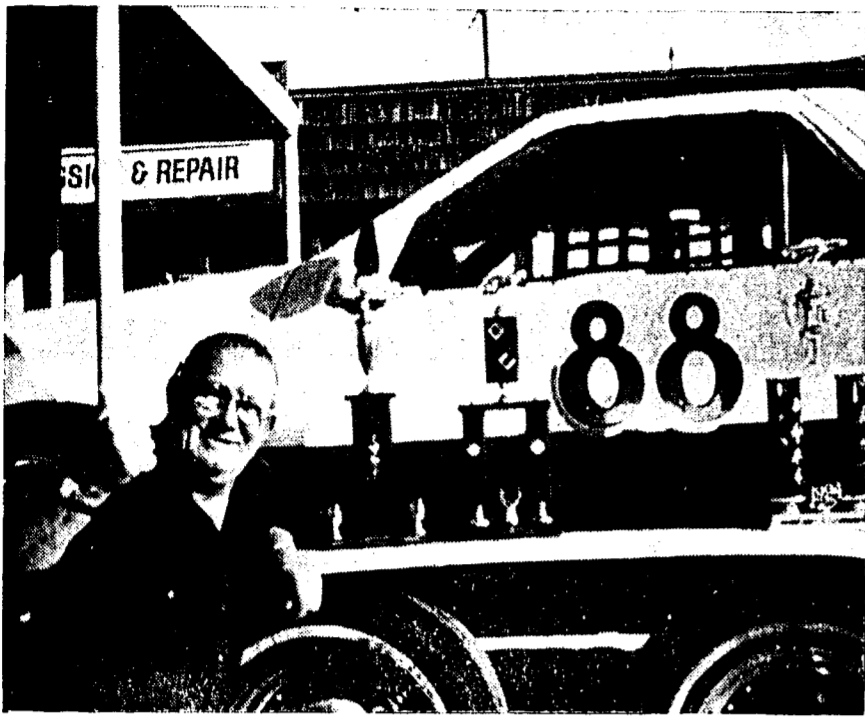


Frank True Retires from Stock Car Racing After 48-year Career

Heart Attack Claims Ervin L. Halseth, Nov. 6

Ervin L. Halseth, 76, a well-known and respected Big Bear Ridge farmer, died of a heart attack Sunday, Nov. 6 at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston.

He and his brother, Gerald Halseth, farmed on Big Bear Ridge since 1960. He was one of the Grand Marshals of the 1994 Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival.

He was born Dec. 28, 1917, at Great Falls, Mont., to Ed and Olga Klette Halseth. The family moved to Idaho in 1919 and purchased the Halseth family farm. He attended schools through the eighth grade at Tancy school on Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick. He attended Deary High School for two years, then graduated from Kendrick High School in 1936.

He was in the U. S. Army during World War II, serving in the South Pacific for a little more than five years and was discharged in 1945.

He and Helen Lillie were married Nov. 4, 1946, at Lewiston. They moved to Craigmont in 1946 and he worked for J. D. Jacobs for 12 years. In 1960, they moved to the farm on Big Bear Ridge and, in 1979, moved to Kendrick. She died March 13, 1991.

He was a member of the Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars and was a member of the Bethany Lutheran Church on Big Bear Ridge until the church closed. He then became a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church. He enjoyed farming.

Survivors include two daughters Vickie Jo Witt of Juliaetta and Pamela L. Isakson of Tacoma; three sisters, Margaret Cox of Avon, Idaho, Helen Leland of Clarkston and Betty Chisholm of Lewiston; three brothers, Gerald Halseth of Kendrick, Harold Halseth of Seattle and Orville Halseth of Lewiston; and four grandchildren.

A brother, Arnold Halseth, died previously.

Visitation is scheduled from noon to 7 p. m. Wednesday at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston. The funeral will be held at 11 a. m. Thursday at Bethany Lutheran Church with the Rev. Robert Kenyon of Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church officiating.

Burial will be held at Bethany Lutheran Cemetery with Baker-Lind Post 3913 of the VFW, officiating.

The family suggest memorial be sent to Cameron Emmanuel Church or to the Juliaetta-Kendrick Ambulance Fund.

Inspection and Review of Student Records Policy Explained

Certain rights pertaining to the inspection and review of student's records and challenging the content of such record are afforded to parents of children under 18 years of age, students 18 years of age or older and married students attending Public School District No. 283. The District has established procedures allowing the above individuals access to school records.

Joint District No. 283 has established and maintains records in the following areas: Academic, Attendance, Testing, and Health. These records are housed in the following locations: The central files, special education classrooms, and ancillary personnel offices. Individual student files reference the location of any additional records pertaining to the student. All records are stored in secure facilities.

All student records are maintained indefinitely. Special Education records, except for permanent attendance and enrollment information which the district is entitled to maintain indefinitely, are destroyed when the information is no longer needed to provide educational services. Parents of Special Education students and eligible students will be notified when student records are to be destroyed so they may obtain copies of desired records.

Personally identifiable school records and files of students will be released to only certain school and other educational agency officials unless written consent of further release is obtained. Furnishing, in any form, any personally identifiable information contained in personal school records to any persons, other than the above, will be permitted only by written consent, specifying the record(s) to be released, the reason therefore, to whom the copies are provided, or permitted when required by judicial order or lawful subpoena.

Any person, agency, or organization legally entitled to student records and desiring access to such records must sign a written form to be kept in the student's file for inspection by the parent or eligible student. Copies of student records are available at the school of attendance at a cost of 50 cents per page, unless the cost effectively prohibits parent or eligible student from obtaining a copy of the record(s). Jt. District No. 283 is required by Federal and State regulations to make student records available to parents or eligible students on request to see them within 45 days of date of request.

Parents or eligible students may request a copy of educational records and obtain copies at their own expense.

Parents or eligible students may request an explanation and interpretation of records.

If any educational record includes information on more than one student, the parent or eligible students of those children shall have the right to inspect and review only the information relating to their children themselves or be informed of that specific information. Parents of eligible students may request amendments of records if they believe the information is inaccurate, misleading, or violates the privacy or other rights of the student.

Parents or eligible students may initiate a due process hearing regarding the content of student records.

"Child Find" -- Education for the Handicapped

The Handicapped—
Kendrick School District No. 283 is committed to the early identification and intervention of Special Needs Children. In order to assure that we meet this commitment, so that all handicapped children are afforded a Free Appropriate Public Education, we need the help of the community in our "Child Find Activities".

What is Child Find?
Child Find is a service of the Idaho State Department of Education and your local school district.

The purpose of Child Find is to identify children who may have individual needs that result from disabilities (handicaps) or developmental delays.

Child Find helps determine if a child has a disability and what type of educational services would meet his or her needs.

Who is Child Find Looking For?
Child Find is looking for children with disabilities, especially children between 3 and 21 years of age.

Child Find is looking for children who are "not exactly the same as others their age". These youngsters may have difficulty walking, talking, hearing, or learning. Or they may have behavioral problems.

Who Can Call Child Find?
Many of the youngsters who are referred to Child Find may be entitled to special education and related services, and the younger the child, the more effective those services will be.

Children who are referred to Child Find will receive free testing to determine if the differences you notice require services or if they are "nothing to worry about".

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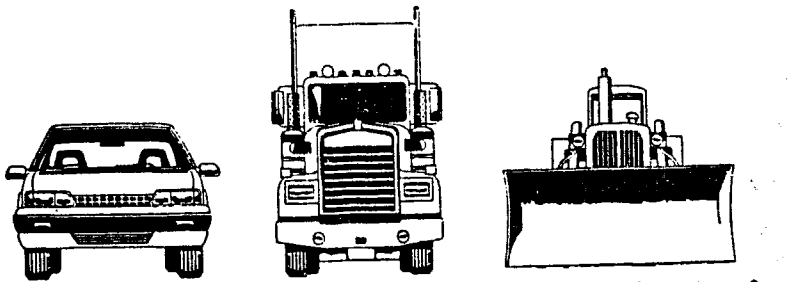
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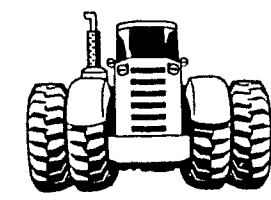
