Grange Assists in Connectivity Effort

Last week's open Grange meeting to discuss LCSC's Tsceminicum Regional Connection project turned out to have some surprises. Of all those present to hear Bryan Hossner review the purposes of the project, it was visiting State Grange officers from more populous parts of the state who were the most emphatic in stressing the importance of North Central Idaho's being assured access to the Information Superhighway.

"If you don't get in there and fight, you'll be left behind," said Idaho State Grange Master Arley Weaver.

Equally surprising to the sponsors of the meeting was the fact that there were no representatives of our area school districts, nor were there any representatives of health care providers who stand to gain so much for their patients in the way of diagnostic treatment services available via the new technology. In addition, there was only one local industry representative (Gem State Lumber), although Mayor Jerry Brown did speak unofficially on behalf of the local phone company.

And Brown's comments did much to inspire faith in the audience that the capacity to meet LCSC's goal of "connectivity to the last mile" is built into the local phone system, the capacity of which far exceeds its present use.

Speaking on behalf of city government, two other mayors in addition to Brown cited government's need to have online access to the Superhighway. Marie Vogel of Troy said, for example, that access would have simplified the process of getting immediate help when Troy's water system recently was threatened by a major breach.

Also present and commenting on the need for access was Jan Wells representing the Juliaetta Library, and Secretary Pro Tem Lil Howerton of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association.

If you were not able to attend the meeting last week, it's not too late to express your ideas concerning need for access to the Information Superhighway. You are encouraged to write Dr. Mary Emery, Institute for Community Development at LCSC, providing the following: (1) A brief paragraph identifying yourself and/or the group you represent; (2) three or four examples of needs that could be met, given full access to the telecommunications system; and (3) endorsement or support of LCSC in its endeavor to plan for a system that will assure "connectivity out to the last mile—even to Leland."

Following the public meeting, local Grangers enjoyed visiting with the state officers and with Ruth White and Elsie Onstott, Kendrick Grange members who now live in Lewiston and who are missed in so many ways on the local scene.

Raymond Allen McGraw, a Kendrick High School graduate, died of congestive heart failure Wednesday, March 11 at his home at Soap Lake, Wash. He was 71.

He was born July 15, 1923, at Moscow to Lester and Mary McGraw. He attended school at Kendrick, graduating from Kendrick High School in the early 1940s. He graduated from the University of Idaho at Moscow with a degree in business.

He joined the Seabees branch of the US Navy and served four years during World War II.

He lived at Yakima and Ellensburg, Wash., where he was administrative service manager of the Central Washington University physical plant for many years.

He moved to Soap Lake after he retired.

He was a life member of the Moscow Elks Lodge No. 249. He enjoyed fishing, baking, canning and spending time with friends.

Survivors include a sister, Vivian Swan of Silverton, Idaho. He was preceded in death by three brothers, Floyd, Neil and Ralph McGraw, and one sister, Virgie Schauhaer.

A graveside service was held Saturday at Wild Rose Cemetery on Big Bear Ridge.

Health Care for Elderly Focus of Federal Grant

Idaho has been selected as one of five states to receive a one-time federal grant for a pilot project that addresses health care issues for the rural elderly.

The project will create a COUNCIL ON HOME AND COMMUNITY BASED CARE (HCBC) of 15-20 people from Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce counties.

"The Council's representation will come from the counties served by Area II of the Area Agency on Aging, a non-profit organization with headquarters in Lewiston," said Gene Wirsig, community liaison for the project.

During a one year period the Council, after being trained in decision making skills, will analyze obstacles, research strategies, and make recommendations that best serve the HCBC needs of the area's elderly.

According to census data, persons aged 75 and older are the fastest growing segment of Idaho's population.

The Idaho Office On Aging and the Area Agency on Aging will consider the Council's recommendations in their plans.

"This will be a grassroots effort, including input from many seniors, to discover and recommend ways to help the elderly remain living in their own homes as long as possible," Wirsig said. Studies show a strong preference by seniors to receive health care at home or nearby day-care facilities. Home and community based care services help maintain the independence of older people.

Truman B. (Tiny) Elmore, who established the Kendrick Drive In in 1964 and operated it until 1978, died Thursday, March 9 at his home in Lewiston of congestive heart failure. He was 89.

He was born Jan. 10, 1906, to Benjamin and Bethra Elmore at Byars, Oklahoma, where he grew up and lived until 1936.

He married Evelyn Cassidy Jan. 30, 1926, Oklahoma City.

The moved to Lewiston in 1961.

They later moved to Kendrick, where he built, owned and operated the Kendrick Drive In from 1964 until 1978.

The couple moved back to Lewiston in 1971. His wife died May 4, 1971.

He continued to operate the Drive-In while living at Lewiston and worked as an auto parts salesman before retiring.

He married Ruth Eveland Nov. 8, 1975, at Lewiston.

He was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints since 1975.

He enjoyed fishing, camping and cooking. He was noted for his barbecue sauce and peanut brittle, which he marketed and sold.

Survivors include his wife of Lewiston; a son, Robert G. Elmore of Boise; and three stepdaughters, JoAnne Acero of Phoenix, Ariz., Marilyn Freer of Long Beach, Calif., and Joyce Bolick of Winchester, Idaho.

Survivors also include two sisters, Jewel Steinbrook of Castro Valley, Calif., and Juanita Carmona of Antioch, Calif.; two grandchildren, three stepgrandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

A daughter died previously.

Develop. Assoc. Coping with Present, Future Projects

At an evening meeting of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association, those present heard reports on the progress of a number of project now underway, and also discussed future problems that may face the community. The meeting was held Thursday evening in the fire hall with approximately 20 members and guests present.

President Dana Magnuson reported that secretary Kathy Shove has resigned from her position because she has accepted a job in Lewiston. Magnuson announced that Lil Howerton has agreed to serve as secretary pro tem until a replacement for Mrs. Shove is found.

Also present was Carm Lockwood, the new Forest Service Ranger from Potlatch.

Unless the program is reintroduced at a later date, the "Volunteer of the Year" recognition honor will be suspended, said president Magnuson.

Donna Heinen reported that Robt. Thomas, a Northwest artist who was scheduled to be guest speaker, was unable to be present but that he has been rescheduled for the April meeting.

George Brocke reported that a decision by companies involved in the reopening of the railroad line through Kendrick will be made in 1996.

It was also reported that the Arts Commission has given a \$1,000 grant for the establishment of a theater group in the area.

It was also learned that the community will receive a \$3,000 grant to help establish a youth center. The funds will come from the Dept of Health and Welfare. Patti Kechter reported that the committee responsible for this is now seeking an acceptable location. Preliminary plans call for June opening with the center in operation two or three nights each week.

Tammy Hitchcock, chairman of Juliaetta's Centennial Park Committee, reported that progress is good on that project and it is hoped that the ballfield will be usable by June.

Mrs. Hitchcock and other volunteers have done an outstanding job with the park and deserve much credit.

Kendrick mayor Jerry Brown told the association that the water study in the city have been accomplished and the waste collection system is now under review. This is work that must be done before the State goes ahead with the reworking of main street. Brown also told the group that Kendrick water supply could be seriously stressed if a drought occurs and Kendrick needs to face this prospect. Right now the city depends on Well No. 1 for its prime source of water.

There is now a planned project to install a sprinkling system in the Kendrick City Park under the sponsorship of the Lions Club. The project would not only be the installation of the sprinkler system by also the remodeling and repair of the gazebo. Dave Dudunake was present as a Lions Club representative to discuss the subject. It was agreed that a committee from the Development Assoc., the City and the Lions Club is needed to coordinate the plans for this project. Dudunake urged that the Park project be done while the streets are being worked on.

Lil Howerton reviewed some of the sources of revenue that might be available through grants from the Forest Service, the Farm Bill and the Money Saver.

Frank Jacobson, Master of the Kendrick Grange No. 413, strongly encouraged the association to include the restoration of the Fraternal Temple building in the association future plans. He wanted the encouragement and support of the group in the first phase of the restoration which would be a professional investigation of the condition of the structure. The building might either be restored to its original condition or remodeled for commercial use.

President Magnuson asked for a discussion of providing parttime pay for help with the paper work and other efforts connected with the functions of the Development of Association. Most members have become aware that applying for state and federal grants, meeting the requirements of the Gem State program, and keeping up with the numerous local committees has become a burden for an unpaid, volunteer secretary. Magnuson wants the association to consider payment to someone who might be doing this type of labor. The members present agreed to consider such a move.

Volunteer Adopt-A-Highway Litter Cleanup Program Marks 5th Anniversary

This month marks the fifth anniversary of the statewide volunteer litter cleanup program, Adopt-A-Highway, the Idaho Transportation Department announced. The program, which began in March 1990, is stronger than ever.

About 2,700 miles (54 percent) of Idaho's state highway system are currently being cleaned under the program, including more than 67 percent of the roads in the north Idaho region. There are 1,240 groups currently involved, including the 3 charter members that signed on when the program began—the Canyon County 4-H Builder's Club, Idaho Falls Rotary and the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce.

"The program has far exceeded our expectations," said Adopt-A-Highway coordinator Wally Turk. "The program continues to be successful because it was initiated by

the public, and they have done a great job keeping it up." Turk estimates Adopt-A-Highway is the largest volunteer effort in the state, with about 90,000 volunteers.

"Since I can't contact each volunteer individually, I'll take this opportunity to thank each one of them for caring enough about our state to stop and pick up someone else's trash," Turk said. "It speaks very highly of the citizens of Idaho."

In the five years of the program, participants have logged 390,000 volunteer hours and have cleaned about 7.7 million pounds of trash from Idaho's roads, "and that does not include large items like tires, planks, posts, rusted appliances and old car bodies," Turk said.
