"The most likely group of children to experience severe consequences from Pertussis are those under one year," said Dr. Jessie Greenblatt, 6 and under should receive the Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis vaccination (DTP) according to the recommended shedule."

Only 62 percent of Idaho's children have received all the recommended vaccinations by age two. To prevent outbreaks of disease, 90 percent of all children need to be immunized as medically recommended.

Greenblatt said children and adults regardless of age or vaccination status, who are in the same household or in close contact with confirmed whooping cough cases, should receive antibiotics for 14 days to prevent the disease.

Greenbatt said children thought to have the disease must be kept out of school or daycare until they have five days of antibiotics. No similar exclusions are necessary for family or friends who are also taking antibiotics.

"We are at risk from this disease as long as state immunization rates remain low. We urge parent to get their children immunized through their health care provider or their Thursday & Friday, Nov. 24, 25local district health department," he said.

Public health efforts during the course of the outbreaks will be directed at vaccinating children and identifying individuals who need antibiotic therapy. For more information, check with your doctor or local health district.
