## Pardon Me, But Just Where is the Public Phone Anyhow

Okay, so it was a slow day at Grange recently when the members decided to take on the big question: What happened to downtown Kendrick's public phone? What, you say you didn't know it was missing? Just shows how much you care about the big issues!

As a matter of fact, Kendrick's old timey public phone booth was moved from its temporary location next to the Diner weeks and weeks ago—over three months ago, as a matter of fact. It had been moved there from its original Main Street location while the phone company underwent a major face lifting. A call to Potlatch Telephone about the missing public phone got you the answer that they were awaiting the delivery of new equipment. Or that there was, after all, a public phone available out at the high school.

And so it went. And went. And went, like for over three months? If the Republicans can pass nearly all of their Contract with America in under one hundred days, one wonders why Potlatch Telephone can't get a new public phone into service in less time than that!

Further contact with folks in the Potlatch office got the info that he city council of Kendrick was going to decide where to put the new public telephone. Pursuit of that led to an emphatic denial from the city that the council was involved in any way. And besides, said our informant, how many Grangers would use a public phone anyway?

Well, that rather misses the point, doesn't it? After all, a telephone company is surely required for reason of public safety to have a public phone available round the clock in a town like Kendrick. Right? WRONG! as the Public Utilities Commission rep in Boise told your reporter. "Oh no, that all went out with deregulation. Competition, that's the name of the game now."

In other words, if a phone company puts in a public phone, it does so not because of public safety concerns but because of the bottom line—profit. And because it's willing to risk the probable trashing of the facility that's open to the public twenty-four hours a day.

The latest word on the hold-up is that the problem now involves a difference of opinion between two Potlatch Telephone employees as to where to place the equipment—one of those more modern hooded affairs—neither on the telephone pole just outside their office on the corner of North 7th and Main, or on the side wall of the building on 7th. Aesthetic considerations are in the balance here. Meanwhile a third employee would just as soon not have to clean up after those, young and old, who will abuse the system. Wherever the phone ends up.

So there you are. The big issue at Grange these days. Unless, that is, you haven't even missed the public phone all this time. Maybe it really doesn't matter. And won't matter. Unless you happen to be a late night traveler who desperately needs to call 911 to report a bloody accident—or a frightened teen ager wanting to call home for a ride after her date dumps her in Kendrick. Think about it. Then give Potlatch Telephone a call. They need to know you do care. And they need your understanding and support—and to know that you appreciate the service they do provide.
