

## Bank Proposes Drive Through Addition Project

First Security Bank is now considering adding drive-through facilities for its Kendrick Branch, it was learned last week. According to local bank manager Dirk Hammond, the addition has been approved by First Security and the bank is now in the process of obtaining the city's approval and necessary permits.

The approval must come from not only the city but also from the State Highway Dept. because the new facility would exit directly onto State Highway 3, Kendrick's Main Street.

The drive-through would be located between the bank and Phil's Family Foods, just to the east in a 15-foot space that is presently planted to grass. Entrance would be made from the rear of the bank to a covered new drive-through canopy window. Exit would be made by crossing the sidewalk and out to the street. A stop sign would be posted at the exit and convex mirrors would allow patrons to check for both sidewalk and street traffic.

Hammond is enthusiastic about the proposed new addition to his bank. He said that over the years he has received a number of customer inquiries about adding the service. He also said that the drive-through would take some of the pressure off parking requirements because it would eliminate the need for a customer to find a parking space or even get out of the car.

However, not everyone shares Hammond's enthusiasm about the proposed drive-through addition. At the Jan. 12 meeting of the K-J Community Development Assoc., the subject came up briefly and several members present voiced concern over the safety of such an addition and also over the parking space that would be lost. Hammond said bank engineers put the loss at two parking spaces while critics said the loss parking spaces would be double that.

The safety question is also high on the list of concerns. Most don't like the idea of the exit crossing the sidewalk and going directly out on Main Street. (only right-hand turns would be permitted). "The safety and convenience of the community and our customers are always the primary concern of the bank," Hammond told the Gazette Tuesday afternoon.

**City, Bank Seeks Comments**  
Basically, the fate of the proposed drive-through rests with the Kendrick city council. It is they who must approve or reject the bank's permit to build and install the facility. The State Dept. of Transportation must also approve the plans, but according to reports, the state has indicated it will wait for the city's decision.

Mayor Jerry Brown said that he and the council would like to judge public reaction to the project before voting to grant the necessary permits. Bank manager Hammond said he and First Security would also be seeking public comments.

Brown said the council will probably be voting on the project at the Feb. 14 session and between now and then he would really appreciate hearing opinions from local residents. Those wishing to express their opinions to Brown or members of the council or to city clerk Lynne Bruce. Hammond has said that customers may also talk to bank personnel.

## Juliaetta Places Temporary Moratorium On Property Subdivisions

Because it presently does not have the necessary ordinance to deal with the matter, the Juliaetta City Council voted to place a 120-day moratorium on subdivision of land within the city. The action came at the January 10 meeting of the council and is in effect with this publication of the Gazette which carries a copy of Ordinance 954.

Juliaetta Mayor Jeff Lohman said Tuesday night the council took this action so that it might prepare to deal with an increasing number of requests to have property annexed into the city and also to subdivide property already inside the city limits. "We have no subdivision ordinance right now," Lohman said, "and this moratorium will give us a chance to create one."

Subdividing property has the potential to put added pressure on existing infrastructure such as water and sewer systems, roads, etc. Having ordinances relating to the subject is a necessity for the council and for orderly growth and planning both for the city and the ones requesting the changes.

There are two people who are asking to have property annexed by the city; 1 person who wishes to subdivide property now; one who wishes to subdivide property that is zoned as single dwelling, and one person inquiring with the idea of creating a 15-unit mobile home complex.

Juliaetta has no desire to stop or inhibit growth, it just wants the means to deal with it as it arises.


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

SECTION 3: Subdivision shall mean any division of land into two or more parcels for purposes of

SECTION 4: EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage, approval and publication according to law and shall remain in effect until a subdivision ordinance is adopted by the City. This Ordinance shall expire within 120 days.

According to leading western historians Carlos Schwantes and Alvin Josephy, Hamilton has produced "a grand epic populated with a host of memorable characters," and a story that "is one of the greatest of the Old West." This praise is only a small part of the accolades the author is receiving from reviewers and readers.
