Story Concerning Thelma Mills Howard Stirrs Local Memories

An article in the Gazette two weeks ago concerning the generous bequest of several million dollars to disabled children by the late Thelma Mills Howard, a former Southwick area resident who spent many years in California as a housekeeper for the Walt Disney family stirred the memory of several local area people. First the Gazette received a nice phone call from Mrs. Gladys (Reece) Blackburn of Lewiston. Mrs. Blackburn went to high school in Southwick with Thelma Howard and remembers her well. Although Mrs. Blackburn was from Cavendish, she did, like others, at the old Southwick High School.

Mrs. Blackburn is now 81 years of age and resides at 1124 Burrell Ave. in Lewiston.

Next Ernie Brammer dropped in at the Gazette to tell us that the Brammer and Mills family were friends and neighbors and he told of the death of Thelma's mother in child birth, the tragic death of a six-year old Mills daughter after a kitchen fire. There was also the loss of Tyler Mills in the South Pacific during World War II. It is understood that another brother, Jay, now lives in Clarkston. Ernie also said that Mr. Mills, Thelma's father, donated three acres of land on which the old Grinolds School was built.

Mr. Mills farmed in Southwick until after World War II and then retired and moved to Kendrick where he lived until his death.

And, finally we received a phone call from Chas Havens of Clarkston. Chas is a son of George Havens and the late Martha Havens and they farmed on American Ridge for many years. Charles said he remembers Mrs. Howard mainly because of the close friendship of she and his late mother, (she was Martha Brammer) and "Mart" and Thelma were lifelong friends. Among his mother's letters, he said, was one from Mrs. Walt Disney, thanking her for a quilt she had made for the Disney family.

Subsidies to Farmers Doesn't Take All of Dept. of A. Budget

During and after the recent elections there was talk of cutting back subsidies to farmers in an effort to reduce the national debt and bring expenditures under control. This subject always seems to be around and is especially popular in non-rural areas. What many people don't realize is that the Department of Agriculture's budget provides funds for an incredible number of agencies and programs that are not traditionally associated with farming or payments to farmers.

Werner Brammer, who watches government taxes and budgets like few others, dropped off some information on some programs that come under the Agriculture Department's budgets. They include:

Food Stamp Program — enables low income households to improve their diets by supplementing their food dollars with food stamp coupons. Fiscal Year '91 budget includes \$15.4 billion.

School Lunch Program — The President's FY 91 proposed budget includes \$3.3 billion to reimburse the states for meals served to participating children. This amount will provide enough dollars for 4.116 billion meals for school children.

School Breakfast Program — FY 91 budget request is \$606 million and will provide an estimate 690 million meals. (This program was just implemented in the Kendrick and Juliaetta Schools this year).

Child and Adult Care Food Programs — provides funds for food service to children in non-residential child care centers and family day care homes and certain adult day care centers. FY 91 proposed budget includes \$513 million.

Summer Food Service Program — provides funds for food service to needy children during summer vacation. Institutions receiving funds must be public or private non-profit school, camps, other government organizations, or non-profit organizations. FY 91 budget included \$180 million.

Special Milk Programs — encourages children to drink more milk by subsidizing half pints of milk in schools and other institutions that do not participate in other federally subsidized meal program. FY 91 budget — \$22 million.

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program — provides nutritious supplemental foods to low income pregnant, post-partum, and breastfeeding women and to infants and children up to age 5 who are determined by competent professionals to be at nutritional risk. Recipients also receive nutritional education, advice and assistance. FY 91 budget request was \$2.2 billion and supported approximately 4.7 million women, infants and children.

Food Donations Programs — distribute food to Indian Reservations, the elderly, soup kitchens, and the Commodity Supplemental Feeding Program — FY 91 budget request was \$337 million.

Now, also include in the Dept. of Agriculture budget:

FmHA Rural Housing Loan program —
Low-income housing — \$1.2 billion
Multi-family housing direct loans \$391 million.

Rental assistance for FmHA financed housing projects. \$270 million.
Rural Housing vouchers for non-FmHA rental housing. \$190 million.
FmHA Small Community and Rural Development:

Water and sewer facilities — FY 91 budget included \$300 million in direct loans; \$100 million in grants; and \$50 million in guaranteed loans.

Other community facilities — hospitals, health clinics, nursing clinics. Fiscal Year 91 budget request was \$96 million.

Also several agencies that benefit people other than farmers are included in the Department of Agriculture budget:

Food Safety and Inspection Service — to assure that the nation's meat and poultry supply is safe, wholesome, and properly packaged. This includes slaughter and processing. Budget request was \$442 million.

Forest Service — Budget request was \$3.02 billion.
