Noxious Weed Law Changes Made In Latah County

Early fall activities of Latah County landowners will be affected by recent changes in noxious weed law requirements. Idaho Department of Agriculture director Dr. Greg Nelson recently approved "special management zones" to make regulations more realistically fit Latah County situations. Changes affect requirements for control of six major weed species. The Latah County Commissioners requested these changes after comments from a public meeting, based on recommendations by the Latah County Weed Advisory Committee. The six weed species have become so widespread or inaccessible that complying with the whole noxious weed law is not practical throughout the county. Noxious Weed Law requirements remain unchanged for right-of-ways since they are comparatively accessible for control work, and are the routes for most weed spread. Protection of unfested land is the sole objective of the Noxious Weed Law. The Weed Advisory Committee recognizes that while compliance with the Weed Law may not stop noxious weeds, it will slow their spread greatly.

Field bindweed control is now required only on transportation and utility right-of-ways, and within 20 feet of an adjacent property when the owner of the adjacent property requests makes written request for control. Since this weed species has infested nearly all susceptible properties in Latah County, the County Weed Advisory Committee determined that control of field bindweed should be considered more a matter of good land management practices than of compliance with laws to defend neighboring properties.

Canada thistle control is no longer required on all public or private forest and non-arable dry grazing land. On private land, these are Latah County Assessor's property categories 5, 6 and 7. These lands are generally inaccessible to equipment for reasonable control procedures. Important exceptions within forest and dry grazing land are that Canada thistle control is still required on transportation and utility right-of-ways, roadways and landings and areas within 50 feet of roadways and landings, and on areas within 100 feet of arable land. Within these accepted areas, and on all other kinds of property, control is still required by the Idaho Noxious Weed Law. The changes also provide that Canada thistle control may now consist of any practice that prevents seed production and root encroachment on adjacent properties.

Jointed goatgrass control is no longer required in the planted portion of most winter wheat fields. This is because there is no practical method of selective control of jointed goatgrass in winter wheat. Control of this species is still required everywhere else in the county, including all field borders, fences, roadsides and other unplanted parts of fields, and in commercial seed fields. Trucks hauling crops harvested from jointed goatgrass infested fields must now be tarped to prevent loss of seeds.

Orange and meadow hawkweed control is no longer required on most forest land, except for transportation and utility right-of-ways and areas within 100 feet of arable land. Complete destruction of hawkweeds in yards and gardens in the city of Bovill is not mandatory. Hawkweed control in Bovill may consist of any practice that prevents seed production and root encroachment on adjacent properties. Elimination of all above-ground hawkweed growth elsewhere is still required.

Scotch broom control is no longer required in managed ornamental landscape plantings adjoining occupied residences. Good homeowner management such as removal of seedlings is expected to keep this weed from uncontrolled spreading. All other provisions of the Idaho Noxious Weed Law and the Latah County Noxious Weed Ordinance are still in full effect in Latah County. 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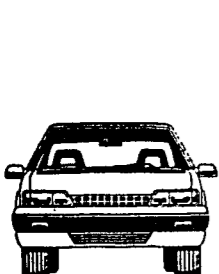
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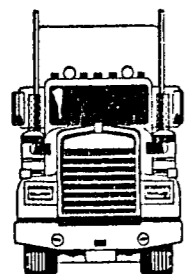
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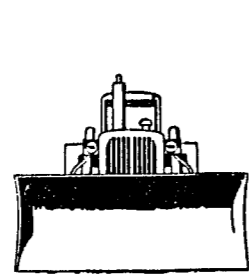
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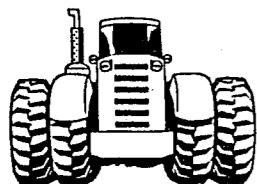
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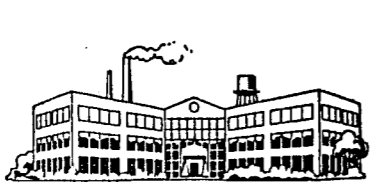
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**WSU PRESS BOOK
MURDER ON NEZ PERCE TRAIL**

In the fall of 1863, Lewiston merchant Lloyd Magruder was returning from a successful trip selling supplies in the mining towns then springing up around gold strikes in what is now Western Montana. Half-way home to Lewiston on the Southern Nez Perce Trail, Magruder and four companions were brutally murdered and robbed of more than \$20,000 in gold dust and currency.

In the new Washington State University Press book, "This Bloody Deed: The Magruder Incident," author Ladd Hamilton vividly recreates the murder, the pursuit of the killers, their capture, trial and execution, a story that has become legendary in Washington, Idaho and Western Montana. Using historical sources such as newspapers, letters and court documents, "This Bloody Deed" mixes fact with the author's hypothetical rendering of conversa-

tion and certain events in the tradition of Truman Capote's "In Cold Blood" and Norman Mailer's "The Executioner's Song." The result is a rich stew of intrigue, adventure and politics.

The book also offers a glimpse into the early political life of the Idaho Territory, and the region's evolution from the days of frontier justice to established, territorial government.

"It is richly researched and beautifully written, filled with detail, drama and suspense that sweeps one along. The time, the place and the characters all come vividly alive in the author's crisp, colorful prose. The story of the Magruder murder is one of the greatest of the Old West," said Alvin Josephy, author of "The Nez Perce Indians and the Opening of the Northwest."

Mary Clearman Blew, author of the highly acclaimed book "Balsaroot," called the book, "a treat to read—suspenseful, convincing."

Ladd Hamilton began his journalism career when he enrolled at the University of Idaho in 1940 and became editor of the student newspaper, "The Argonaut. He joined the staff of the Lewiston Morning Tribune in 1948, and served as a reporter, editor and columnist during
