Public Meetings On Areas of Impact Will be March 22, 28

The Latah Board of County Commissioners will hold public hearing in both Juliaetta and Kendrick this month on proposed areas of impact for the two towns.

The meeting in Kendrick will be Wednesday, March 22 at 7 p. m. in the Kendrick Fire Hall.

The Juliaetta meeting will be on Tuesday, March 28 at 7:00 p. m. at the Juliaetta Elementary School gym.

The purpose of the meeting will be to take testimony and consider a recommendation from the Latah County Planning and Zoning Commission to review a proposed Area of Impact Agreement with the City of Juliaetta and the City of Kendrick.

All interested parties are encouraged to attend the hearing. Accommodations for individuals who qualify under the Americans with Disabilities Act are available upon request. Notice is required in the Commission's Office three working days prior to the hearing in order to acquire accommodations for individuals needing assistance.

This hearing will be held pursuant to the Latah County Hearing Procedures Ordinance and under authority of the Idaho Local Planning Act 67-8511 and Section 13.10 of the Latah County Zoning Ordinance. The Latah County Board of Commissioners reserves the right to limit the length of testimony.

Earl C. Choate, 69, Former Area Resident, Passes in British Col.

A memorial service for Earl C. Choate, a former resident of Teakcan and Lewiston was held Saturday at Osoyoos United Church at Osoyoos, British Columbia.

He died of cancer Wednesday at South Okanagan Hospital at Osoyoos. He was 69.

He was born March 29, 1925, at Teakcan, Idaho, to Edward Z and Lily J. Choate. He went to school at Teakcan and graduated from high school at Southwick in 1943.

He joined the U. S. Navy in February 1944, serving on the USS Mobile in the Pacific. He was discharged Dec. 30, 1945.

He married Irene N. Schoeffler November 30, 1942 at Orofino. They married later ended in divorce.

He married Beverly Brown-Nov. 26, 1947. They lived at various places, including Teakcan, Lewiston, Mullen and Kennewick. He worked as a logger, miner, mechanic and construction worker.

Survivors include his wife of Osoyoos; three sons, Gary Choate of Benton City, Wash., Kelly Choate of Yakima and Cory Choate of Coquit-British Columbia; five daughters, Bonnie Almuist of Kennewick, Sue Stremel of Valemount, British Columbia, Kathy Kersey and Tracy Choate, both of Osoyoos, and Judy Foster of Kendrick; a foster daughter Jesse Wagner of Maple Ridge, B. C., two brothers, Gordon Choate of Greer, Idaho, and Jesse Choate of Spring Lake, Wash.; one sister, Mayme Ogden of Teakcan. 19 grand-grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a sister, Ruby, and a brother, Edward.
