

YEAR END TAX TIP FOR SELF-EMPLOYED FARMERS AND BUSINESS MEN

If your spouse helps in the business you can put them on your payroll and provide them with medical benefits including insurance that covers all the family and payment of the family medical bills for medicine, hospital, doctors, dentists, vision and other legitimate medical expenses. The cost of these medical benefits can then be deducted as legitimate business expenses on your tax return, farm or business schedule, which reduces your self-employment taxes and income tax. Your spouse's wages in excess of the medical benefits go on a W-2 form and have to be reported quarterly or annually on payroll reporting forms. If you are the 15% tax bracket and have \$4,000.00 medical expenses you could save about \$1500.00 federal income tax, self-employment tax and Idaho income tax.

You can still do this for 1994 by adopting a plan agreement provided by the AGRI/BIZ COMPANY before December 31, 1994.
