

Jerry Brown Retires From Phone Company After Thirty Years

As of September 30, Jerry Brown, manager of the Troy Telephone Co. and Potlatch Telephone Co., retired after dedicating his life to the business of telephony.

Jerry began his career with the telephone company working for Bud and Marilyn Eichner who were the owners of Potlatch Telephone Company in the 1950s. At this time, he also worked part-time for Dave Morton, who then was the owner of Troy Telephone Company. He participated in the conversions for both telephone companies to dial service. At the time when TDS acquired the Troy Telephone Company in August of 1973, Jerry was employed on a part-time basis, but was soon appointed to manager. TDS acquired Potlatch Telephone Company in 1988, whose service territory is contiguous with that of Troy Telephone, and Jerry was appointed manager there as well.

Jerry has seen many technological advances take place at the local telephone companies over the years. When Troy became part of the TDS family, multi-party service existed. From then on, he assisted in the coordination of service upgrades, reinforcements of all exchange plant facilities and switch replacements necessary to provide single party service to all customers at Troy, Potlatch and Asotin Telephone Companies.

"In my opinion, he is one of the most talented technicians we've ever been blessed with," said Charles Ricker, Sr. Vice President-Planning, Network Operations & Engineering at TDS TELECOM in Madison, Wisconsin. Jerry worked with Mr. Ricker from 1976 until 1990. "Jerry had an acute attention to detail—his garage was neater than the top of my desk! His affinity for this neatness reflected how he operated the company in terms of quality of service that he provided his customers." According to Ricker, Jerry Brown had always made himself available to projects when customer service was at stake. He spent several weeks at Home Telephone Company in Condon, Ore., helping put the company back together after a major ice storm hit the area in 1978. Many times he climbed with snow shoes to the top of Puffer Butte with Asotin Telephone Company manager Doug Paynter, to make repairs to Asotin's digital microwave system which served Asotin's Flora Troy exchange. Said Ricker, "He was soft-spoken, engaging, always very calm, and well-thought of by everyone throughout the TDS organization. Frankly, it's folks like him who have had a love affair with independent telephony. He's been a pioneer in making rural communications what it is today."

Another individual who worked with Jerry in the '80s, Gary Torbett, now Manager-District Operations in Oklahoma, said of him, "Jerry has been a tremendous asset to the community both with his technical and managerial contributions on behalf of the telephone companies as well as his political leadership." Gary also mentioned that when he worked with Jerry as a Network Operations Manager that it was a distinct pleasure. Jerry's expertise as an operating company manager of a small telephone utility was well known in Idaho and was well-respected by the Idaho PUC engineering staff.

Jerry's second life, beyond telephony, was devoted to his community. Having served on the Kendrick City Council for the last 18 years and the last four as Mayor of Kendrick, Jerry has dedicated himself as a public servant. He was a member of the Kendrick/Juliaetta Lions Club and he has worked with the Kendrick/Juliaetta Boy Scout Troop. Jerry also holds a ham radio operator's license and is known as an aficionado of radio communications. After his retirement, Jerry is looking forward to spending more of his time learning a new tool, that is, his new personal computer. He also plans to devote more time to community service.

Ervin N. Draper, Retired Leland Farmer, Dies Oct. 10

Ervin N. Draper, 72, a Leland farmer and former Kendrick resident, died Monday, Oct. 10 of emphysema at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston.

He was born Jan. 21, 1922, at Leland to Robert and Opal Vincent Draper. He graduated from Kendrick High School in 1940 and worked for Potlatch Forests Inc. during the winter of 1941.

In 1942 he joined the U. S. Navy and was discharged in February 1944. He started farming with his father at Leland in 1945 and continued until 1969.

He married Odetta Lohman Feb. 5, 1948, at Clarkston.

In 1969 they moved to Kendrick, where he worked for Brocke and Sons for 11 years until ill health forced his retirement. They moved to Lewiston in 1986.

He was a member of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars at Kendrick, and the First United Methodist Church at Lewiston. He is survived by his wife at the family home in Lewiston; a son, Gary Draper of Everett, Wash.; a daughter, Gayle Vandecar of Lewiston; his mother of Moscow; two sisters, Beulah Deobad of Moscow and Vivian Nachiem of Sun City, Ariz., and one grandson.

Cremation took place and a family memorial was held Friday at Mountain View Chapel at the Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston with the Rev. Jim Walker of the First United Methodist Church officiating.

Voters Approve Bond Issue by Wide Margin

Voters in Kendrick Jt. School District 283 went to the ballot boxes Tuesday in good numbers and approved a \$700,000 bond issue to construct classrooms and facilities at Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick High School. A total of 305 ballots were cast at the four polling places. There were 246 votes for passage of the bond issue and 59 votes against for an 81% approval margin. Bond issues require a two-thirds majority to carry.

"We are gratified and very appreciative of the continuing support the patrons of the district give their schools," said Supt. Eldon Taylor Tuesday night after the ballots were cast.

He was preceded in death by a son, Harold.

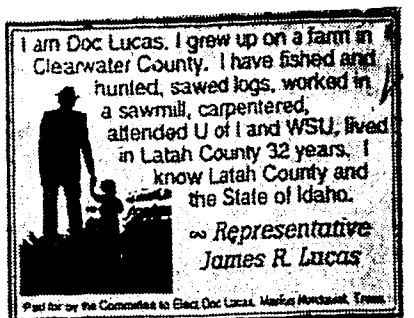

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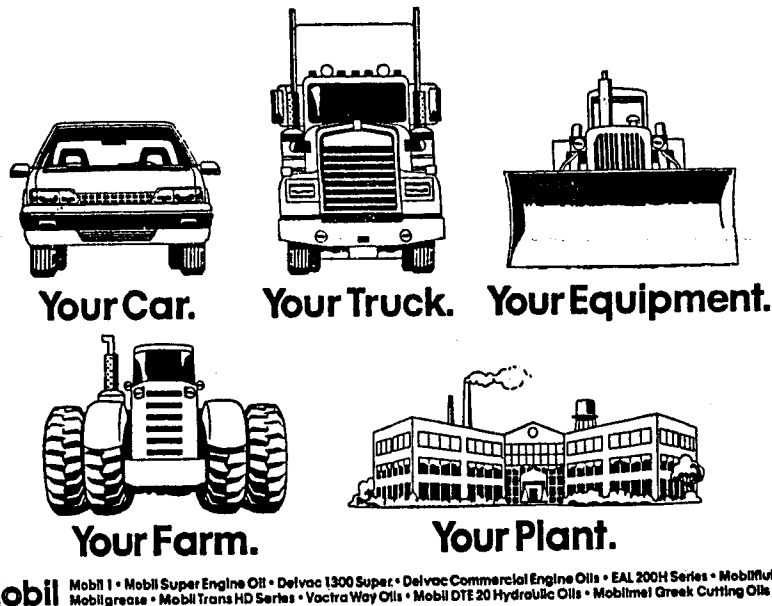

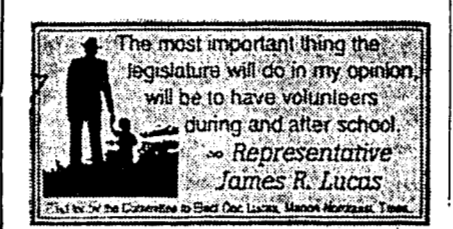
