NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by the Board of Trustees of Joint School District No. 283, Latah, Clearwater and Nez Perce Counties, State of Idaho (the "District"), that the District intends to issue and sell \$700,000 General Obligation School Bonds, Series 1995 (the "Bonds") of the District.

Sealed bids will be received by the Clerk of the Board of Trustees at the office of said Board at 2001 Highway 3, Kendrick, Idaho for the purchase of the Bonds of the District up to 7:30 o'clock P. M., P. S. T., on the 12th day of January, 1995, said bids to be filed with said Clerk. At the hour of 7:30 o'clock P. M., P. S. T., of said day and at the High School Library, 2001 Highway 3 in Kendrick, Idaho, the regular meeting place of the Board of Trustees, said bids will be opened by the Board of Trustees of the District at

a regular public meeting of the Board to be held for the purpose of considering such bids, awarding the Bonds or rejecting any and all bids therefor.

The Bonds shall be dated February 15, 1995, denomination \$5,000 or natural multiples thereof, not to exceed the amount of each maturity, and mature on February 15 of each of the years and in the amounts as follows:

**PRIOR REDEMPTION:** Bonds maturing on and prior to February 15, 2002, are not callable for redemption prior to maturity. The Bonds maturing on and after February 15, 2003, are callable for redemption at the option of the District on February 15, 2002, and on any date thereafter prior to maturity, in whole or in part, from such maturities or parts thereof as shall be directed by the District, upon not less than thirty (30) days prior notice, at the redemption price of par, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption.

**INTEREST RATES:** The Bonds will bear interest at any number of different rates, any of which may be repeated, expressed in multiples of 1/8th or 1/20th of one percent (1%), but the highest rate bid for any of the Bonds shall not exceed the lowest rate by more than three percent (3%). All Bonds of the same maturity must bear a single rate of interest and the rate bid for each succeeding maturity of Bonds maturing after 2002 must increase except to the extent that the rate bid for two or more consecutive maturities is repeated. A zero rate cannot be named for all or part of the time from the date of any Bonds to its stated maturity, and any premium must be paid in the funds specified for the payment of the Bonds as part of the purchase price. Interest will be payable February 15, 1996, and semiannually thereafter, at a rate or rates not exceeding nine percent (9.00%) per annum, to be fixed at the time the Bonds are sold.

**PAYMENT:** Principal of and premium, if any, on the Bonds will be

payable in lawful money of the United States of America at First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A. (the "Bond Registrar"). Interest on each Bond shall be payable by check or draft of the Bond Registrar mailed to the registered owner at the address appearing on the bond register of the District maintained by the Bond Registrar. Interest on each Bond shall be paid by check or draft of the Bond Registrar to the person in whose name such Bond is registered at the close of business on the last business day of the month next preceding the interest payment date.

**SECURITY:** The Bonds will be general obligations of the District payable from the proceeds of ad valorem taxes to be levied without limitation as to rate or amount.

**AWARD:** Award or rejection of bids will be made on the date above stated for receipt of bids. The Bonds will be awarded to the responsible bidder offering to pay not less than par and accrued interest and specifying a rate or rates which results in the lowest effective interest cost to the District, computed from the date of the Bonds to maturity. Reference is hereby made to the discussion of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, set forth in the Official Statement under the caption "TAX EXEMPTION."

**LEGAL OPINION:** The unqualified approving opinion of Ray, Quinley & Nebeker covering the legality of the Bonds will be furnished without cost to the purchasers. There will also be furnished the usual closing certificates, dated as of the date of delivery of and payment for the Bonds, including a statement that there is no litigation pending, or to the knowledge of the signer thereof, threatened, affecting the validity of

**Home Alone? How to have  
A Singular Celebration**

For many single people, the holiday season is a particularly hard time to be alone. Feelings of loneliness and depression become especially acute—decking the halls isn't very jolly when there is no one to share the fa-la-las. Dr. Elsa O'Connor, director of group psychotherapy at University of Washington Medical Center's Outpatient Psychiatry Clinic, has given classes in self-care for singles. She offers tips for people who are "home alone" during the holidays.

"I ask people to focus on the pleasures, rather than on the pressures of the season," said O'Connor. "If you are alone, either by circumstances or by choice, and feel intimidated by the holidays in terms of expectations, try to take some time and decide which aspects of the season are particularly meaningful for you. Then go about planning activities around them."

If certain aspects of the season tend to bring you down, like the rampant commercialization and consumerism that tend to haunt the holidays, O'Connor suggests that you limit or minimize your exposure to commercial messages. "Carefully schedule radio or television time to avoid the avalanche of commercial messages, or listen to non-commercial stations," she advised.

You might want to carefully consider what invitations to accept during the season as well, she continued. Many people who are concerned about being alone during the holidays will overschedule activities and parties. They end up feeling exhausted and depleted from activities that were unsatisfactory, which can contribute to, rather than decrease, unhappiness and dissatisfaction.

Much of the dissatisfaction that people feel about the season is related to a sense of competition and comparison that can pervade the holiday spirit. Is this holiday as good last year's? Was this tree, present or experience as good as last year's? To dispel potential disappointment, O'Connor advises that

people focus more on satisfaction than on accomplishment.

"If you concentrate on finding and enjoying the small pleasures of every day, you will automatically reduce your stress level," she said. "In my class we drew up a list of simple pleasures that came with the season, such as playing in the snow, reading a book by the fire, and simply taking the time to be with yourself and reflect on life in general."

O'Connor also encourages pampering as a way of self-care, with the emphasis on care. Too often, people use unhappiness during the holidays as an excuse for destructive self-indulgence. Overeating, overspending and drinking too much are some of the behaviors people use to avoid or compensate for feeling or loneliness. Such behaviors usually backfire, prompting unrewarding feelings of guilt, self-loathing and shame.

"Self-care includes things like sleeping in on a Sunday morning, or having breakfast in bed," said O'Connor. "I encourage people to do things that they normally wouldn't do for themselves or by themselves, like going to a movie they want to see, or having dinner in a special restaurant."

"I also suggest that you create new rituals for yourself for this season," she added. "Learning how to celebrate yourself as singular, not solitary, is a great new tradition to add to the holidays—and to continue throughout the New Year."

Seeing ourselves as others see us would probably confirm our worst suspicions about them.
