go nowhere.

The Grange, for example, talked about the Latah County Planning Commission's revised comprehensive plan, its purpose, its emphasis, and its relationship to the realities of the land, its resources, and a growing population.

The Grange also considered the challenge being faced by volunteer emergency ambulance services in the county and the proposal to establish a county government ambulance district to meet some of these challenges, which involve economics and personnel.

A proposal by Werner Brammer to underwrite the costs of such service by means of a tax on households rather than property was also discussed, as was the upcoming election.

Such discussions, the Grange feels, better enable the community to make informed decisions on issues facing it.

The next meeting of the Grange will be October 18 and will be a harvest potluck at 6:30 p. m. Everyone is welcome. But don't forget to vote first!

School District Votes on Bond Issue Tuesday, Oct. 18

Registered voters in Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will go to the polls Tuesday, Oct. 18 to approve or disapprove a major \$700,000 bond issue that would fund a building program at both Juliaetta Elem. and Kendrick High School to provide classrooms and other facilities. The polls will be open from 12 noon until 8:00 p. m. on Tuesday.

From the time the bond issue was first announced, Supt. of Schools Eldon Taylor has been asked questions about the bond and its affect on the district. Dr. Taylor has compiled a list of some of the more frequently asked questions, and here he responds to some of them.

Question: If the bond election passes, why are people saying that school bonds are good investments?
Answer: Because school bonds fall under the general investment category of municipal tax free bonds. This means that the interest derived from the principal an investor puts into school bonds are free of both Idaho Income Tax as well as Federal Income Tax. According to a First Security Corporation representative,

Bruce Allred, that spoke to the local school board in August, municipal bonds have been selling this fall in the 5½-6½% interest range. He further commented that if you add on another 2% savings on state income tax that most investors would enjoy plus another 2 to 3% savings in federal income tax, it makes the total investment in the double digit range. I understand ha here has been quite a lot of local interest expressed at the local bank should this \$700,000 block of bonds go on the market. Municipal bonds are relatively scarce and investment portfolio managers search the country trying to find them for investors.

Question: Are you sure that 4 additional rooms to the elementary school and 2 at the high school is going to be enough for a 12-year period with the current growth rate?
Answer: No, it's the simple answer. No one can predict how long this current economic upswing in Idaho is going to last, consequently bringing in new families to small communities. With the current price of classroom construction, no district can afford to place an additional tax burden on the property owners for enrollment that may or may not come about. Most districts can look at least 2 to 4 years down the path based upon current enrollment increases. This 6 classroom addition at the 2 school is a result of a 2-4 year projection based upon current needs and the recent enrollment increases. This is why Mr. Allred recommended to the board that the 12-year bond payment schedule be structured such that a re-entry clause, without financial penalty to the district, be put in place. Therefore if we got a new housing development we could take another look at our building needs. Our current status or needs at the elementary school is that we are 2 classrooms behind and a high probability that we will need a 3rd classroom as early as the next school year.

Question: Why, when asked if the bond issue will raise taxes, you answer, "it shouldn't"?
Answer: Because that is the most honest answer I can give anyone. Under the present laws, school districts on bond issues certify dollar amounts versus tax levy amounts. Therefore, certifying the same yearly dollar amount of present bond payment that will be retired in February is somewhat of a guessing game even with bankers and tax assessor helping you predict what the market value of a given school district is going to be for the upcoming school year. Judging the outcome of that answer based upon the previous 10 years, the dollar amount has actually come down from \$1.94 to \$1.37 per thousand. There are 2 scenarios that could cause that dollar amount to go up slightly. The first would be if your district's market value went down such as a major business went out. Secondly, we will have the bankers help up structure the loan payments so the new property owners will help bear the tax burden with existing owners so that the interest on the borrowed principal during construction will be built in the payment plan. During the 1984 bond election and the subsequent repayment of the bond, the school district had to pick-up 18 months of interest up-front and we do not have the cash flow to do it during the next bond repayment cycle. I would be surprised if the bankers would miscalculate it by more than 1%. If the laws were such that school districts could certify tax levy amounts, then we could assuredly tell you that the tax load in this case would be \$1.37 per thousand. This would be assessed on the market value no matter how it fluctuated.
