About Mailing Christmas Parcels

Last week Kendrick postmaster Sharon Harris offered some timely tips on mailing holiday letters. This week she has some reminders and advice on mailing parcels to help postal patrons enjoy a hassle-free holiday season.

• When wrapping those holiday packages for mailing, a reinforced tape should be used. Masking or clear cellophane-type tape just will not hold up during the process of mailing. String or rope will also get caught in postal machinery.

• It is helpful if an address card, including a list of contents, is inserted inside each package. This is for identification, just in case the outer wrap is unreadable or missing.

• If you use a box that has no markings on it, it is perfectly permissible to address directly onto it without wrapping the box in stiff paper. If you are reusing a box, remember to mark off all other addresses and directions. Also, it is important to remember that every time a box is reused it becomes weaker. Be sure the container you are using is strong enough and packaged properly to protect the contents. You are encouraged to look at other mailing container options such as reinforced bags, tubes, etc.

• Rain and snow can smear the address so make sure you mark it clearly with a smudge-proof marker. Don't forget that return address.

• Use the correct ZIP Code. A wrong ZIP Code can delay your parcel.

• And, not the least in importance is to insure the package. The post office takes every precaution to protect your package, but a little insurance never hurts.

A Problem in Area**

An outbreak of whooping cough in Northern Idaho has risen to more than 109 cases. The majority of cases are being found in Sandpoint and Coeur d'Alene and a few in

Spokane. With low immunization rates in Idaho there is increasing concern that the outbreak will spread to Latah and Nezperce counties.

Whooping cough, otherwise known as Pertussis, is a highly contagious respiratory disease. Symptoms include a persistent cough sometimes followed by vomiting. It's the persistent cough that cause a person to gasp for air, creating the whooping

sound. Immunizations are available in Moscow at the Health Department every Wednesday from 1 to 4 (208-882-7506), in Bovill at Bovill Elementary the first Friday of every other even month from 10 to 2:30, and in Potlatch at the Presbyterian Church the first Tuesday of the odd months from 9:30 to 11:30 and 1 to 3:30.

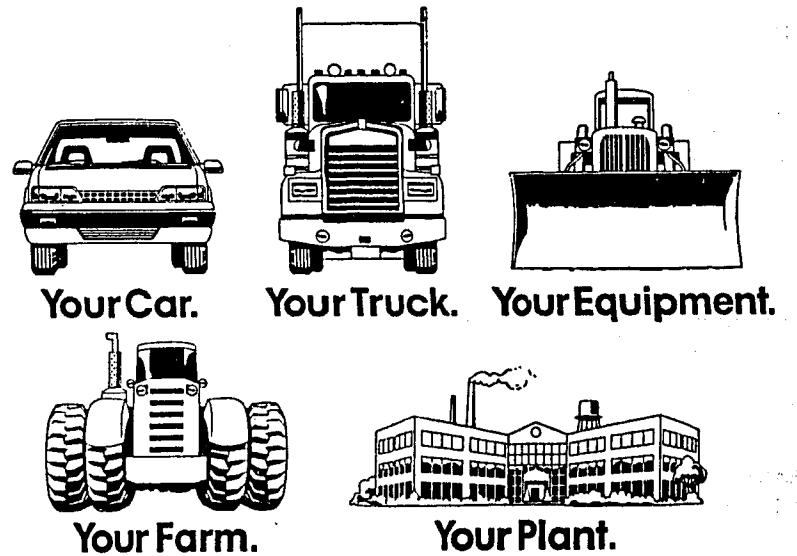
