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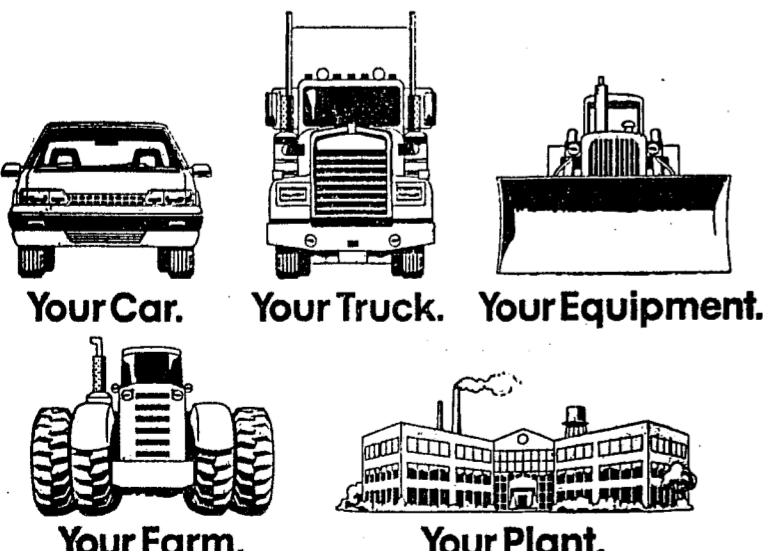

### Controlling High Blood Pressure is Vital to Preventing Strokes

If you don't have high blood pressure, chances are that you know people who do. Several national studies show that 35 to 45 percent of older adults are taking medicines for high blood pressure, and another 10 to 15 percent have mild elevations in blood pressure, says Dr. Bruce M. Psaty, associate professor of medicine, epidemiology and health services at the University of Washington.

Several recent studies have shown that treatment is highly effective in preventing strokes and heart attacks in older adults.

Your blood pressure consists of two numbers. The first number is called the "systolic" and refers to the force moving blood through the vessels when your heart contracts. The second is called the "diastolic" and refers to the force in the vessels between heartbeats. Normal blood pressure is usually defined as less than 140/90 mm Hg.

High levels of either systolic or diastolic pressure are potentially

dangerous. Blood pressure levels, especially systolic pressure, generally increase with age, so older adults are more prone than the middle-aged to a condition called "isolated systolic hypertension."

Because elevated levels of blood pressure do not generally produce any symptoms, you need to have your blood pressure checked on a regular basis. "If untreated, high blood pressure doubles the risk of heart attacks and triples the risk of stroke," Psaty said. "Other complications of untreated high blood pres-

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sure include damage to the eyes, the kidneys and the vessels in the legs."

What can you do for your blood pressure? Weight loss, physical activity and the restriction of salt and alcohol intake all lower blood pressure. Physical activity, including regular walking, helps lower blood pressure and has other health benefits, too.

Even if you have done all that you can with diet and exercise, your blood pressure may eventually reach levels at which your doctor recommends medicines.

"In the last several years," said Psaty, "three studies in older adults have shown that taking low doses of diuretics, sometimes called water

pills, prevents heart disease and stroke. Low doses of beta-blockers, a class of high blood pressure medicines that block the effect of adrenaline, were also shown to prevent strokes."

These low doses of high blood pressure medicines are generally free of side effects. If you are taking a medicine blood pressure, and you think it is causing you troublesome side effects, you should discuss them with your doctor. Lower doses might help, and if not, a variety of other medicines are available. Since you may be taking the medicine for a number of years, it is important to find one that is right for you.
