

Hammond to Argue Case Before Public Meeting

Kendrick Grange will host a public meeting next Tuesday to hear First Security Bank's Dirk Hammond explain the basis for their drive-by window proposal and to counter arguments that have been raised in opposition. The meeting, which will precede the Grange's business meeting, will begin at 7:00 p. m.

After a friendly exchange of ideas last Thursday in his office, Hammond and Grange Master, Frank Jacobson agreed that the issue deserves further discussion. This public meeting will provide an opportunity for supporters of the plan to be heard as well as its critics.

Hammond sees the division in opinion along generational lines, with those for the proposal being the bank's younger customers and those opposed being the older generation. To test this perception—especially if you are young and for the proposal—plan to attend the meeting and express your position.

Following the public forum, the Grange will hold a regular business meeting, during which Grange Master Frank Jacobson will discuss a grant application that is submitted to the Idaho Community Foundation to begin a projected rehabilitation of the Fraternal Temple.

First on a three item agenda, should the application be successful, will be an evaluation of the 90-year-old building by a structural engineer to determine its physical condition and identify any needed improvements. Following that, an architectural walk through would be conducted to identify interior features that need to be considered in any attempt at rehabilitation. The third part of this initial phase would consist of preparing "as built" drawings of the facility, necessary to any attempt to retrofit the utilities in the building and/or to the redesign use of interior space.

This preliminary phase would be the prelude to a thorough public consideration of the future of the building as to its purposes in the community and its eventual ownership. The Grange has felt that while they are legal owners of the building, it really belongs to the community of Kendrick-Juliaetta and environs and that the larger public must be involved in decisions regarding its future.

Harold V. Freeman, 61, Former Juliaetta Resident, Passes January 24

Harold V. (Buster) Freeman, 61, a former resident of Juliaetta, died Jan. 24 at Morgan Hill, Calif. His home was at Santa Cruz, Calif.

He was born March 25, 1933 at Boise to Harold S. and Harriett James Freeman. He spent much of his early life in Alaska before moving to Juliaetta. He graduated from Kendrick High School, then attended the University of Idaho for two years before joining the U. S. Air Force.

He lived in California for many years. He was a minister with a doctorate in philosophy, herbal medicine and metaphysics. He liked hunting, mining for gems and writing.

He was married and divorced twice.

Survivors include his father, Harold S. Freeman of Juliaetta, two sisters, Frances Thompson of Lewiston and Connie White of Richmond, Va.; four daughters, Amitsa Freeman of Cupertino, Calif., Theresa Thompson of Bellevue, and Kathy Freeman and Cindy Freeman, both of Sunnyvale, Calif.; three sons, John Freeman of Cupertino, Calif., Arthur Freeman of Kirkland, Wash., and Paul Freeman of Ann Arbor, Mich., and seven grandchildren.

Cremation is planned with inurnment later at Payette, Idaho.

Juliaetta to Furnish House Numbers

Residences and businesses within the City of Juliaetta will soon have numbers installed, Mayor Jeff Lohman said Tuesday evening. The costs of the project will be borne by Pottlatch Telephone Co., Cablevision and the city itself. Juliaetta city workers will install the numbers and there are no costs to residents or businesses, unless they desire purchase and install their own numbers, Lohman added.

Installation of the numbers will aid delivery people, emergency medical and fire crews and those from out-of-town, not familiar with the town.

The city is asking help from residents who have vinyl or metal siding on homes. The numbers are made to be nailed (small nails) on the outside of the home. Lohman said the city realizes some people who have vinyl or metal siding do not want nails driven in the exterior if this is the case, call the city at 276-7791 and city workers can make other arrangements.

The city purchased only one style of numbers. If individuals wish another style, they may do so at their own expense, Lohman said.

If anyone is going to purchase their own numbers, they may call city hall and find what the number of their house is.

"Start Small" is Kendrick's Advice To Commissioners

Latah County Commissioners and the Latah County Planning and Zoning Commission asked for comments and opinions about a proposed change in the Area of Impact for the City of Kendrick. At a public meeting held Monday night at the Kendrick Fire hall, the commissions got what they asked for. Few of the nearly 40 persons present liked the new and enlarged proposed Area of Impact and didn't hesitate to say so. American Ridge farmer Tim Eichner seemed to express a majority opinion when he suggested the county "start small" when it creates an Area of Impact for Kendrick.

An Area of Impact is required by Idaho Code. This requires the city and county to cooperate, by agreement, on development proposals which may affect the city more significantly than the county responsible for the approval of the proposal.

The Area of Impact provides the city with a formal process to ensure that new development near an existing city will be considered in relation to both city and county jurisdictions. A proposal requiring a zoning change or subdivision approval in the Area must be submitted to the County and the city, at least 30 days prior to the public hearing before the County Planning and Zoning Commission.

The property included within the Area must be within the "trade area" of the city.

Present at the Monday meeting were Latah Commissioners Shirley Greene, who served as chairman of the meeting, Tom Spangler and Harry DeWitt, County Clerk Susan Peterson, Gerald Billington of the Planning and Zoning Commission and Doug Whitney of the Latah County Prosecutor's office.

Following a brief report on Areas of Impact and history (Kendrick has had an area of impact since the 1970s), Chr. Greene went right to the taking of testimony.

Clem Lyons asked that if some of the land is so skeletal and insignificant now, "why include us?" He said he didn't think the proposed changes "hadn't been well thought through."

Frank Dammarell, a resident of the area, said he understood why the city was concerned about protecting the city's spring near his property and wanted it included in the area of impact, he still felt the area was too large and thought that 24 and 19 should be eliminated.

Kendrick Mayor Jerry Brown said that when the Area of Impact was considered by the council there were three special points that were important: the trade area, geographic impact and possible annexation, but added "the city doesn't want to annex anyone."

Tim Eichner suggested the new Area of Impact be reduced to Sections 24 and 19, "start small," he told the commission.

Lester Holmes and Bob Rape also echoed Eichner proposal. "Leave it like it is, then if it gets out of hand we'll deal with it," he said.

The Commissioners will now return to Moscow and study the matter further before making any decisions.
