Jay Dee Wilson, 66, a Big Bear and Lincoln County, Washington farmer and rancher, died Saturday, December 17, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston from injuries suffered in an automobile accident Bear Ridge Grade near Kendrick December 6.

He was born September 28, 1928, to Alonzo C. and Margaret Ruth Russell Wilson at Ferndale, Wash. The family lived at Rocklyn, Wash. When he was 3 years old, they moved to Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick where he continued to reside.

He graduated from Kendrick High School in 1947 then began farming with his father and brother. He served in the U. S. Army during the Korean conflict as a corporal in a heavy artillery unit stationed at Hanford, Wash. Following his discharge, he returned to Big Bear Ridge where he continued to farm and was associated with A. C. and Wayne Wilson at Kendrick. He also had farming interest in Harrington, Wash.

He married Ruth Vance, Dec. 15, 1957 at White Sulphur Springs, W. Virginia.

He was an excellent mechanic and carpenter. He and his wife built two homes in addition to other buildings.

He enjoyed spending time with his 5-year-old grandson and driving around farming areas visiting with the residents.

He is survived by his wife at the family home; a son, Eldon D. Wilson; a brother, Wayne Wilson; a sister, Leona E. Wilson, one grandson, Alonzo C. Wilson, and his father, all of Kendrick. He was preceded in death by his mother.

PRIOR REDEMPTION: Bonds maturing on and prior to February 15, 2002, are not callable for redemption prior to maturity. The Bonds maturing on and after February 15, 2003, are callable for redemption at the option of the District on February 15, 2002, and on any date thereafter prior to maturity, in whole or in part, from such maturities or parts thereof as shall be directed by the District, upon not less than thirty (30) days prior notice, at the redemption price of par, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

INTEREST RATES: The Bonds will bear interest at any number of different rates, any of which may be repeated, expressed in multiples of 1/8th or 1/20th of one percent (1%), but the highest rate bid for any of the Bonds shall not exceed the lowest rate by more than three percent (3%). CERTIFICATE: The successful bidder will be required to provide to the District at the time of the delivery of the Bonds a certificate confirming the initial offering prices of the Bonds to the public (not including bond houses and brokers or similar persons or organization acting in the capacity of underwriters or wholesalers) at which a substantial amount (being 10% or more) of each maturity of the bonds have been sold.

BID CHECK: Each bid shall be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check payable to the Treasurer of Joint School District No. 283, Latah, Clearwater and Nez Perce Counties, in the amount of \$35,000, which certified or cashier's check represents a good faith deposit pending delivery of the Bonds, and which check shall be returned to such bidder if his bid is not accepted.
