Juliaetta Council To Enforce Clean Up Ordinance on Junk

This ordinance is meant to control the public and visual nuisance and environmental and safety problems caused by abandoned, wrecked and disassembled vehicles and other equipment or machinery in the City.

Failure to comply with the conditions for removal of such equipment as stated in this ordinance carries certain penalties. A copy of the ordinance in its entirety may be read at City Hall.

It is hoped that the City of Juliaetta will receive cooperation from all its citizens in its efforts to make the community a place to be proud of.

Tax Filing Deadline Means Final Rush

With the deadline for filing income tax returns rapidly approaching, the U. S. Postal Service is bracing itself for the onslaught of last-minute tax filers.

"April 17 falls on a Monday this year," said Postmaster Sharon Harris. "Since Mondays are always busy around here, we expect things to get interesting around the middle of the afternoon. That's when you can count on all roads leading to the post office."

Last-minute returns and extension requests may be deposited until 7:30 a. m. Tuesday, April 18 and still be postmarked April 17.

Harris also added, "Be certain to have your returns weighed and pay the proper amount of postage." Tax agencies will not pay postage, so short-paid tax filings must be returned to you for additional postage. Ordinarily that means you'll miss the deadline.

Harris said the Kendrick Post Office expects to receive more additional pieces of mail on "tax night" this year. She assures the community that each and every tax filing will receive an official April 17 postmark if it is properly prepared for mailing and deposited by the designated cutoff time.

"Just like the holiday mailing season," Sharon said, "you get it here and we'll get it there."

Voter Registration Deadline April 21 For School Election

On Tuesday, May 16, the voters in Kendrick School District No. 283 will vote on a Supplemental Override Election. Voters in Zone 1 and 5 will also vote for a candidate for the position of School Trustee for Zone 1 and Zone 5. You must be registered to vote in your county to vote in school district elections.

You may register with your precinct registrar or at your county courthouse auditor's office until Friday, April 21. The election laws have been changed to also provide for voter registration in each political subdivision and/or by mail. Forms are available at your city hall and the school district offices. Mail registrations must be received by the county clerk prior to the close of registration. Any mail registration application postmarked not later than April 20, 1995 shall be deemed timely. The new law also allows voters not registered the day of the election to register at their polling place on election day (identification to prove age and residency must be provided).

If you expect to be absent from the district on May 16, 1995, the day of the election, or will be unable, because of physical disability or blindness, to go to the polling place, you may make written application for a ballot to be voted on at the election. To receive an application, contact the Kendrick Joint School District office of the Superintendent (289-4211). Applications will be available by Monday, April 17, 1995 and must be filed at same office not later than 11 a. m., May 16, 1995 (election day).
