Boil Order Placed on Kendrick City Water

After the presence of total coliform bacteria were found in the City of Kendrick's public drinking water system last week, consumers have been advised to either boil water used for consumption for five minutes or secure drinking water from another approved source, the city advised this week. This discovery of the total coliform bacteria indicates that the drinking water system may have become contaminated, and as such, may pose a threat to public health.

Kendrick's city maintenance man, Steve Howerton, is currently working to the determine the cause of

the contamination. This involves re-sampling the system, inspecting the components of the water system for problems, and taking appropriate corrective actions.

The problem was discovered after Howerton took his regular weekly sample on Tuesday, Nov. 15, and submitted it to the Health Dept. in Lewiston (as required by law). The next day he was informed that problems had been discovered and he was asked to collect four samples from different locations in the system. Howerton took samples from Town & Country Diner (where the Nov. 15th samples was taken), plus samples from water faucets at Red Cross Pharmacy, Battles Accounting, and the high school. Tests at Lewiston this time showed three of the samples free, (including the Diner) but that there was contamination in the sample from the high school.

Again tests were ordered and new samples collected. Friday afternoon, the Health Dept. called both Town and Country Diner and Phil's Family Foods, informing them of the situation and asked that certain precautionary measures be taken.

Howerton and City Clerk Lynne Bruce worked Sunday preparing a notice in the form of a letter which was mailed to all city water users and also delivered by hand to make the widest possible coverage. The letter described the problem, what the current situation was and what residents should do.

Total coliforms are common in the environment and generally not harmful themselves. Don't confuse total coliforms with E. Coli. The presence of total coliform bacteria in drinking water, however, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or the pipes which distribute the water, and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organism that can cause disease.

If samples taken this Monday and Tuesday are good (negative), the boil order can be removed. Howerton said the City will make every effort to notify residence when the order can be lifted.

All water lines have been chlorinated. Chlorine is the most effective way of dealing with this bacteria.

Kendrick draws its water from three sources. Two wells, one in the lower park in southwest Kendrick and the other from a well near the fire station, and from a spring up Bear Creek (Stanton Spring), about two miles up from the high school.

Ironically, George Deskon, a compliance Officer with the Division of Environmental Quality, in Lewiston had been in Kendrick the day (15th) the first day test was taken. Howerton said, making a yearly inspection. Kendrick's water system passed with "flying colors" until the sample report came back!

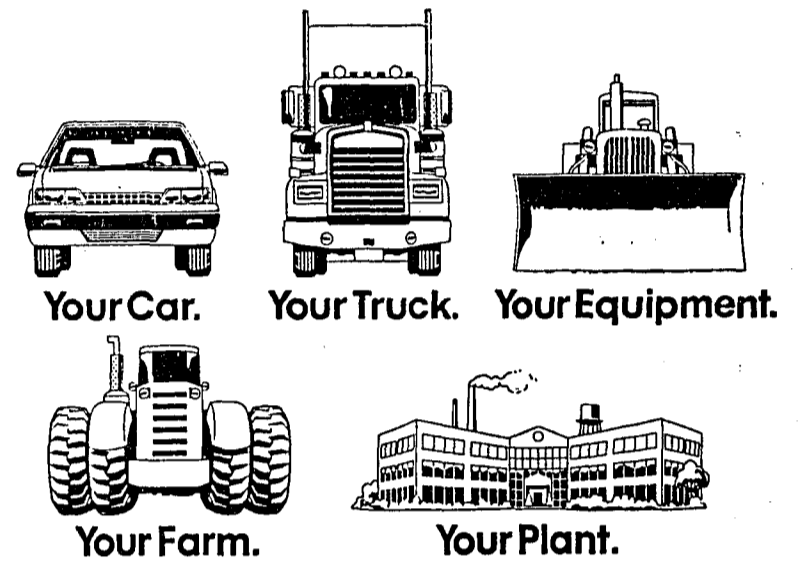
