

## Irene Christensen to be Honored April 1 at Ninetieth Birthday Open House



Irene Christensen, a long-time resident of Kendrick, will be honored with a belated ninetieth birthday celebration at an open house reception at the Golden Sunset Senior Citizen in Kendrick Saturday, April 1st, between the hours of 2 and 4 p. m.

Mrs. Christensen was born February 22, 1905 in Salt Lake City, Utah, the daughter of Charles and Florence Snowling. She and her two sisters, LaVon and Florence, grew up and attended school in Salt Lake where Irene graduated from the LDS Business College. They were active participants in neighborhood baseball games, church, and musical groups.

She met Douglas Christensen in 1923 and they were married in the Mormon Temple in Salt Lake City on Sept. 18, 1928. A few days later they boarded a train to Philadelphia, Penn., where her husband entered medical school. Irene worked as a secretary for \$100 a month, enough to support them and put her husband through medical school. After medical school they bought a Model T Ford for \$35 and embarked on a 13-day journey across the United States to Seattle, Wash. where doctor Christensen was to do his internship. During this time their first

child, Douglas, Jr. was born in 1931. Following the completion of his internship and a short stay in Salt Lake, they moved to Kendrick where Dr. Christensen began his practice. Three more children were born, Charles in 1934; Janice in 1936, and Roger in 1938. In 1939 they built a home on Sperry Grade where Irene still resides. Dr. and Irene celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1978. In 1981 Dr. passed away.

Irene's love of flowers is readily apparent in the beautiful gardens surrounding her home. Bird feeders and birdbaths provide substance for the many species of birds drawn to her yard and provide Mrs. Christensen with much pleasure and entertainment. She enjoys singing and sang with various choral groups well into her 80s. She is a charter member of the Golden Sunset Seniors.

She has a son, Charles, in Honolulu, Hawaii; a daughter, Janice Griffin in Yakima, Wash., a son, Roger, also in Yakima; 12 grandchildren, and 20 great-grandchildren. A son, Douglas, died in 1989 and a grandson, Jamie Christensen, died in 1989.

She worked as a sales clerk at the Potlatch Department Store and later at Whitepine Drug Store at Potlatch, working from 1979 until retiring in 1990.

She was a member of the Princeton Church of the Nazarene, Princeton Grange and Rock Creek Card Club. She volunteered for the Cancer fund Drive for many years.

She served as the church organist for Princeton Nazarene for nearly 20 years and also served as treasurer for the Sunday School and Church Missionary Society.

The meeting this week with the Commissioners was to discuss and possibly adopt a new Area of Impact which must be accepted by both the City and County.

The County did vote to accept the new Area of Impact, but the City declined to vote at this time, Lohman said, because it is awaiting more information and response from the public. The vote could come at the April 3 meeting, Lohman indicated.

## Public Meeting April 5 to Discuss Main St. Rebuilding

Mayor Jerry Brown and the city council have called for a townhall meeting Wednesday, April 5 at 7:00 p. m. to discuss with residents the plans the State of Idaho has to rebuild Main Street in Kendrick in the summer of 1996.

Kendrick Main Street is also part of State Highway 3 and is maintained by the State Highway Department. Main Street is in poor condition not only from heavy traffic but the many layers of sealing coating and patching has developed a crown in the center of the street that needs to be removed.

In conjunction with the highway project, the city also has plans to replace the water and sewer lines that run under Main Street. This is, of course, the city responsibility, but this work must be completed before the highway is replaced. Much, if not all, of the water lines and sewer lines are old and in poor shape.

Meeting the cost of replacing the water and sewer lines will require a block grant from Idaho Department of Commerce and also the passage of a bond issue to secure matching funds. CEDA director Joe Glick will be present at the meeting to discuss the availability and application for block grants and any other pertinent information.

The meeting will be at the Fire Hall and Mayor Brown urges all residents to be present.





**Humor Your Way To Better Health**

We've all heard the old adage that laughter is the best medicine. Medically speaking, of course, that's not true, but humor can go a long way in helping you feel better. "It's easier and less stressful to deal with a situation if you can laugh at it," says Dr. Marci Catanzaro, research associate professor at the University of Washington School of Nursing. "If you can find the humor in a situation, whether it's an illness, an unlikeable boss, or a difficult predicament at home, you'll be better able to deal with it."

Catanzaro uses humor in her nursing practice to help patients handle difficult situations, whether it's a diagnosis of a life-threatening illness or simply their fear of going to the doctor. But don't look for her to be doing stand-up comedy. "I don't come into the room with a bunch of one-liners," Catanzaro explains, "My humor is very low key. For example, I like to use funny cartoons that I clip from newspapers and magazines. Once we've chuckled over the humorous messages in the cartoons, the patients are usually more at ease and relaxed discussed their own situation."

Another approach Catanzaro uses is imagination. "If I have a patient with a progressive disease, I might ask the patient to imagine the absolute worst thing that could happen. Then I'll have him imagine the silliest thing that could happen. After the patient thinks about it, he's usually able to find something funny or humorous in the situation, and suddenly things don't look as bleak as they did a few minutes ago." She's even gone as far as writing "prescriptions" for patients to watch a funny video or read a funny book, just so they'll laugh.

You won't find "Humor" listed under the medical specialties in the yellow pages, but more physician groups around the country are integrating humor into health care settings. According to Catanzaro, humor can be a good mechanism for coping with stress of medical care and hospitalism. "A little humor helps promote feelings of relaxation and well-being, and can help patients adapt to tense and unfamiliar situations."

Catanzaro says humor can also be a useful tool in the business world.

Id. When she and her staff tackle thorny issues, Catanzaro will often have them begin by brainstorming totally off-the-wall solutions—the more bizarre, the better. "Coming up with the crazy ideas helps to diffuse the tension or frustration the group might be feeling," she explains, "and sharing the laughter helps everyone loosen up and open their minds to new resolutions."

You don't have to be a clown or a comedian to make humor work for you. Catanzaro offers these suggestions to help lighten you up:

- Think of all the petty, negative things that bother you—then brainstorm ridiculous solutions.
- Take a 'humor walk,' and look for funny things, like an amusing sign, a clever vanity license plate, or a silly-looking pet.
- Use a joke-a-day calendar.
- Write jokes on little slips of paper, and keep them in a jar on your desk. Read one when you need a quick stress break.
- Start collecting certain kinds of jokes, such as Far Side cartoons. Have your friends and family send you what they find, and keep them handy for a quick pick-me-up.
- And if you're home battling a cold or the flu? Catanzaro advises you to set aside that riveting murder mystery in favor of a humorous story. Turn off the soaps, and watch a Marx Brothers movie instead. After all, when it comes to helping you feel better, "Duck Soup" might be more helpful than chicken soup.
