

## Forum Explores Resources Issues, Community Planning

Speaking of Idaho's newly re-named Local Land Use Planning Act, Teri Ottens of the Association of Idaho Cities said in Lewiston last week that control over land development rises from public participation. "Be there!" she said. Ottens, a staff person with the association, was a participant in a day-long forum on resource issues at the rural/urban interface, sponsored by the Clearwater Resource Conservation and Development Council.

Comparing a community's comprehensive plan to a rifle aimed at managing development, Ottens said that the ordinances related to the plan are the bullets, the local laws aimed at enforcing the value judgments made first by the general public. "A plan must reflect what the community wants, said Ottens. How you get public input is a problem," she said. She favors having public information meetings rather than hearings as a way of assessing what the people value. Hearings, while required by law before final approval of plans and ordinances, are too easily dominated by the disgruntled and become divisive in force, working against the possibility of community consensus.

To date only 72 of Idaho's 199 cities have a comprehensive plan on file—and that after the original law having been in existence since 1975. Where, one might ask, are Kendrick and Juliaetta?

A panel consisting of a professional planner, a realtor/developer, a landowner, a conservation activist, and a local volunteer dealt with the tough question of how we can accommodate growth while at the same time maintain the integrity of the rural setting. Once again, the issue of values arose, the need for the public to identify the resources it values most and therefore wants to protect. Mark Solomon, Vice President of the Idaho Conservation League in Moscow, said that Idahoans need to raise the question, "Do we want to use natural resources to accommodate population growth?"

Answering Solomon, realtor/developer Chris Mooney said that while "not all developers are created equal," the issue of growth has become a challenge to private property rights. Solomon stuck to the point, however, that the issue is the use of the land, not the effect that growth has on adjacent ag or forest land. "You can't have growth," said Solomon, "without being aware of the ultimate point where you can't grow any more."

Another speaker at Thursday's forum who stressed the importance of community involvement in planning was self-educated planner Sylvia Judd of Moscow. "The first planners," she said, "should be the public." As for visionaries, "they may show us opportunities," Judd has acquired an understanding of the importance of community-based planning after extensive reading and workshop attendance.

Not all of last Thursday's speakers put that much stock in community-based planning, however. "It sounds great on paper," said one presenter, but it is, after all, unworkable because, "development just happens." If that is so, then a lot of folks associated with the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association have been spinning their wheels for nothing. Your writer must confess that from time to time it appears that way to him.

The final judges concerning the importance of public input in the planning process are you, the readers. If you think your views about development matter, then become informed and share your perceptions in ways that will unify rather than divide the community of Kendrick-Juliaetta and environs. It might help too if Kendrick and Juliaetta were to renew the relationship they once had with the Clearwater Resource Conservation and Development Council, an important source of information sharing and problem resolution.

### Rev. Jack Fix, 82, Claimed by Cancer

The Rev. Jack Fix, 82, a former Juliaetta area resident, died Friday, March 24, of cancer at his home in Modesto, Calif.

He was born Dec. 3, 1912, on Fix Ridge near Juliaetta, Idaho to Ira and Pearl Dygert Fix. He helped his father on the farm and graduated from Kendrick High School in 1931.

In the fall of 1933 he left to study for the ministry at United Brethren College at Huntington Ind.

He married Beryl Roof of Battle Creek, Mich., June 28, 1936, at the United Brethren Church at Juliaetta, the same year he was ordained as a minister.

He preached for 53 years—five years at College Park Church at Huntington, Ind., and the rest of the time in Idaho and California.

Survivors include three sons, Gerald Fix of Omaha, Neb.; Burnell Fix and Timothy Fix, both of Modesto; two daughters, Janet St. Pierre of Lohmita, Calif., and Anita Fast of Motesto; 12 grandchildren; three great-grandchildren and four sisters, Elsie Clark of Dayton, Wash.; Arlee Nye Blewett of Lewiston; Macie York of Spokane and Mary Atkinson of Redding, Calif.

Two brothers and one sister preceded him in death.

A funeral was held Tuesday at Modesto. A graveside service will be held at 3 p. m. Friday at Fix Ridge Cemetery.




