Augusta Eggers, 93, Passes Feb. 11

Augusta A. (Gussie) Eggers, a longtime Juliaetta homemaker, died of causes related to age Saturday, Feb. 11, at Gritman Medical Center in Moscow. She was 93.

She had been a resident of Moscow Care Center for five years. She was born Oct. 6, 1901, to William B. and Edith Belle Petet Brown at Guthrie, Oklahoma. The family moved to Custer County, Neb., when she was a small child.

She graduated from high school at Grand Island, Neb., and attended State Normal School at Kearney, Neb. She then taught school at Abbott, Neb.

She married George C. Eggers on Sept. 18, 1919, at Broken Bow, Neb. The couple lived in Nebraska until 1925, when they moved to the Bitterroot Valley in Montana.

In 1947 they moved to Idaho and lived in various locations including Gifford, Cottonwood Creek and Lewiston. They moved to Juliaetta in 1953. Her husband died in 1979.

She enjoyed cooking and making candy, making pillows and quilts and writing poetry, some of which was published.

She was also active in the Juliaetta Community Church and sang in the choir and served on several church boards.

She is survived by three sons, Gary Eggers of Bovill, Lorin Eggers of Lewiston and Duane Eggers of Lolo, Mont., a daughter, Edith Adams of Seattle; two sisters, Lucille Henrickson of Walla Walla and Nancy Vermilyea of Twin Falls; 15 grandchildren; 24 great-grandchildren; and one great-great-granddaughter.

A son, Glenn, died in 1994. Several brothers and sisters also died previously.

The funeral was held Tuesday at the Juliaetta Community Church. Burial followed at the Juliaetta Cemetery.

New Stamps Available At Post Offices

The Postal Service's 14th annual Love Stamp—which this year features a whimsical cherub pondering romance—is now available for customers at the Kendrick and Juliaetta post office.

"The Love Stamp is always one of our more popular stamps," says Sharon Harris, Kendrick Postmaster. "People use them for Valentine's Day, Mother's and Father's Days, birthdays, holiday, holiday messages and for all kinds of personal greetings. They add a nice personal touch to your mailings."

This year's stamp is again very attractive, with the words "Love" spelled out in large red letters above the cherub. The cherub pictured comes from the painter Raphael's great masterpiece, "Sistine Madonna."

The 32-cent Love Stamp is being sold in sheets of 50, and in no-lick, self adhesive stamp booklets of 20 per booklet. They are now available at the Kendrick Post office.

"For added convenience, customers can also order their stamps by phone," Sharon said. "Dial 1-800-STAMP-24 and give the operator your order request and credit card number. We also have stamps by mail order forms which you can pick up at our post office. Make sure you specify Love Stamps on your order form. The stamps will be mailed to you quickly without ever leaving your home."

Fire Damages Local Apartments

Fire of unknown origin almost completely gutted one of two Brocke Apartments on Kendrick's Main St. late Thursday afternoon, Feb. 9. The stucco-covered duplex rented by Mrs. Esther Shreffler, suffered severe damage and Mrs. Shreffler lost many of her belongings. The other apartment was occupied by Mrs. Marge Freytag escaped with only smoke damage, thanks to prompt action by the Kendrick Volunteer Firemen and volunteers. The Troy Volunteer Fire Dept. also responded to the alarm at the request of the local department.

Neither Mrs. Shreffler nor Mrs. Freytag were at home when the fire started in a back room near the Shreffler kitchen shortly after 5 p. m. The fire burned slowly but when the firemen arrived within less than five minutes after receiving the alarm, much of the back part of the house was smokey and the fire had worked into the ceiling and under the roof. Getting to the burning roof proved to be a rough job for the firemen. A metal roof had been placed over the tarred roof a number of years ago and the firemen had to get through the metal roof to get at the burning material. Firemen were at the site for several hours and then maintained a watch to see the material did not re-ignite.

George Brocke Jr. said Saturday that the structure was an old one, built in the early part of the century and later remodeled into the two apartment. His father and mother lived in one of the apartments and his grandmother lived in the other.

Kendrick Council Rejects Bank's Drive-by Proposal

The survey investigated the present condition of the water system and what would be needed to bring it up to proper standard. A similar survey will be made on the sewer system.



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR THE ANNEXATION OF TWO PARCELS OF PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1 OF THIS ORDINANCE INTO THE CITY OF JULIAETTA; PROVIDING THAT PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1 BE ZONED AS "SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL"; PROVIDING FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CITY'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AND ZONING MAPS TO REFLECT THIS CHANGE; PROVIDING FOR THIS ORDINANCE TO BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW;
WHEREAS the City Council deems it in the public interest that the real property described in Section 1 of this Ordinance, adjacent to the existing City boundaries, be annexed into the City; and,
