Jay Dee Wilson remains in critical condition at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston this week after a two-vehicle collision on Bear Ridge Grade Tuesday, Dec. 6.

According to reports, Jay Dee was traveling north on State Highway 3 (Bear Ridge Grade) approximately 1 mile from Kendrick and a logging truck was traveling south when the accident occurred. Road conditions were poor.

EMTs from the J-K Ambulance service transported Jay Dee to St. Joseph Regional Medical Center. He was reported in critical condition as of this Tuesday morning, Dec. 13.

Development Assoc. Held Annual Meeting At Fire Hall Dec. 8

Plans, accomplishments and goals of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Assoc. were discussed last Thursday evening that group held its annual membership meeting at the Kendrick Fire Hall.

After the reading and approval of last year's meeting minutes and the presentation and acceptance of the current treasurer's report, President Lillian introduced Latah County Commissioner Dana Magnuson talked about a Shared Facility and Adaptive Re-Use Feasibility Study involving the City of Moscow, the Moscow School District and Latah County. A task force is presently studying the space needs, analyzing the use of existing facilities and trying to determine what is presently available, what is needed and what is wanted for the future use of facilities to best serve the operation of these three different taxing units.

Getting space to house a joint law enforcement center (City of Moscow and Latah County Sheriff and Courts; consolidation of Moscow City Hall and, School Administration offices.

A public meeting will be held in Moscow on Jan. 26 to discuss and hear a task force report.

Christine Clayton, chairman of the Development Association's business expansion and retention committee presented that groups annual report. Clayton's said among the projects promoted this past year have been the farmer's market, that began well but was cut short because of the late summer drought, a welcome wagon, and plans for an information kiosk in the park.

Clayton also said her committee will continue to support the farmers market and possibly incorporate it with the Arts Committee. The market made a profit of \$82.00 last summer.

Donna Heinen, chairman of the Association's Infrastructure committee said her committee continues to work on strategies to develop certain public services in both town, continue support of the Substance Abuse Committee and encourage working on a biking and hiking path and encourage installation of a recreational vehicle park and facility.

Substance Abuse Program

Also present at the Thursday evening meeting was Charles Partee, a teacher at Kendrick High School and a member of the recently formed J-K Prevention Advisory Council. The purpose and goals of this group is to promote a community free of substance abuse.

There are problems in our community involving narcotics, alcohol and tobacco involving children and under legal-age young people. The council is seeking support and help from everyone in the community to help fight substance abuse.

Another concerned discussed that evening was the problem of getting prompt, reliable response from state and county law enforcement when it is requested. This is an ongoing concern and is certain to be brought up again until a satisfactory solution is found.

The final action of the evening was the election of new members of the board of directors. Chosen for the board were George Brocke, Dana Magnuson, Doug Clayton and Dennis Hamilton.

Before the meeting adjourned, the membership gave outgoing president Howerton a well-deserved round of applause for her excellent leadership and hard work during the past year. Good job, Lill!

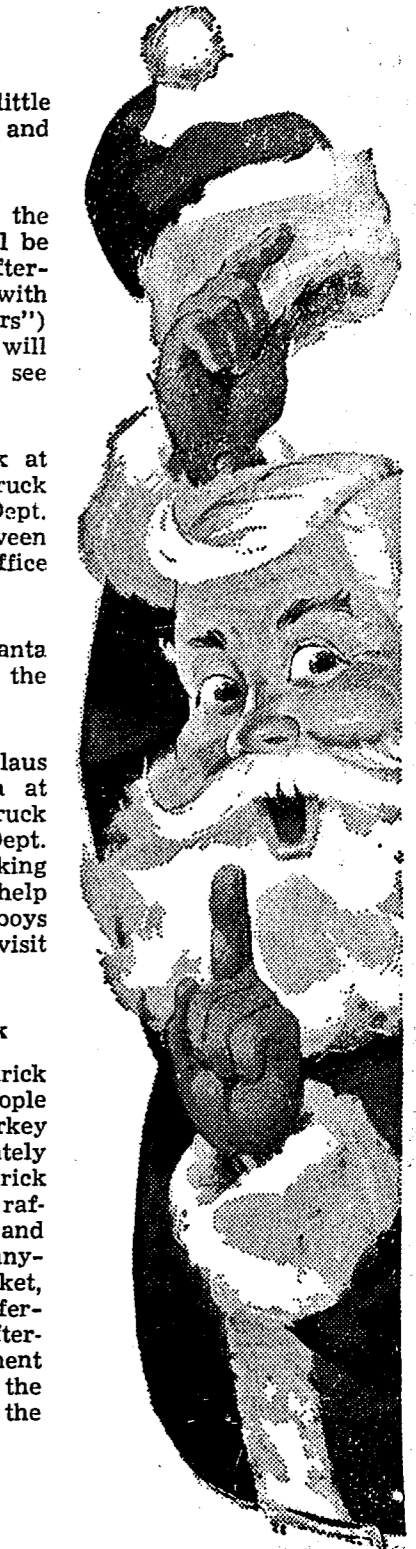

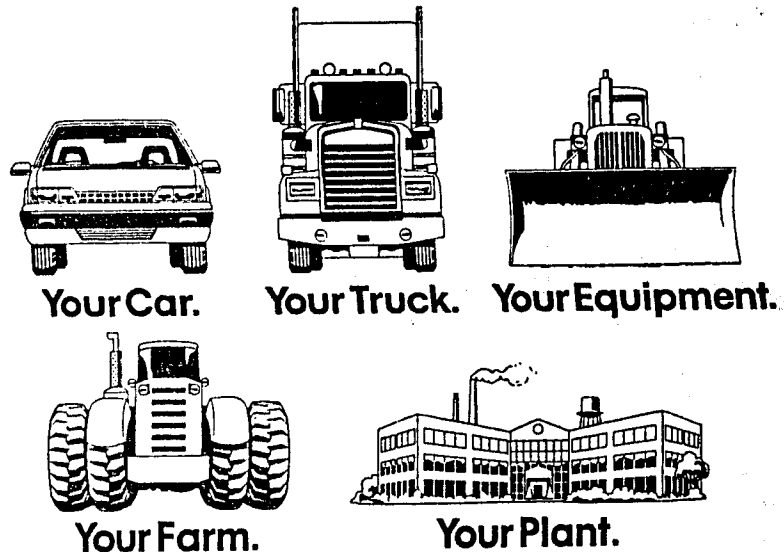
