Huskies Rally to Top Tigers 34-32

Kendrick Tiger football team almost pulled over the upset of the season against unbeaten Highland Huskies Saturday afternoon on the Highland field. Highland had to stage a final half rally and score the final 20 points of the game to keep its record intact.

The Huskies scored first in the opening quarter when Lucas Peery went 50 yards to tally.

Then the Tigers took the lead on a 45 yard run by Taj Anderson and two point conversion by Steve Hill from a pass by Craig Tefft. Robyn Koepf scored later in the first on a 35 yard run. In the second quarter Anderson drove in from four yards out and Tefft scored from the one-yard line. The Tigers led 26-12 at the half.

In the third quarter Tim Tanata scored on a 20 yard pass from Tefft and the Tigers led 32-14. Then the Huskies kicked its own offense into high gear and tallied the final three touchdowns. In the final seconds of the game the Tigers were down on the Huskie goal line but the Highland squad held fast and sacked quarterback Tefft to take over on downs with just seconds left in the game.

Statistically, the Tigers just blew the Huskies away, rolling up 459 yards total offense, 258 on the ground, while holding Highland to 156 offensive yards, but the Huskies made the big plays when they had to, and that was the difference.

Highland finishes the regular season with a 7-0 record, while Kendrick drops to 3-3 in league play and 4-4 overall.

Tom Keene, Kendrick Native, Claimed by Cancer

Lewis Blaine "Tom" Keene, 75, Moses Lake resident, formerly of Kahlotus, Washington, succumbed to cancer at his home in Moses Lake on Friday, October 21, 1994. Tom was born in the family home on American Ridge near Kendrick, Idaho on April 24, 1919, son of the late Wade and Eva (Hunter) Keene. He grew up in Northern Idaho where he learned to farm, hunt and appreciate the area's heritage. He graduated from Kendrick High School in 1938 and completed his college years at Washington State College in 1942.

Soon after, he married his hometown sweetheart, Ann Deobald, who was his partner at home and in business for more than 52 years. Tom operated grain elevators and worked as a federal warehouse examiner before embarking on a lifetime career as owner and operator of small businesses in the communities of Kendrick, Joseph, Oregon, and Prescott, Hooper and Kahlotus, Washington.

Always civic-minded, Tom's creativity helped to generate local pride and awareness in the communities in which he lived. He found great pleasure in organizing parades and designing and building floats. While in Joseph, Oregon he served as parade chairman and president of the annual Chief Joseph Days celebration. His most extensive contribution was during his 25 years (1967-1992) as proprietor of Keene's Market, Tom's Inn-Digestion Cafe and Tom's Place Tavern in Kahlotus. There he converted the facades of his buildings to an old west motif and extensively decorated his businesses with area antiques and memorabilia. He also supported the efforts of the local school children to renovate the town through a federal Title III grant. The theme started in his business served as an inspiration for the conversion of the entire town to an old west atmosphere. Through the years, Tom's Place has been a popular stop for travelers and locals alike.

Tom was a versatile artist, inventor and amateur historian. He always had a joke or story to share and took great pleasure in winning games of pinocle and cribbage with his friends and family. Perhaps his greatest avocation in later years was following Washington State University sports. He was a loyal Cougar fan.

Tom is survived by his wife, Ann Keene, Moses Lake; 5 children and their families, Rick and Barbara Keene, Winthrop, Wash., Claudia and Dick Herlein, San Jose, Calif., Tim Keene, Spokane, Katie Saldana, Kennewick, Heidi and Karl Glaesemann, Moses Lake; 1 sister and brother-in-law, Maxine and George Jones of Kennewick; 12 grandchildren and 1 great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, October 25, at 10 a. m. at the Connell United Methodist Church with Pastor Bill Green officiating. Graveside services followed at 3:30 p. m. at American Ridge Cemetery near Kendrick.

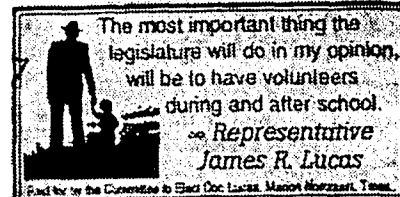
