Cancer Claims Life Of Dorothy Bingham

Dorothy Catherine Bingham, a retired homemaker, died of cancer Monday, Oct. 24, at her daughter's home in Juliaetta, where she had lived since 1992. He was 97.

She was born August 23, 1897, to Edward McEntee and Clara Gort-rude Liebold Perrin at Butler, Pa., where she graduated from high school in 1918.

She then attended Slippery Rock Teachers College at Slippery Rock, Pa., graduating in 1920. She taught second grade at Butler.

She married Raymond Claire Moore Bingham Jan. 28, 1922, at Butler. After her marriage she became a homemaker and did not work outside the home again.

She lived most of her life in Colorado. She moved to Juliaetta to live with her daughter in April 1992. She was a member of the Cedar-ridge Methodist Church and the Women's Litrary Club at Cedar-ridge, Colo.

Survivors include three daughters, Mary Alice Traxler of Spring Hall, Fla.; Dolores J. Olson of Juliaetta and Dorothy J. Edwards of Prescott, Ariz.; a son, Raymond P. Bingham of Prescott; a sister, Florence McKinney of Butler. 13 grandchildren, 23 great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

Letters to the Editor—

Dear Editor:

On November 8, the people of Idaho will vote on Proposition One. Every voter is responsible for understanding both sides of an issue before enacting into law a proposition affecting us all. Because Proposition One will have a tremendous impact on the future of Idaho, we, the undersigned, ask you to consider the following points before voting.

CENSORSHIP

Section 67-8004 - Expenditure of Public Funds. If Proposition One passes, the Idaho Library Association estimates that libraries would be forced to spend more than \$20 million to create a system to search and censor books and magazines. We feel the government does not have the right to censor and limit our children's access to library materials. Instead, we feel parents should choose what their children read. If you agree, vote no on Proposition One.

Equal Rights

Section 67-8002—Special Rights for persons who engage in homosexual behavior prohibited. Currently Gay and Lesbian Idahoans have exactly the same rights enjoyed by all people in our state. Gay and Lesbian citizens are not seeking special rights. We feel Proposition One attempts to create an issue which does not exist. We feel that all people in Idaho should have equal, not special rights. If you agree, vote no on Proposition One.

EDUCATION

Section 67-8004—Public Schools. It is estimated that one third of all teenagers who commit suicide are struggling with issues of sexual orientation. If Proposition One passes, children who are at risk would not be able to seek affirmative counseling. We cannot afford to enact laws which endanger any child's health and well being. If you agree, vote no on Proposition One.

WASTED TAX DOLLARS

We feel the government has mis-spent enough of our tax dollars. If Proposition One passes, it will be challenged in court. We cannot allow money to be wasted defending a proposition our State's Attorney General has said will be found unconstitutional. If you agree, vote no on Proposition One.

We are proud of our state. We believe that Idahoans are free-thinking and fair-minded individuals. Do we need Proposition One? NO. Do we want Proposition One? NO. We ask that on November 8, you vote NO on Proposition One.

To the Editor:

As a member of the Idaho Library Association, I oppose Proposition One. The proposition violates the first amendment of the United States Constitution, threatening our freedom to decide what we and our children read, see and hear. The proposition is contrary to the traditional mission of public-supported libraries which is to guard the right of every person to have access to information on various sides of any issue. Yet, should the proposition pass, books, magazines, newspapers and videos that "address" homosexuality in any way would be removed to an "adults only" section or room in the library to deny those under 18 years of age access to these materials. As a librarian, I do not wish to ask people to show I. D., force them to go to a special room or adults-only section to read Time or the Bible, or bar minors from our doors.

The propositions, if passed, might also force Idahoans to face employment discrimination based on non-

Jack has served since January of 1980, when he replaced Rev. Peter Vorsnees, the original appointee. Sub-District 1 & 2 directors Gary Browning and Dean Brocke, as well as secretary-treasurer Dana Magnuson, express their great appreciation to Lohman for his service over the years.

Due to changes in Idaho's election laws (election consolidation), notice requirements are such that the election of Jack's replacement will need to be conducted at the next legally mandated date for elections, rather than at the upcoming Nov. 8 elected as had been planned. Deputy Secretary Ben Ysursa has advised Recreation District secretary Dana Magnuson that in order to comply with existing state law, the election should be held on Feb. 7, 1995. Official notice and filing dates will be published between Dec. 16-23, and interested individuals will have until Dec. 30 to submit petitions of candidacy.

Leland resident Louis E. "Ed" Corkill has filed a valid petition and will be on the Feb. 7 ballot. If no other candidate or write-in candidate files, an election need not be held and Mr. Corkill will be declared elected.

job performance factors. Yet all United States citizens have the constitutionally protected right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Dignity and justice should be accorded to all.

The Idaho Library Association has estimated that initial compliance, in public libraries alone, would cost Idaho taxpayers at least 14 million dollars. Ongoing costs are estimated at 12 million dollars per year. Money diverted to compliance would not be available to purchase new materials or keep libraries' doors open or extend information to the public. Libraries would be forced to cut other basic services such as story hours for children, summer reading programs, outreach to seniors and young adult programming.
